Boundary Commission – Review of Oxfordshire County Council representation

Oxfordshire County Council currently has a council size of 74 county councillors. The Boundary Commission is proposing a council size of 63 councillors as part of its review. The reduction would ensure that the Council could still discharge its responsibilities effectively and would improve the electoral arrangements allowing a more even representation throughout the county. The proposal is to create a county “division” by merging Marcham with Drayton, Milton, and Sutton Courtenay which would be represented by one councillor. A415 Temporary Road Closure at Frilford mid September

The County Council has arranged a temporary road closure on part of the A415 whilst resurfacing works are carried out. The section of road in question is just beyond the entrance to Millets Farm (West side) through to Kingston Bagpuize House. The Road Closure Order comes into effect from

19th September, and the work is expected to last 5 days. Access will be maintained for emergency service vehicles and any residents. The alternate routes are either North along the A338 to the A420 and then Westwards back to Kingston Bagpuize, or South along the A338, through Garford towards Lyford, then back to Southmoor.

Play Area

Sadly the play area has suffered further vandalism with the metal vertical bar fencing being damaged and left in a state where it was possible that children could be injured. The fence was promptly repaired, but obviously at a cost to the local council tax payer. If anyone has any information as to those likely to be responsible then please contact the Clerk or the Police.

Abbey Shopping Centre (precinct) and Charter Area, Abingdon - Consultation

Consultation is taking place on the principles to help shape development in Abingdon town centre. Consultants Tibbalds Planning and Urban Design have produced a development brief for the redevelopment of the area. To view the proposals go to www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk. Comments are invited on the proposals. There is an online questionnaire which can be completed, alternatively comments can be emailed to planning.policy@whitehorsedc.gov.uk. The deadline for comments is 23rd September.

GARD UPDATE

The GARD Committee has not been idle! The reservoir threat remains. The challenge of ensuring that a half-sized reservoir on the same site (capacity 50 million cubic metres) does NOT appear as the preferred option in the revised 2009 plan has been our most pressing concern.
GARD's representatives and consultants have had two recent meetings with the Environment Agency, and we are due to meet Thames Water at the end of July in an attempt to ensure that the Company realizes the outcry which would result if the reservoir comes back in October's re-written 2009 plan. Meanwhile we are commenting on all the important work plans being set up by Thames Water both for the re-write of the 2009 plan, and for the 2014 plan which will be the critical one for us all. We are hoping to impress on the Company the need for impartial work by all their specialist consultants instead of contrived results such as those which were defeated at the Public Inquiry.
We do now need two reasonably technically experienced people to take over the leadership of GARD next year. I would welcome volunteers, No prior knowledge of water resources is needed as we have excellent professional advice. For further information please give me a call (01235 832077).

ANSON TRUST SPORTS FACILITY UPDATE

Readers may recall that the Directors of the Anson Trust have for some time been seeking to provide improved sports and recreation facilities for the benefit of Marcham and resolved to keep residents updated through various means including MADNews. Following a review of the existing recreation ground it is clear that there is currently inadequate space and funding to accommodate improved facilities namely a full size cricket pitch, a flat football pitch and a modern clubhouse. Consequently the Trust have identified land at Hyde Copse for the provision of new facilities on 10 acres of land that could accommodate as a bare minimum full size and modern versions of that which currently exists.

Providing these replacement facilities on an alternative site will require the release for development of land at the existing recreation ground off Morland Road. For this the Trust have been working with Taylor Wimpey Oxfordshire on the delivery of the replacement sports facility and the associated development required on the existing facility to fund the new sports development.

Both the Anson Trust and Taylor Wimpey Oxfordshire want to obtain your views on:

1. The principle of developing a new sports facility off Howard Cornish Road;
2. What additional facilities you would wish to be provided at the replacement site;
3. Do you agree that part or all of the existing facility should be developed to fund the replacement facility; and
4. How much and what type of housing do you think should be provided on the existing facility.

