
Dear Readers

**MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS
Annual Meeting of Electors**

The Annual Meeting of Electors will take place on Wednesday 23rd May at 7.30p.m. in Marcham Primary School. All electors of the parish are entitled to attend and ask questions or raise issues affecting the parish. The Council has arranged for Jonah Maddocks, the Emergency Planning Officer from the Vale of White Horse District Council, to be the guest speaker. He will talk about how Marcham, as a community, can be best prepared for any emergency issues that may arise. This is particularly topical and of interest, given the bad weather experienced this winter, past flooding and gas leak in the village.

Thames Water – Draft Water Resources Management Plan

Thames Water is consulting on how the company should provide a secure and sustainable source of water for its area for the foreseeable future. It plans to reduce leakages by 15% by 2025, and also take more water from the river as well as building a new reservoir south of Marcham. Anyone can comment on the proposal, and the deadline for responding is 29th April. To find out more information, and to have your say on the plans, visit www.thameswater.co.uk/yourwaterfuture.

Speed Limit – A415

Concerns have been raised regarding the speed limit along the A415 between the village and the A34. Questions have been put to the County Council about a possible reduction in speed, as other roads such as the A338 and the Milton Road, Drayton have had lower speeds recognised. It is reasonable to assume that what can be achieved in other areas should be able to be achieved for Marcham.

Data Protection

New data protection requirements will be introduced from 25th May. Councillors and Clerk have been on a training course to find out more about the proposals and how the data held by the Council will be affected. For example, the Council has contracts with allotment tenants, and has on file details of next of kin for those interred in the cemetery. A working party has been set up to look in more detail as to what the Council will have to do in order to be fully compliant.

War Memorial

The Council is looking at what can be done to tidy and conserve the war memorial in readiness for Remembrance Sunday later this year, particularly as this is the 100 year anniversary of the end of the First World War. A stone mason has been approached with a view to cleaning and restoring it including work to reseal the open joints and broken stone.

Planning applications

The Council has considered the following planning applications:

P18/V0361/FUL Erection of timber framed general purpose agriculture building at Marcham Mill. The Council had no objections.

The Council was also notified about P18/V0371/LDP An application for a lawful development certificate to convert the loft at 8 Abingdon Road. The Council did have some concerns regarding the increase in bedrooms without corresponding increase in parking, and the change of street scene with windows in the roof.

I have recently moved to Marcham from sleepy Dorset, where I was in receipt of broadband speeds of 75Mb/s through BT broadband.

I was astounded by the lack of provision when I moved my existing account to Marcham. With unreasonably poor service from BT I have cancelled my broadband contract.

Since then I have taken out a monthly broadband contract (1 month cancellation period) with Three that uses 4G mobile phone technology. It has been smiles all round on Leas Lane where I am in receipt of a much more acceptable 30Mb/s download and 6Mb/s upload speeds. This is enough for my business requirements during the day and streaming of video on several tablets and our main Smart TV in the evening and weekends.

BT need to up their game.

Can I suggest you use your Sunday morning 6am internet browsing to shop around for better provision and vote with your feet.

Significantly three of the seven reside in The Farthings. The remainder are in the old part of Marcham and the Howard Cornish estate. Comments such as 'bad connections due to rusty wiring', 'poor speeds' and 'poor customer service' are common among these contacts.

What has become apparent is that major ISPs manage better results than others.

I have been convinced that my present minor ISP is not providing a good service and have therefore decided to change to a major ISP. This should happen in late March and any improvement will be very welcome.

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse have announced a partnership to promote our area's scientific prowess. Part of the partnership includes bids for new infrastructure, which could see a new Science Bridge to help traffic around Didcot, a Didcot to Culham link road and improved cycle networks around the town. We should find out if the funds are allocated in the next few months. A pilot study on green spaces around Didcot as part of the "garden town" plans has also been started. The results of the study will define green buffer zones for the garden town development plans and help protect open spaces and pedestrian routes around the whole garden town area. This month I was pleased to host the Cycling Minister, Jesse Norman MP, in Milton Park to view new cycling infrastructure improvements, including the new Backhill Tunnel. The Government has committed £100,000 of funding to cycling safety projects, including reducing the cost of e-bike batteries through recycling used laptop batteries. I also visited JISC in Harwell, which provides broadband for all our universities and colleges, and saw the excellent new Renaissance Retirement Homes in Wantage.

The Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning group have opened a consultation of local health services (yet another one!). You can register to take part on the 'Get Involved' section of the NHS Oxfordshire website. Our local health services have been under serious pressure, particularly with the closure of Wantage Community Hospital. I encourage everyone to share their views.

In February I received 456 items of correspondence (emails and letters) from constituents. Subjects raised with me included the NHS, Brexit and free trade.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

POTHoles

*"You can turn your back on a pothole.
You cannot turn your back on a needy child."*

As we enter the end of a decade of austerity, Oxfordshire, along with many other Councils responsible for Highways, has taken some tough decisions to protect our children's and adult social services from the worst of the cost cutting - at the expense of the highways budget. We now spend less than half what we spent on our roads and Highways ten years ago. Meanwhile social service costs and demand go up and up. There is, of course, a limit to how long we can continue to do this. Roads do not deteriorate at a steady rate. After a few years of neglect, the rate of deterioration falls off a cliff. And the cost of bringing the roads back into an acceptable condition escalate dramatically. In other words, our present policy of "managed decline" is inevitably storing up more and more trouble for the future. We are, potentially, handing over a massive problem for our children.

