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MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS A415 – Newbridge – Temporary Closure – Advance Notice

A temporary road closure has been arranged by Oxfordshire County Council to apply to a section of the A415 at Newbridge whilst essential bridge repair and carriageway resurfacing works are carried out. Whilst the formal Order still has to be finalised, the intention is to close the Newbridge bridge for approximately 9 days from 19th February 2011. Because of the narrow width of the bridge and the removal of the road surface there will be no vehicular access over the bridge. This includes emergency service vehicles. Access for pedestrians will be maintained, although this is subject to the progress of the works and there may be delays for anyone trying to walk across. During the closure the alternative route for vehicles is off the A420 via Buckland, over Tadpole Bridge, as far as Bampton then along the B4449 through Aston to Standlake.

Oxfordshire County Council – Bus Review - 31 route

The County Council, like many local authorities, is looking to make savings in its spending. It spends several million pounds each year throughout the county subsidising bus services where they are not profitable commercial routes. At the moment, the County Council has a contract with Stagecoach to subsidise some of the Marcham service. This will remain unchanged until the end of the year. However from April the County Council will begin to undertake a review of the subsidies that are offered, with a decision being made about Marcham possibly around the end of the Summer/ early Autumn in readiness for 2012. It is always the case of use it or lose it, so please use the bus service, particularly evenings and Sundays, (the subsidised time), and justify its continued provision otherwise we might lose the subsidy next year, as the calculations seem to be done on a cost per passenger basis.

Neighbours

As we continue through winter, should the weather be the same as last January, then give a thought for your neighbours, particularly the elderly and those without transport. Bad weather can bring chaos to businesses, travel delays, school closures etc, but also affects those who are unable to get out. Do please check on your neighbours, make sure they are all right, and see whether they need assistance with anything.

Dropped Kerbs

Oxfordshire County Council, as Highway Authority, is responsible for maintaining footpaths. It is illegal to build a crossing over a public footpath without permission from the County Council. This is to ensure that the crossing is strong enough to take the weight of the vehicle and does not create a hazard for pedestrians and other footpath and road users. It has been noticed that quite a few vehicles in the village are just being bumped up over kerbs. If you one of these people, then you are reminded that you should apply to the County Council for consent to install a dropped kerb.

Casual Vacancy

A casual vacancy has occurred on the Parish Council following the resignation of Peter Rowe who has moved away from the village. The Council would like to thank him, for his efforts on behalf of the community since he rejoined the Council. There will be an election in May 2011, so the current seat is only vacant until then. However, the Parish Council has decided to see if there is anyone who may be interested in joining the Council until the election. This would give someone the chance of seeing what Parish Council meetings are like before deciding whether to stand as a candidate. If there is anyone interest in joining the Council for a few months, then he/she is invited to contact the Parish Clerk for further information about the role.

GARD UPDATE

There have been several enquiries from local people but to date there is no new hard information to report. It is assumed that following the Public Inquiry the Inspector's Report (due to have been submitted to Defra by the end of Nov) is now undergoing "quality assurance"- whatever that involves!

The Minister responsible for water, Mr Richard Benyon, MP for Newbury is undoubtedly aware of GARD's concerns, and those of the many others opposed to the proposed Thames Water Upper Thames Reservoir (UTR). For understandable reasons of probity Mr Benyon cannot meet GARD or any other interested parties until the Report is officially submitted to him. Meanwhile there has been encouraging interest in the outcome by several MPs, with positive help from Ed Vaizey MP and Nicola Blackwood MP to whom we are very grateful.

A National Policy Statement (NPS) for Water is due to be issued by the Government in July 2011 and it is our aim that the UTR should not be allowed to feature in it, at least until the alternatives have been properly and thoroughly investigated. GARD will continue to try to educate those who have influence in political circles in the NPS drafting, and we will also make an input to several other policy papers, including those on treatment of wastewater and the £2.8Bn Thames Tideway Tunnel, to reinforce our reputation founded on the expert advice given to us for the Public Inquiry by our distinguished water resources consultants. 

Dexters Rescue Damsels

Carnivorous butterwort, the elegant grass-of-Parnassus and the scarce southern damselfly, to name just a few plants and insects, are all unique to fens, one of the richest environments in the UK. Yet fens are becoming increasingly scarce and very unusual for Central England. As part of BBOWT's Cothill Fen Project, work is underway to restore and enhance a cluster of four wonderfully varied spring-fed fens in Oxon: Gozzard's Ford Fen, Dry Sandford Pit, Lashford Lane Fen and Parsonage Moor. As well as monitoring water levels and routine conservation work such as scrub clearing, we are preparing the way for livestock to graze the nature reserves on a regular basis.

