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MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Parishioner of the Year Award – Last Chance to nominate

For the past 6 years the Council has awarded a Parishioner of the Year Award to a local person or people who had devoted much time and energy working within the community. The Council has been seeking nominations for the next award and believes there are many people who would be worthy recipients.

The Council will be making a decision, at its meeting on 10th February. Would anyone who wishes to submit a last minutes nomination, please contact the clerk, whose details appear below, as soon as possible, sending a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to who he/she wishes to nominate and the reasons why the person(s) should receive the award.

Council Tax 2010

The Parish Council carefully considered its budget for 2010/2011 at its last meeting. and looked in detail at its likely income and expenditure. The precept in both 2006 and 2007 was £32,000, and in both 2008 and 2009 was £33,000. The Council has started a website, undertaken work to trees in the Churchyard, contributed to clearance in the Cemetery, undertaken weed spraying, renovated the youth shelter and put tarmac under the bottle banks in Howard Cornish Road. In order to achieve all this it has spent some of its reserves. This year it has set a council tax figure of £35,000. This is a total increase of just £3,000 over a 5 year period. The Local Authorities (Members Allowances)(England) Regulations 2003 does grant the power to the Parish Council to pay basic allowances to their members. The members of Marcham Parish Council however decided some while ago to continue working voluntarily for the parish and not to claim allowances, thus helping to cap the parish element of the council tax.

Waste Collections from October

The Parish Council sent a representative to a recent meeting at the District Council's offices in Abingdon to learn about the new waste collection service which is due to start on 4th October 2010. The new scheme will follow the pattern already in operation in South Oxfordshire District Council's area. Households will be issued with four bins; green wheelie bin 240 litres for recycling; grey wheelie bin 180 litres for residual waste (landfill); green carry bin 23 litres for food waste, and green 7 litre box for food waste (in kitchen). Brown bins for garden waste remain optional, and will still cost £38 per year.

Further details about the scheme will be made available over the next few months, but it is understood that the bins will be delivered in August. Food waste biodegradable bags (made of corn starch) will be issued initially, with further supplies to be bought from supermarkets. The recycling and residual waste bins will be

micro-chipped, and waste is weighed as it is tipped, not for charging households but for national statistics. The recycling bin will now take all plastic, and cardboard. Existing green boxes can either be recycled or kept for home/garden use. Except for recycling, no waste will be collected which is not in the relevant container (i.e. no more loose bin bags allowed). Food waste will be collected weekly, and recycling and residual waste fortnightly. Anyone who is infirm and finds it difficult to put out the relevant bin on collection day will be helped by the bin men who will fetch and return. The District Council is already identifying properties where there may be difficulties, such as flats, or properties a long way from the road, and will issue more information about the scheme in due course.

Marcham By Pass

It is some time since reference to the Marcham By Pass last appeared in the press. The Parish Council wishes to keep this as a top item, and in the fore front of the minds of those who make the decisions. It is currently preparing a list of people to contact and write to in order to maintain the priority of the By Pass.

Oxfordshire County Council – Street Lighting

Some months ago articles were placed in MAD News about the County Council's proposal to switch off street lights between 12.30 p.m. and 5.30 a.m. The articles sought the views of residents. Marcham Parish Council, following the comments received, asked the County Council to leave on specific lights and asked that consideration be given to turning off alternate lights. The County Council has admitted to jumping the gun and has begun to turn off consecutive lights in certain roads. Two parish councillors are walking the village to assess the lighting situation and will be making recommendations to the Parish Council which can be considered at a future meeting. Formal proposals will then go to the County Council.



Dear Editor Update from the Anson Trust



in October, the Anson Directors have held meetings with Jane Hanna's working party, members of the Parish Council and representatives of NAF. In response to the various opinions and comments the Directors have developed a document considering the future of the Trust. It sets out in detail and evaluates seven possible options that the Trust could pursue. The document is lengthy (27 pages). It has already been made available to Parish Councillors and members of Jane Hanna's working party. The Directors want to make it available to all in the village. Accordingly, through the good offices of the editor of MAD News, the paper will be put on to the MAD News website. Paper copies can be obtained by writing to the Secretary of the Trust, Mrs Louise Butt at 8 Hyde Close, Marcham OX13 6PT.

It is expected that this paper will form the basis of future consultation about the future of the Trust.

Babies and toddlers are so natural in their response to friendly attention – they have no fear or preconceived concerns. Yet by about 2-2 ½ years, even when with their parent or carer, if spoken to kindly some frown, hide or look fearful.

