




Dear Readers

Taylor Wimpey – Consultation Events

At the time of writing the consultation events advertised in last month's MAD News are still to take place. Your parish councillors will be attending these, to find out as much information as possible, in order to best represent the electorate as the issues relating to the proposed new community facilities and housing unfold. It was noted that the advertisement referred to development on part or all of the field. From early explanations by the Anson Trust it was understood that they were proposing housing on only part of the field. The Parish Council has sent a letter to the Anson Trust seeking clarification.

Vale of White Horse District Council – Register of Electors

The District Council is currently compiling the new register of electors for the area. Please complete the white form which you should have recently received via Royal Mail or register on line and ensure that the District Council is aware of who occupies your property. Otherwise you will lose your chance to vote.

Trick or Treat - 31st October

It is approaching that time of year when children can be tempted into going out trick or treating. Normally it is a harmless pastime for children, but it can also be both frightening and intimidating. Much distress is caused by unexpected knocks on the door or loud noises. Some residents may welcome treat or treating, others do not. If your children do go out, please encourage them to call only on those whom they know and to respect the wishes of anyone who does not wish to participate.

If you do get an unexpected caller, make sure the chain or door bar is on before you open the door. Do not let anyone in your house unless you are happy with their identity. If you need to talk to the police call 0845 8 505 505 or dial 999 in an emergency.

Back in May, I took part in the 3 Peaks Challenge, which is to climb Ben Nevis, Scafell Pike and Snowdon within 24 hours including the travelling time between the mountains.

Despite a blizzard at the top of Ben Nevis, getting slightly lost on Scafell Pike in the dark and being within a few inches of being blown off Snowdon, our ten-man team completed the challenge in 22.5 hours and raised £10800 (+ gift aid of over £1000) for Helen and Douglas House in Oxford. We got back unscathed and enjoyed the trip, but there's no place like home!

Does Marcham wish to lose its open green space?

By the time you read this you will have had the chance to go to the Taylor Wimpey consultation events on the Anson Trust's proposed developments. As the events take place shortly after the MADNews deadline we cannot comment directly on the proposals and we do not know at the time of writing what timescale Taylor Wimpey have in mind. Their door-to-door flyer briefly mentions building houses on part or all of the field and recreation (football and cricket) facilities.

Anson Trust sees no option other than to sell off part (or all) of the field and use the capital to buy land, build new recreation facilities and provide an endowment to cover future costs. This plan would have a dramatic impact on the character of the village and its infrastructure.

MCG, from the start, has been concerned about the Anson Trust plans. MCG is committed to basing any formal proposals for new facilities on the needs of the community and on a full consultation throughout the village. There is now a mechanism for doing this through the recently launched Community Led Plan (see p.13). Please play your part in the CLP process.

There are other options

MCG continues to believe there are other practical alternatives to that proposed by the Anson Trust, and that the local community should have a real and informed choice. The Anson Trust solution may provide leisure facilities, but these would be on the edge of the village and we would lose most, or all, of the green space in the middle of the village. We can keep the green space and provide new leisure facilities if we rise to the challenge to raise the funding as a community. Whatever we do, it should be a community decision as to what best meets community needs and it needs commitment.

If you agree that there are other ways to tackle this issue, please show your support by joining Marcham Community Group now — we plan to make a difference.

MARCHAM SOCIETY MIDWEEK WALK

Thursday October 13th.

For this month's walk we will meet at The Woodman Inn in Fernham, just south of Faringdon (Map Ref: SU292919) at 12.30 for lunch and 1.30 for the walk of about 4 miles. Marcham Society Meeting held on September 13th 2011

Our guest speaker was Ellen Lee from the Thames Valley Environmental Records Centre [TVERC] which is based at Eynsham. Her group records information all all flora & fauna of Berkshire & Oxfordshire. Ellen's special interest is native crayfish which have been a protected species since 1981.