We therefore invite you to join us at our public consultation events to be held at the clubhouse within the existing recreation ground at the following times:

Thursday 22 September between 2pm and 8pm
Saturday 24 September between 9am and 1pm

We would welcome your attendance to let us have your thoughts on the proposals to provide a replacement sports facility, to undertake development on the existing facility and any other comments that you wish to express. ED VAIZEY WRITES...

During parliamentary recess things tend to quieten down a bit - but not this recess.

We've had riots and looting, the downgrading of US debt and the new youth unemployment figures - but it is not all bad news, particularly in our part of the world. Recently, we have had a piece of very good news. The Chancellor, George Osborne, announced 11 new Enterprise Zones throughout the UK. One of these zones is in Oxfordshire, covering the Harwell and Milton science and business parks, in an area now branded as Science Vale UK.



I have been supporting Science Vale UK for many years: it will help Oxfordshire become one of the economic dynamos of the UK by raising the profile of the many hi-tech companies based in our area, and attracting further investment and jobs. I'm delighted that the Government has recognised us but that is far from the only thing this announcement brings.

This Enterprise Zone is designed to attract businesses by providing 100% relief on rates, simplified planning and superfast broadband. Also the businesses that are already there (some of the best in the world) will be able to invest these savings (~£30m next year) into local growth, creating up to 10000 new jobs. They will recruit from our universities, pushing down youth unemployment and paving the way an innovation-led path to recovery.

I was also delighted, as the Minister responsible for getting broadband to rural areas, that we have announced a grant of almost £4 million for Oxfordshire. To help the County Council to roll out broadband to areas where the speeds are very low. I know this is a major issue for many people.

And finally, I wanted to let you know some good news on pubs. Ministers have already announced a range of policies to support pubs, including a ban supermarkets selling alcohol below cost, fairer taxation on alcohol and a reform of licensing rules. Not to mention the small business rate relief scheme. But also, the Government has launched a review into restrictive covenants - an absurd legal clause which sometimes prevents community pubs reopening following a sale - a policy that has caused over 570 pubs to be permanently lost over the last 5 years.

COUNTY COUNCILLORS' REPORT

For those who thought the proposed reservoir was off the radar, some news that won't completely surprise you. Thames Water are still trying hard to get the proposed reservoir included as a supply option in their revised Water Resource Management Plan 09. Anyone else would have taken HM Inspector's findings and done what they were instructed, but Thames Water are not going to be so compliant. I am not surprised, just saddened that the process of scrutinising the proposals on offer is so one-sided. No matter, we will not give up the fight to get the alternatives properly examined before any decisions are made. The reservoir will feature on BBC's Panorama programme in September. Local people were interviewed and it might be worth a look.

September 2011

Marcham School will start back in September with an intake of over 30 children. The school needs two more classrooms to enable it to ensure future places at this level for the Marcham catchment, which includes Garford and Frilford.

Oxfordshire County Council take the view that any extra children can go to schools outside the catchment area. I disagree. I will continue to work towards two new classrooms at Marcham School - difficult in the current economic climate - and ask that everyone in the Marcham catchment does whatever they can to support the work of the school. Marcham is lucky to have such a school and staff to go with it.

The proposed Crematorium within the parish of Garford is causing much concern to the residents of that village. The application must convince planners at the Vale District Council that it is needed, and allay the concerns of residents on visual and emissions aspects. Oxfordshire County Council officers are looking closely at the transport impacts of such a development. I can only thank the Oxford Mail for bringing the application to my attention in the first place, prior to that, it was a very well kept secret indeed!

As the harvest advances and changes the colour of the landscape in a few short weeks, we can admire our beautiful county in different scenes almost daily. We are so lucky to live in this peaceful landscape, so different from the riots of the last few weeks...!

Oxfordshire, parts of Berkshire and Buckinghamshire will begin switching to digital-only TV on 14 September 2011. The two-stage process will complete two weeks later on 28 September. This means the existing analogue TV signal will be switched off and replaced with a new, stronger digital TV signal.