Over the next few months BBOWT will be replacing old fencing, installing new fencing and a stock pen at Dry Sandford Pit to allow grazing to be introduced next summer. This is part of the Cothill Fen Project and an important step for the wonderful wildlife of this fantastic reserve. In particular, the fen associated species such as the striking southern damselfly which is nationally and internationally rare and has suffered a 30% decline in its UK distribution since 1960. In order to breed, these picky damsels in distress require fast flowing calcium rich open water of between 7 to 14cm depth as well as emergent vegetation to lay their eggs on! The site is ideal but even with local volunteers' best efforts it is a struggle to stay on top of encroaching scrub. We need help to keep the fen open and so are calling on three dexter cows to come to the rescue. Grazing will also benefit many other plants and insects including the delicate marsh helleborine orchid and the beautiful scarlet tiger moth. We apologise for any disruption caused to your visits whilst this work is happening but please bear with us as it is vital for the future wildlife of the site. There will be more details about the grazing later in the year. Also, look out for our volunteer event in the diary. ARBOURS

How many people out there in gardening land have an area within their own garden that is lightly shaded in the high summer? If that's you, then why not think about utilising this space as a relaxing location to dine outside. If you can plant a few



trees that don't cast too much shade, then you could develop one of these relaxing corners from scratch.

Many people place arbours in such places, and often they are of very rustic appearance, and can be made out of woven living willow or hazel.

Such constructions can also be found in the many catalogues, and often come in flat pack forms that you construct yourself.

It is essential that the material you choose to construct the arbour out of suits the location and the wider environment. Woven materials, wire, timber and fence posts can all be used, but all must be of suitable colour.

Scented plants trained seductively over the arbour, makes sitting in this shady oasis in summer even more of a joy.

Another consideration, when you site your arbour or sitting area, is make sure it is facing something attractive, so when you sit there you have something worth looking at.

These woven living willow efforts I mentioned are great, as they have their own canopy, and set against a backdrop of other greenery, allows them to merge in and be almost invisible from a distance. Its a great project to get children enthused about their environment, and you could even get them to help construct tunnels and caves out of this woven willow, which gives them little hideaways in which to play.

REAL ACCOUNTABILITY – MAKING A REAL DIFFERENCE

Since April 2010, all Primary Care Trusts have a duty to report on consultations on commissioning decisions undertaken during the financial year. 'Real Accountability' shows how consultation and engagement have helped to shape and inform health services in Oxfordshire. From end of life care, improvements to patients experience in community hospitals to the enhanced medical services offered by some GPs such as dermatology clinics, we have asked people what they think, what we could do to improve and develop services. We have used that feedback to improve patient experience and develop services that really meet the needs of their users.

The examples in 'Real Accountability' also show the range of methods we have used to consult people, including online surveys, focus groups, public meetings, attending existing community groups and one to one interviews. As part of the consultation process we engage with different people, groups and organisations to make sure we reach as many relevant people as possible.

ANSON TRUST

Over the last couple of years the Trust has worked hard to ensure that the Village is kept up to date with the Trust's thoughts and plans. More recently it has held a number of very constructive meetings with various interested parties in the



Village and sincerely believes that there is light at the end of what has seemed a very long tunnel to all of us.

Following last month's MADNews we have also spoken to Iain Brown regarding our hopes for the future and expressed how keen we are to build on the progress that has been made recently. With that in mind it's probably worth providing an update on where we are, particularly for those of you who are unable to make it to the public meetings.

The Trust is actively seeking a number of ways of alleviating its current cashflow difficulties and it is only natural that, in the absence of any significant income streams, it looks at how it could maximise the realisation of some of its assets to help preserve the remaining assets and provide much needed community facilities. Unfortunately the assets that we speak of, namely the Institute site and the Anson Field, are rightly cherished by the Village and therefore whatever is proposed and finally agreed will not necessarily be to everyone's liking. However, the Trust's directors have legal responsibilities under Company and Charity law/ regulation that mean that doing nothing is not an option.

One enormous and unavoidable fly in the ointment is Father Time. In the meeting in November 2009 the Trust made it clear that it believed that it had an 18 month window of opportunity to exploit before it would potential run out of the cashflow needed to maintain what facilities there currently are. We are now just over a year on from that assessment and our view has not materially changed. So where does that leave us as a Trust and, more importantly, us as a community?

As its preferred course of action the Trust continues to consider a range of development options for both the Institute site and the Anson Field because the opportunities, the enhanced facilities and the long term financial stability that would result from them are most definitely worth pursuing.

Running alongside this is the valuable work that the Marcham Community Group is doing and we would encourage all residents to support them in their efforts. This support needs to be more than simple moral support - it needs to be committed, active support because they have much to achieve in a very short timeframe (ideally a viable business plan by the end of March) and even more to achieve in the future. And why is the Trust suggesting that we all back what many might consider to be a rival scheme? It's because irrespective of the ultimate outcome of the Trust's deliberations the Trust, like many of us, is of the firm belief that our community needs a more representative voice in the running of its facilities and the Trust believes the MCG could be at the heart of this in the future. In other words, your efforts will not be in vain whatever amenities we, as a community, eventual end up with.

Over the coming months we will keep you informed as best we can about the progress we are making and we certainly hope that we can all work together and, where necessary, compromise so that as a community we end up with the best possible outcome - one that meets the future needs of our steadily growing community and is financially viable in both the short and long terms.

May we close by hoping that you all had a very Merry Christmas, that England are victorious at the other "MCG" and that you have a Happy New Year.

Getting in shape can be dangerous. According to one report, the two most hazardous methods middle-age Europeans use to keep fit are riding a bike and playing football. Last year over 209, 000 people were injured riding bikes or playing football.