I find this very uncomfortable. So what are the possible solutions? First, if we can actually get the Growth Deal in place, the money it gives us to develop the major road network will allow some of our present budget to be diverted to repairing the smaller A and B roads. Secondly, whilst we demand that Government gives more money to the Health Service, more money to social services, more money to environmental protection and more money to Education, we need to persuade them that there is now a major problem in underfunding of road maintenance.

Thirdly, Councils, including Oxfordshire, need to be allowed and encouraged to borrow against their assets to spend money on roads. Every pound we spend keeping a road from falling off that cliff is future pounds saved.

Without good roads, local economies cannot thrive. Building ever more houses without a safe, effective route to and from work will put people off coming to live here. It will also put off companies from setting up and staying here. Without good roads, our social services suffer as people find it harder to get to shops, to schools and to hospitals.

To bring our roads back to an acceptable condition will, it is estimated, cost more than £150 million – and that's just Oxfordshire. We cannot wait for Elon Musk to fly us about in rockets or in supersonic underground tunnels and we would all prefer not to have to risk our tyres and our suspensions every time we take to the highway.

Step one is for all of us right up to Central Government to recognize the scale of the problem. We can hide from it no longer.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

What can be done about the traffic in the AQMA of Marcham?

At the beginning of this year, Richard and I had a long meeting in the County Council to hear what conclusions Highways had reached on our traffic survey and our request to ban large HGVs, with their excessive air polluting powers, from Packhorse Lane. After all, the Vale has removed the threat of building nearly 500 houses south of Marcham in their LPP2 (Part 2 of the Local Plan) for traffic and air pollution reasons. We really thought we had a good case. But alas the message we received was not what we wanted to hear.

We are living in a very congested area of the County. The A34 attracts a very large number of HGVs travelling from the south, as it is the main north- south trunk road. En route there are various critical points where the road is barely managing to keep the traffic moving satisfactorily on it. Botley interchange is one such critical point (and incidentally it is also an AQMA). The A415, which includes Packhorse Lane, relieves Botley interchange by taking some of the heavy traffic which wants to travel west to the A420 or east from the A420 to the A34. Absurd as it might sound, the A415 with its narrow, tight bends is historically a main trunk road and County Highways do not want to remove HGVs from this road only to exacerbate the infamous problems at Botley interchange. A similar argument was put forward for every alternative route we suggested, such as steering the HGVs via Wantage instead.

The Faringdon road, which travels through Gozzards Ford and comes out on the A338, seemed to be a good alternative, as much of the road travels through open countryside with most houses set well back. But it is a B road and as such cannot legally take the weight of large HGVs, although we know many HGVs use it to bypass Marcham. To upgrade this road to an A road would be as expensive as putting in a bypass, I was told.

We made other suggestions, such as putting traffic lights at each end of Packhorse Lane which could limit the number of cars and lorries travelling through it at any one time by alternating the direction of travel. Or, we could impose a time restriction for HGVs using the lane. But every suggestion had a reasonable argument against it.

This leads me to the main point of this article which is to let you know that both the CC Highways Officer and the Vale Air Quality officer have very kindly agreed to come to Marcham to talk to you about the traffic and air quality issues around the A415 through Marcham and to give you the chance to ask your questions. You may even come up with a novel solution which no one has thought about! The meeting will be held at **All Saints' Church, Marcham at 6.30 on 4th April**. Please tell your friends or anyone else who you think might be interested in this meeting. Both Richard and I look forward to seeing you there.

Marcham Centre plans—on-site work starts soon

We are fast approaching the start date for on-site work to prepare for the building of new community facilities for Marcham. We expect the first stage of the work, archaeology to investigate the parts of the field that will be built on, to start on Tuesday 3rd April. This is a planning condition which will involve extensive excavations within a fenced-off area of the field. We will not have a clear finish date for that work until these excavations are fully underway, and therefore the start date for the main site work remains uncertain. We are planning on the basis of at least 3-4 months for archaeology work.

We continue to work through increasingly detailed of the plans for the building, with the main layout essentially agreed (with some details to be worked through). These are being discussed in a working group, drawn from the CFSG working group, the Parish Council Working Party and the MCG team, with Anson Trust and Thomas Homes.



As previously announced, the existing MSSSC building was closed for regular use from **31st March 2018**, but is needed for use by the archaeology team during weekdays.

During the archaeological investigations, although the existing MSSSC building will be used by the archaeology team during weekdays, we have made special short-term arrangements for the breakfast and after-school clubs to continue to use the building on weekdays, for Marcham Cubs to use the building for their weekly evening meetings and for Marcham Cricket Club to use the building at weekends, which may extend to the end of the cricket season. In these cases, we have agreed that these special arrangements are subject to four weeks' notice once we know when the archaeology will finish and construction can begin.