This was brought home to me during a charitable day when I was helping and watched, amused, a 2½-3 year-old-boy having a great time diving under the laden tables. Suddenly appearing from under a cloth by me I stepped back saying "Hello young man" and (foolishly) ruffled his curly hair. In a voice befitting a Sergeant Major, he bellowed "DON'T TOUCH ME!" I was mortified and reflect on my grandchildren (now adults) and wondered if they would have reacted in a similar way.

I realise in this sad world of today there seems to be a need to indoctrinate children from a young age about 'stranger danger', sweets, lifts etc. But is this balanced by teaching youngsters the basics of socialisation? Fewer children walk to school these days and have the chance to chat with other adults and their offspring. Some spend many hours watching TV and computer screen and have less opportunity to converse and mix.

We are fortunate in having a such a good range of voluntary groups in the village. The toddlers in Little Angels, playgroup and the children of Marcham School do seem very happy and sociable at events.

I don't know when these 'classes' started but I notice many adults under 40 rarely smile or converse. It's refreshing when a youngster is unplugged and engages in conversation on the bus. Have other noticed this phenomenon?



ED VAIZEY WRITES...

It's relatively quiet in Parliament at the moment. The Government has a relatively light legislative programme. I am responsible for the Digital Economy Bill, which is the Bill which would introduce sanctions against people who illegally download music or films, but it is still in the House of Lords. We expect it to come to



the Commons in March, but there is a lot of doubt about whether there will be time to pass it in time for the election.

One piece of legislation that we did pass very quickly was the Video Recordings Bill. This was a unique piece of legislation, for fairly unique reasons. It was actually passed in 1984, and outlawed what were then known as "video nasties" ie pornographic or extremely violent videos. Technically, this was a restriction on trade, and so it had to be notified to the European Commission under something called the Technical Standards Directive. Unfortunately successive Governments failed to notify the European Commission so the Act was technically unenforceable. This mistake was only discovered last year, and in the intervening period many people have exploited the loophole. So when Parliament returned, we repealed the Act and then enacted it in a day - or more accurately three hours. Extraordinary. I like to think it was a fine piece of eurosceptic legislation that held out over the increasing tide of euro legislation for a creditable 25 years!

The other issue exercising politicians is whether, on election day, votes should be counted over night, or the next day. Some people have started a campaign called "Save General Election Night". Our

With such a squeeze on public finances, why on earth should local taxpayers be expected to fork out the additional expense of counting votes overnight? The votes for county and district elections are counted the next day and no one seems to mind. At the 2005 election, the result in Wantage did not come through until 6am - so council officers were kept up all night, and then presumably took the day off the next day (or more accurately that day) anyway. GUIDEPOSTS TRUST INDEPENDENT LIVING CENTRE

Do you struggle to get in and out of the bath? Do you know of someone who is a bit unsteady on their feet? If so, then you may be interested in the Guideposts Trust Independent Living Centre in Witney.

The Independent Living Centre, in partnership with Oxfordshire County Council, provides information on products and organisations to assist people with disabilities and older people to increase and maintain their independence. The Centre, based in Witney, provides this free service to any adult residing in Oxfordshire.

The Centre has a showroom with equipment for the kitchen, lounge, bedroom and bathroom and also has some mobility equipment. The centre is impartial and does not sell equipment but is an opportunity for you to "try before you buy" equipment. The Centre can also provide information on local and national retailers and "Wise Buy Guides" which provide questions to ask before parting with your money. Two Occupational Therapists are available for personal and confidential consultations, by appointment.

The Centre also has an Information Line available 01993 899985 which can give information on a variety of topics, such as where to hire a wheelchair, where to find accessible holiday accommodation, how to find a local or national support groups for a particular illness and much more.

The Centre is open 5 days a week for general viewing. An Occupational Therapist (OT) is available for consultation between Monday-Friday: 9 am to 4 pm. You would need to book an appointment to see an OT. The Information Line is open Monday-Friday from 9 am to 5 pm.

MARCHAM SOCIETY REPORT

Over 30 people braved the snow on 12 January for the Marcham Society Annual Lecture. They were rewarded with an inspiring talk by Gig Thomas entitled Miracles & Disasters: the Story of Vila Maninga, Mozambique.

Vila Maninga was set up in 1991 by a Zimbabwian couple to give support to some of the poorest of the poor in Mozambique. The premises were a derelict tobacco farm. The charity has grown into a community which provides schooling for 800 children, foster homes, care for the elderly and vocational training in skills such as farming, woodwork and healthcare. In a country where the average life expectancy is 38 years and one in four children die before their fifth birthday, the challenges are great.

