Cars, Motorcycles and Bicycles

The glories of Denman College, park and gardens were host, on Sunday 20th June to a fine display of no less than 21 Veteran, Edwardian, Vintage and Classic motor cars, three Classic motor cycles, six Vintage bicycles from the Murray Maclean collection and further support from elsewhere.

Many Marcham residents, their friends and guests as well as a sprinkling of foreign tourists showed their appreciation to the owners of the various vehicles, some of whom had driven to this event from over 50 miles away. All arrived, and departed, under their own power.

The oldest car on show was the 1907 De Dion-Bouton 'swing-seat' tonneau belonging to the Greshams of Brill;

Jeremy Collins of Marcham exhibited his 1907 Star 'Raceabout', truly a brass-age motor car; Michael Edwards from Boars Hill motored to Denman aboard this supremely elegant 1910 Hotchkiss 'open-drive' limousine, and Bill and Maureen Falkner arrived early with their 1924 Model T Ford, paint black of course. An unusual arrival was the 1925 Riley 'Redwing' of Richard and Helen Odell showing off its incredibly long bonnet line.

Dr Nick Bell, with son Matthew graced the Denman forecourt with their impressive and desirable 1927 Vauxhall 30/98 tourer, a 1928 Model A Ford 'Tudor' and an Austin 7 'Chummy' of the same year. Nick also brought a rare vintage Humber bicycle an advanced feature being the enclosed hub brakes.

It was good to see the 1935 AC 'Ace' of John and Majorie McLellan of Abingdon and the rare 1936 Singer 'Super 9' six-light saloon belonging to the Heaton family. Post WWII classics on display included the mighty 1950s Ford V-8 'Pilot' driven by the Claridges of Standford-in-the-Vale., the rare Rover 60 of the Greenaways of Wallingford and Jeremy Collins' 1951 Alvis TA21 'Tickford' drop-head coupé.

Local interest was taken up by four immaculate MGs - a TC, an MGA, a B and a Midget, also on display was the supremely restored Morris Minor 1000 belonging to Alan Taylor of Oxford, a BL 'Mini' and Murray Maclean's 'Frog-eye' Sprite.

Brian Gower apparently coaxed his BSA Lightning Clubman 650cc motorcycle into life a few days before the event, his son rode the fearsome Kawasaki GP 750 Turbo and to round things off Colin Evans displayed his iconic Triumph Tiger 110 of 1956 vintage.

Our most sincere thanks go to all owners of cars, motorcycles and bicycles, without their generosity this event would not have been possible. A splendid first for Marcham, huge thanks to Denman College for allowing the use of their beautiful grounds for this gathering of like-minded enthusiasts, all of whom came well equipped for a summer picnic.
