Village Shop questionnaire

The Council would thank everyone who has taken the trouble to fill in and return the questionnaire regarding the use of a village shop. The forms are currently being analysed.

Marcham By Pass / A415

Following last month's article about the Parish Council writing to relevant individuals in connection with the By Pass. it has now received acknowledgements from several people and a detailed response from the Head of Transport at Oxfordshire County Council, Mr. S. Howell. Mr. Howell states "When the County Council applied for funding from the government in July 2004 the cost of the bypass was estimated at £12.6 million. Inflation since that time on civil engineering projects has been in excess of 30% so that it might be expected that the cost of the bypass now would be more than £16 million. This means that, without any prospect of significant funding from sources such as developer contributions, the scheme could only be funded with regional or national financial support.

Major scheme funding in the south east is directed at schemes which either enable regional development or which resolve problems on specific routes defined in the South East Plan as "Regional Spokes". A scheme for a bypass for Marcham would not meet either of these criteria and as such it is hard to see how it could be funded in the current circumstances.

However in recognition of the ongoing problem through Marcham the County Council does still protect the line for the bypass that was identified in 2004 and should the funding situation change then we would look to see if there was a greater chance of this scheme being successful in attracting the necessary funds. I would have to say that all the indications are that government money for transport improvements is going to be tighter rather than more available, at least for the next few years".

It does not look as though the By Pass will be a high priority in the foreseeable future. The Council does have concerns about the A415 and is meeting in April, with other parishes along the road, eg. Frilford, Kingston Bagpuize, Standlake, Ducklington etc. who have issues of their own, and will be discussing a collective approach to the County Council regarding the problems that the A415 poses.

Thames Valley Police – Rural Abingdon report

The update report on the neighbourhood shows that crime in the area still remains low. In the wider area of Cumnor, Appleton, Eaton, Farmoor, Wytham, North Hinksey and Botley neighbourhoods there have been incidents where a shed was set on fire, damage to a green house caused, damage to a wall and also a vehicle set on fire. If you can assist with information about any of these incidents please call 0845 8 505 505 or Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

Also the Police have had numerous reports of out of control dogs in Marcham. Contrary to section 3(1) and (4) of the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991, 'Public place' means any street, road or other place (whether or not enclosed) to which the public have or are permitted to have access whether for payment or otherwise. In these areas your dog must be kept on a lead as you are responsible for the dog.

At the same time as the Police were receiving reports about dogs, the Parish Council too received correspondence about dogs on the Cow Lane allotments. Would all allotment holders please read the terms of their tenancy agreements, and ensure that dogs in the vicinity are not a nuisance to other people.



Anson Trust – Public Meeting At the public meeting on 17 March, approximately 80 people came to the school to hear reports from the Anson Trust Directors, Jane Hanna (who heads the Anson Trust Working Party) and Jim Asher who gave an outline of a Marcham Community Proposal. The meeting was chaired by Malcolm Denton as a neutral observer and not in his position as Chair of Marcham Parish Council.

Mike Hoath opened the presentations along with the other directors of the Anson Trust to outline the current situation and give an overview of different options which are discussed in depth in the document available from the Secretary to the Trust and the MADWeb.

Jane Hanna spoke briefly to say the Working Group welcomed the document from the Anson Trust. The Group had met to discuss the issues and that they also welcomed the formation of a new Community Group which was represented at this meeting by Emily Nicol and Jim Asher. The Working Party will undertake the public consultation at a time when there are firm proposals to give our views upon.

Jim spoke at length about a proposal from the Community Group – which as yet is still in formation – giving historical reasons as to why it would be difficult for the Anson Trust to continue to represent Marcham's interests in building new facilities, but how they could continue to hold the land as part of the trust.

The floor was then opened up to the audience with contributions from approximately 10 people. The comments included a welcome to the Community Proposal as a possible way forward, a query as to whether the Parish Council could underpin the Trust's finances (they are unable to consider this until they are presented with firm figures), how new housing could be limited on the Anson Field were it sold (this is dependent on planning permission being granted and the Vale would apply a restriction on density of development in accordance with its current policy. Therefore the maximum number of houses which could be built would depend upon the amount of land sold (one-half of the field in the Trust's proposal)), school roll issues with increased population and a question about if the Institute could be sold with the Ex-Servicemen's Club still as leaseholders (yes it could, and their lease expires in 2010 but under the Landlord and Tenant Act they could seek a new lease). A question was also asked about the aims of the new Anson Trust Company and how they differed from the original Trust as it was endowed by the Anson sisters. The Trust undertook to give details of this and April 2010

also to answer a list of questions that had been posed to them before the meeting, but due to timing had been unable to formulate answers in time.

There are various documents on the Anson Trust website (www.ansontrust.org), the MADWeb (www.madnews.co.uk) and I will undertake to provide a printed version of as much of the documents as possible in the Post Office.

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COUNTY COUNCILLORS' REPORT

The County Council budget for 2010/11 has been agreed and will include an increase in Council Tax of 2.75% (4.5% in 2005). This is more than some would have liked, but a 1% reduction equates to something like £2.5million pounds, and if implemented, would lead to some drastic service reductions. The coming few years will be a challenge in terms of balancing the books at County Hall, as the government have postponed the Comprehensive Spending Review until after a general election, therefore leaving local authorities having to guess the levels of funding from government over the next 3 years. Oxfordshire is in a good position financially, as the reserves are strong.

Talking of a general election....one of the talking points that continues to be popular is expenses paid to elected Councillors and MPs. I have lost count of the time that somebody points a finger at me and tells me I claim too many expenses, and "You've all got your snouts in the trough!" For the record - and all County Councillors expenses can be checked by the public online - I have claimed expenses once in the last 5 years, for a Park and Ride bus ticket from Botley to County Hall. I can claim 40 pence per mile for car journeys on Council business - all recorded and again, online. I have not claimed any mileage since January 2009, nor will I again in this Council term. We cannot expect officers at OCC to tighten their belts whilst Councillors do not. That said, you won't get rich being a County Councillor!