Gig became involved with the charity after university, both working there and fund-raising in this country. She described the challenges the charity has faced, including the destruction of buildings by fire and cyclone and the deaths and serious illnesses faced by those who live and work there. The fact that the work continues despite all these setbacks is a great tribute to all concerned. *JF*



GROWING TECHNIQUES

Getting the most from a small to medium sized vegetable plot, can be a challenge to us all when space is at a premium.





Successional sowing of crops like radish, spring onion and lettuces, which are not great at storing for use at a later point, is an ideal way of avoid huge volumes and then voids of availability with them.

To achieve the best effects of successional sowing, simply sow short rows of each crop every few weeks. That way as you finish harvesting one row, the next row will be nearly ready.

The intersowing technique involves mixing the seeds of small but quick growing crops such as radish with the much more slow growing parsnip crop. As you may have found out, parsnips take ages to even germinate and we can easily hoe up emerging seedlings by mistake while we keep the weeds down. Sowing a mixed row of radish and parsnips allows you to quickly see the row of parsnips as the radish very soon are marking out the location very precisely, thus avoiding any hoeing accidents. By the time you have harvested the radish, them parsnips with only just be sticking their first few leaves through the soils surface.

Intercropping is similar to intersowing, but with the intercropping technique you plant rows of summer cropping things like peas, early carrots and early beetroot, between slow maturing rows of winter crops of leeks and brussels sprouts and their like. With this technique you need to make sure that you still leave enough room so you can walk between summer and winter crop for any

maintenance purposes that may well arise.

Finally, catch cropping is a good way of avoiding any ground that could lay bare for a number of months during the prime time of summer. A crop such as purple sprouting broccoli will finish harvesting possibly as late as the month of May, which is rather late to sowing many crops. But French beans, turnips, beetroot and our very reliable friend the good old radish, that all mature very quickly, can fill a vacant piece of land. As they manure very fast, the ground also becomes free for autumn digging. Although, if you believe in leaving the ground fallow or have a no dig policy, this may not be of concern.

Anyway, have a think and see if you can make your vegetable plot even more productive next year.

Dear Friends,

Events in Haiti have stirred a deep compassion in the hearts of many people right around the world. Amazingly, even many days after the initial earthquake, people are being found alive beneath the rubble. But such natural disasters raise questions in the minds of many about God and suffering.

Suffering has many causes – some is the consequence of people simply being cruel and inhuman, of being intolerant and seeing life from a very different perspective, other suffering comes as a result of illness or accident, some from poor judgement or miscalculation. Sometimes it appears that suffering is simply part of what it means to live in an uncertain world, where illness and disease are naturally occurring – and no one, whether of faith or no faith, is given immunity from suffering, and it can come whatever age we are, or whatever background.

The Christian faith views suffering as being a hard and difficult part of life which many are asked to face. Jesus was frequently moved with compassion by suffering, and eventually suffered himself terribly as a result of injustice and the prejudice of others, which lead to his death. Yet through it all he held unswervingly to God his Father, knowing that God cared, that all suffering would eventually come to an end, and that love and compassion would win through. And it did at Easter.

Such a faith does not take away the pain, the natural questions, the soul searching, but Jesus promises that he would stay the course with us, to be right there at the point it really hurts, that his love and compassion are expressions of the love and compassion of God the Father.

And suffering also stirs the deepest acts of compassion and love into action, helps keep life in perspective, enables us to be grateful for the good times, and alert to the needs and wellbeing of others. So, however difficult faith may be in the face of such natural disasters, the real challenge is how we each respond to the suffering we see.

A British psychologist has developed a formula to determine the worst day of the year. One factor is the time elapsed since Christmas, when the holiday glow has given way to the reality of credit-card bills. Gloomy winter weather, short days, and the failure to keep New Year's resolutions. It is thought that January 24th is "the most depressing day of the year." Thankfully we have now passed that date and entered into February.

Though nobody is immune to the effects of weather and post-Christmas blues, as Christians we have a resource that can change our approach to any day. **Psalm 118** recounts a list of difficulties including personal distress (v.5), national insecurity (v.10), and spiritual discipline (v.18), yet it goes on to declare, "This is the day the Lord has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it" (v.24).

The psalm is filled with a celebration of God's goodness and mercy in the midst of trouble and pain. Verse 14 comes as a shout of triumph: "The Lord is my strength and song, and He has become my salvation."

Even when circumstances hang a sign on our calendar saying "Bad Day!" our God enables us to thank Him for the gift of life and to receive each day with joy.