Switchover is happening so that Freeview services (digital TV through an aerial) can be extended to people who can't currently get them. Any analogue television left unconverted will no longer be able to receive TV programmes after the switchover. If you already have Freeview, you will need to re-tune your TV on the day of switchover

Oxfordshire Rural Community Council will be running advice points in Didcot and Witney to help with any questions you have about switchover, including re-tuning, equipment and the Switchover Help Scheme.

The advice points are taking place from 10am to 4pm on 14th, 15th, 28th and 29th September.

A Community Led Plan for Marcham

What is a Community Led Plan?

- ◆ A step-by-step process which enables everyone in a community to be involved in – and contribute to – improving their local area.
- ◆ An opportunity for local people to take responsibility for making things happen, rather than waiting for others to do it for them.
- ◆ It is not imposed from above, but is initiated and led by local volunteers who steer their community through the process.
- ◆ It is not a magic wand, but it can make it more likely that planning decisions, which affect the village, reflect what people actually want.

Community Led Plans are a way of telling local authorities and other bodies what the village wants. The plan process is well tried and there are lots of good examples for us to follow. The plan won't come from the County Council or the District Council or even the Parish Council. It will be the community's own plan. Dozens of other villages in Oxfordshire have already drawn up Community Led Plans. If you would like to see a good example, then East and West Hanney have done an excellent job – please see www.thehanneys.org.uk/CommunityPlan

How do we create it?

We have had lots of advice from the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council on how to create a good Plan. The first stage in the process is underway: to identify the key issues for the Marcham community.

At the public meetings which were held in the village on 7th and 12th July we collected people's views on their 'Likes', 'Dislikes' and 'Suggestions for improvement'. Next we will gather the views of as many members of the community as possible.

We will use these views to draw up a questionnaire which will be distributed to every household in Marcham. We will collect completed questionnaires from as many people as possible; the more responses we get, the more powerful the Plan will be.

The questionnaire responses will be analysed and the results will be used to create the Community Plan. It will be important not to ask for the impossible, but also not to set our sights too low.

The Steering Group

A Steering Group has been set up to take the project to completion. It will be a completely independent body and its only job is to make sure that all the important issues in Marcham are included and that the views of the whole community are reflected in the final Plan.

The Steering Group has now met twice and we expect to continue meeting about once a month until the Plan is completed.

Membership of the Steering Group is open to anyone in Marcham. It is not too late to join, especially if you can offer time and skills to help complete the project.



Your village needs YOU

We hope everyone will help by telling us what their important issues are during the next few weeks, and then by filling in the detailed questionnaire when it is distributed in a few months' time.

I was set a challenge the other day by a fellow gardener, who is Italian and accordingly runs an Italian restaurant in Oxford. He asked me how to cultivate **Grumolo Chicory**... Yes I had the same reaction as you probably just did on reading the name, I'd never heard of it either...!



To avoid looking completely ignorant, I said I didn't know and would do some research and quickly get back to him.

It quickly dawned on me that he was sending me on a wild goose chase or should I say "Wild Chicory Chase!"

Like all good gardeners I have a vast reference library, and quickly found that it grows freely in Italy and survives the harshest of winters as its leaves are rosette like and grow flush to the ground. Interestingly, when they are growing during the previous summer the leaves are very much upright and only drop to the ground in mid winter.

They can cope with weedy, poor soils and low temperatures, ideal for all those sporadic gardeners out there who intersperse intense bursts of activity with spells of neglect. These are the sorts of plants that can survive pretty much everything you can throw at them.

On returning to my Italian friend with this and much more information about Grumolo Chicory, he merely said I was too slow and he had already found out. Knowing him as I do this meant he already knew, he just wanted me to learn something new that day, just how he teaches his chefs.

The moral of this little tale is never pretend you know something when you don't, you gain more respect by admitting you don't and going out and finding the answers yourself. Also, gardeners from other climates often grow different plants from us, and can often fill a much needed hole in the garden that English gardeners just can't cultivate.

Gardening is universally the same, and we can all learn something each day from a fellow gardener.