Organisations who have used the facilities are making arrangements for temporary re-location elsewhere. Anyone wishing to book for the Baptist Hall should contact Tamsin Gilbert (info@allsaintsmarcham.org).

The Community Facilities Steering Group (CFSG) will continue to oversee the project and MCG will continue to keep everyone in Marcham updated regularly on the project and will be happy to try to answer any questions that people may have as this project moves forward.

I-Spy, with my mammal eye...

Wildlife charity People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) is calling for Oxfordshire volunteers to take part in its annual Living with Mammals survey, by asking members of the public to survey a garden or local green space once a week. PTES is keen to hear from anyone in the UK who can give up some of their time this spring to help spot the likes of the Mrs Tiggywinkle and Fantastic Mr Fox.

This year, the survey runs from Monday 26th March until Sunday 24th June 2018.

Volunteers can choose any green space to survey: this could be a rural or urban garden, an allotment, a park, or a green space near to work, as long as the site is within 200 metres of a building. Once a suitable space has been identified, PTES is asking volunteers to visit this site for a short amount of time each week, and record any sightings of mammals, or the signs they leave behind, such as droppings or footprints.

Volunteers can submit their findings online at www.ptes.org/lwm, which is also home to a guide on how to spot mammals, and how to tell a pine marten from a polecat, if you're lucky enough to see one!



MARCHAM'S JUBILEE PATHS

On Dec 18th 2001 Eric Dunford reported to the Marcham Society that the routes of the Jubilee paths on Manor Farm Land had been agreed with Will Cumber snr. Eric had been in touch with the Oxfordshire County Council Field Paths Officer who was helping us investigate the availability of grants towards signs, bridges and gates. A meeting was organised for May 15 2002. Unfortunately an application to the County Council failed to provide the funding needed and a further meeting was arranged for early November. By April 2003 estimates for bridge building materials had been received. Funding was promised by the Parish and District Councils and Marcham Society agreed to contribute £200. An application was made to The Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment (TOE) who administered grants from the Landfill Tax. TOE were initially unable to consider our application before September, but grants from the Parish Council and Marcham Society meant that work on the bridges could start during the summer with the TOE funding being used for the gates at a later stage. TOE was persuaded to make an earlier assessment and a grant to cover four bridges and seven gates was agreed. Will Cumber snr had offered to provide Waymark signs and Claire Bolton started working on a leaflet map design.



By September we had received a grant from Innogy (£500) following an advertisement by Didcot Power station in the Abingdon Herald, further grants came from TOE (£750), the District Council (£250) and Marcham Society (£200), and work on the bridges started on September 11th. An assessor from the Campaign for Rural England (CPRE) visited on behalf of TOE visited and was very impressed by our proposals. Claire had produced a draft map.

We finally received £1,831.50 in grants and donations and the Parish Council, who had agreed to cover any shortfall, gave us a further donation of £395.55 to cover the outstanding amount.

Work started on the 13th September 2003 with a work-party of eight starting bridge building over Marcham Brook between Squire's Lee and Longmoor, west of Mill Road. This was finished the next weekend, followed by repairs to a footbridge SE of Meadow Farm. There was more bridge-building on Oct 4th. The final bridge was finished the following weekend with a group from the youth club joining us and a photographer from Innogy came to take some publicity pictures. We have to thank Mark Wiseman for putting several old telegraph poles in place for us to turn into bridges with planks and handrails. We were also grateful to Bill Pointer who drove to Lewknor in his van on several occasions to pick up kissing gates. The first kissing gate was installed at the bottom of Mill Rd by the Ock on October 16th. On 23rd October a start was made on the last one by the Black Horse by cutting a gap in the hedge. This was finished on the 25th followed by a few weeks spent putting in signposts. The weather throughout October was hot and dry which was great but made the ground hard when it came to digging holes for gates and signposts. The final three signs went in on the 4th December.

The paths were officially opened by Will Cumber Snr on December 6th 2003 which coincided with the 100th anniversary of the laying of the foundation stone of the Institute.

Initially Marcham Society issued a map drawn by Sheila Dunford and Claire Bolton but in 2007 we received a further grant of £318.50 from TOE to publish a printed leaflet which was delivered to each household in the parish, and is still available from Marcham Village Shop.

MARCHAM SOCIETY TALK
13TH FEBRUARY 2018

Our speaker on 13 March was George Candelin, chief bird-ringer for the Oxfordshire Ornithological Society, who gave us a very interesting insight into the history and practice of bird-ringing. At one time, it was thought that birds who disappeared during the winter spent these months in reed beds, or in mud at the bottom of lakes, until a Danish bird-watcher had the idea of winding a piece of wire around a bird's leg and wrote up his findings. A formal ringing scheme began in Britain in 1937 and years of training are needed before a ringing licence is earned. Ringing is not painful or restricting and allows worldwide monitoring of migration patterns, habitats and numbers. Weather conditions, farming practices, loss of habitats and disease can have dramatic effects on numbers. It was awe-inspiring to see the migratory routes which are taken and heartening to hear of a system of international collaboration to monitor the wellbeing of birds. JF
