## JANE HANNA OBE

Jane Hanna, District Councillor for the Marcham and Shippon ward and part-time Director of Epilepsy Bereaved has been awarded an OBE for services to families in recognition of her charity work over the last 20 years. In 1990 Jane was a law fellow at Keble College, Oxford but she gave up her academic career to work on prevention of sudden death in epilepsy. Jane's then partner, barrister Alan Pring, died suddenly 20 years ago following his fourth epilepsy seizure, five months after being diagnosed. Jane founded Epilepsy Bereaved in 1995 together with four other women following the sudden unexpected deaths of Alan aged 27; William aged 22: Matthew aged 21: Natalie aged 22. They were shocked to find that neither pathologists, nor coroners nor doctors were able to explain why or how these young active people had died; and that there was no one had heard of Sudden Unexpected Death in Epilepsy.

Thanks to Epilepsy Bereaved, it is now recognised that three people die each day from epilepsy in the UK, the majority of deaths being SUDEP (Sudden Unexpected Death in Epilepsy). A national report led by Jane established that 40% of deaths may be avoided. Epilepsy Bereaved are committed to helping health professionals and families understand how sudden death in epilepsy can be prevented and there is good information now available on how the risk of SUDEP can be reduced. Epilepsy Bereaved responds to 1000 calls a year from bereaved families and provides specialist information and emotional support to people negotiating the inquest process following a sudden death: Jane said "This is wonderful recognition of the importance of the SUDEP cause. I'm proud to accept it on behalf of the many people I have worked with over the years, for whom the cause of awareness and prevention of SUDEP is paramount.

Wantage MP Ed Vaizey said: "This OBE gives much deserved recognition to her and the team at Epilepsy Bereaved in Wantage. I know from working with the charity that they have not only had an impact on national and international research and clinical practice, but the core to their work has been support to ordinary people whose lives have been devastated by SUDEP including many families in Oxfordshire."

Beth Fleming, Chair of the White Horse District Council said: "Jane's award is a testament to her years of hard work and devotion to Epilepsy Bereaved bourne out of personal tragedy. I can speak on behalf the Councillors and Officers of the Vale of White Horse District Council when I say that we are thrilled that she is honoured in this very prestigious way and hope that this will help to promote awareness of this extremely worthwhile cause".

UPDATE FROM MARCHAM MOLDOVA LIFELINE

Thanks to many people in Marcham, over £10,000 has now been raised for the Marcham Moldova Lifeline, far surpassing our expectations! As a result, we have been able to do a lot more to help some of the poorest people in Europe, through our local partners in Moldova.

- greatly improved the homes of 3 very poor families. (£750)

The words of Natalia say it all: 'I still can't believe that now we have a bath and toilet in the house. It was very difficult with 3 children to ask neighbours for a bath. I waited all my life for a kitchen!' Her husband Anatole adds 'Please send our thanks and regards to people from Marcham. Without the help we received, we couldn't have done much.'