Moving on....I ask residents of Marcham for their experiences in crossing the slip road that goes Southbound onto the A34 at Marcham interchange. Children and pensioners will use this route to Abingdon for school and shopping. Whilst it is not strictly within my division, and is almost certainly the responsibility of the Highways Agency, I will investigate what can be done if improvements are needed. Kindly contact me if you have had problems crossing this piece of road. I have had one complaint already.

The County Council is moving close to secure a new Highways maintenance contract over a longer period with a different management structure. This should mean that we can drive much more value for residents out of the contract and see many more pot holes fixed much more quickly. The contract that is ending now was not my idea of best value, and I have been more than vocal to my Cabinet colleagues over it in the past!

The Public Inquiry on the proposed reservoir moves closer by the day, with submissions of case being delivered to the Inspector. I have submitted my case - spelling mistakes and all!

The next stage in the Newbridge Thames crossing project is for the meeting of Council Cabinet on 20 April to consider a report summarising the public's view from the consultation process. Anyone wishing to speak at the Cabinet meeting needs to apply to Committee Services following the rules laid down. See www. oxfordshire.gov.uk

It is felt by many people - myself included - that a new river crossing at Newbridge without a Marcham bypass would be a backwards step. It would enable the largest lorries to use the A415 all the way from the A34 to the A40 again, thus blighting Marcham. The money for the new bridge is ring fenced for a bridge and cannot be used to alleviate traffic elsewhere at present. If we get a change of government in June and Mr Cameron becomes the Prime Minister with a clear majority, he might like to consider alternative measures for the A415. The residents on the other side of the river from us want road improvements before a new bridge is built. Ed Vaizey MP and myself will continue to press the case for a Marcham bypass.

There has been much made of possible changes to fire cover from Abingdon and Didcot and the coverage for Marcham, Garford, Tubney, Frilford and Gozzards Ford.

April 2010

I attended a fire at Netherton last week in the roof of a thatched house, nobody was injured and the building was saved from destruction, despite being distant from all local fire stations! The fire cover and possible changes will not adversely affect my division, they will enhance it overall. If this were not the case, I would not support any changes. I have had some unpleasant mail - from persons who do not identify themselves - over this issue, but that is part of the job Councillors sometimes face.

Garford Parish Plan is now ready to be viewed by all. What a great job they have done, in charting out their future. Perhaps Marcham will do something similar, it is a lot of work, but all of the community can have a say and share the workload. Give it some thought, OCC and the Vale would be happy to guide Marcham through the process of Community Led Planning.

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

I recently had a chance to catch up about our County Regiment, the Rifles. I suspect not many people realise that we have a County Regiment. If we think of the local military presence, we tend to think naturally of the Royal Logistics Corp at Abingdon, or the bomb disposal expert, 11 EOD at Didcot. But the Rifles are our County Regiment, formed over many years from



regiments such as the Ox and Bucks Light Infantry and the Royal Berkshires. The regimental historian, Gary Sheffield, lives locally in Wantage, and he is keen to strengthen the connection between the Rifles and local towns and villages, like Grove. The Rifles are the most successful recruiting regiment in the British Army. One in four cadets wear their cap badge (the bugle). They march at 140 paces a minute, compared to 120 for the rest of the Army. Every day for the last four years, a battalion from the Rifles has been serving in Afghanistan. They have suffered significant loss of life, and severely wounded. The Rifles currently enjoy the freedom of Wallingford. I hope that we can do something in other towns and villages to celebrate their achievements, and recognise the strong and historic connection the regiment has with our area.

SUMMER SUNFLOWER COMPETITION!

CAULIFLOWERS

Recession, what recession! My gardening business is busier than ever before. As such, this article is rather short as I am pushed for time and need a chance to sleep too!



I have been asked a question by a reader,

that I would like to cover here, and as it's a short question, with a short answer, it will suit the time constraints I have for compiling this article.

The Question, "We don't seem to use cauliflowers in large volumes like we use to, as it has fallen off the radar with regards to many home growers. Can you tell me what varieties, when, where and how to grow them?"

Sure can! Cauliflowers like compacted soil (but not too compacted) with lots of compost in. It likes a sunny site, but needs to be sheltered if you are growing winter types. They are thirsty plants so keep them evenly watered or you will only get small heads. To store them, lift the entire plant and hang them upside down in a dark dry place, as they will last that way for about 2 weeks especially if you spray the heads lightly with water every few days.

Sow seeds from March to May regardless what month or season they mature in, and when the seedlings have at least 8 leaves, transplant them to the area they will be grown on in. Spacing is


important, winter varieties need 3 feet between each plant and summer and autumn types need 2 1/2 feet between them. Summer varieties are small squat plants; Alpha is one I like as it

does not run to seed as quickly as other types. Autumn types can be large or squat, it depends on what you like and how much space you have. Flora Blanca is the first kind of Cauliflower I ever grew, with huge white heads, ideal for showing if you were so inclined. It harvests in September, which follows on nicely from the summer varieties that are picked during June but mainly in July. Winter types and spring types can be susceptible to frost, so you need to protect them from the worst of the elements. St Agnes is a real favourite as I often have it at around Christmas time because it crops so early, but unless you protect it, it will disappoint even at a mere hint of a frost.

That's all for now, I'm now off to put my feet up and have a well earned sleep. I remember when I used to struggle to find enough gardening work during the colder months, this year there has been no respite at all. So no winter rest for me then this year it would appear.