Crayfish are active mostly at dawn and dusk; they hide in D-shaped burrows in stream banks, under stones or among tree roots. They can live for up to nine years and moult once a year in early autumn. Having crawled from their protective shell, they are soft-bodied for a few days and vulnerable. They breed in October/November, the female retaining approximately 50 eggs attached to her body until the following April when the young are dispersed. Predators are otters, mink and herons, with an especially high mortality rate for juveniles.

Collecting native or white-clawed crayfish from chalk streams was a flourishing cottage industry from early times to its decline after the second world war; the meat from the tails being a prized delicacy. Reasons for their decline have not been fully established; it may have been caused by pollution. Currently the most devastating threat to the survival of our native species comes from the escape into the wild of American or Signal Crayfish which had been imported from Oregon for use in restaurants. Some were jettisoned into ponds and streams, being too small for table use. They are aggressive, able to walk from one water course to another (as long as their gills remain wet) but worst of all they carry a fungal disease which is fatal to our native species.

Until 2006 the Letcombe brook at Wantage was a good site for native crayfish and there was a small population near Marcham mill until fairly recently. Brooks in NW Oxfordshire also show a serious decline in numbers.

Special conservation sites are being identified away from the flood plain and having no connection with any other water course, with a view to re-introduction of the native species in the future. The most pressing conservation issue is how to control the American invader.

Ellen's talk revealed a fascinating and unexpected story of an animal very few of us have ever seen or even thought about.

The Steering Group



RESPONSE TO IAIN BROWN'S LETTER:

It is good to have the support of the village in our aim to provide education for the children of the Marcham catchment and appreciate Iain Brown's continued efforts to fight our corner. However, there were some aspects of his last letter which need correction. The intake number for the school is 20: it used to be 15 until 2 years ago, when the County Council were persuaded that there were many more children from the catchment area wanting to come to the school than provision had been made for. We managed to secure a higher number of allocated places because we were able to prove to County that there was a greater need, due to the evidence from the statements of intent received from prospective parents. In the light of that, we were delighted to have our new classroom in 2009. The number of pupils starting school in September was 22, not over 30, as was stated in Iain Brown's letter. This was, of course, still more than the number allocated to us by the County, and we continue to have evidence that more than 20 children from the Marcham catchment want to come to the school. Again we would urge you to let us know if you intend to send you children to our school. There is a form to fill in which you will find elsewhere in MADnews, which really helps us to plan for the future.

As for the 2 new classrooms, we can only afford, at present, to respond to need, and are governed by external events and both local and national priorities. We await, with interest, to see the impact of these on our school but remain passionate about providing a excellent education for the children in our care.



Governors are required to play an active part in the decision making process of the school, getting involved in real issues. The role of Governor is tremendously rewarding with the satisfaction of making a significant contribution to the promotion of high quality teaching, a love of learning and knowing that children will benefit from your efforts.

In 1954 when I was a Health Sister with the Colonial Nursing Service, I was transferred from Calabar, Nigeria to Victoria on the south coast of what was then the British Camaroons - now Camaroon. I was allocated a pretty-looking bungalow in the Botanical Gardens, facing the sea with a mango tree and pawpaw in the compound.

Soon after moving in I discovered that I wasn't alone. There were rats above my bedroom ceiling. 'Put a python up there' said a friend. 'So', said I, 'when it's eaten all the rats, it might come looking for me' Tiny cream-coloured geckos would crawl up the sitting room wall and occasionally drop off. Well, any company on a too quiet, lonely evening!

Working at my desk one day beneath the window I thought I heard a slight sound above the noise of my typing, but decided I was mistaken. When I stood up, a grey snake slithered from behind some books onto the floor and remained coiled and perfectly still for a few minutes before moving slowly (for a snake) across the polishes floor and out of the door. I was unable to get a grip on the slippery surface - which may have saved my life - I shall never know! I was awakened one morning by a mouse running along the edge of my bedstead between me and the mosquito net. My Steward dispatched it, I never saw any of its relatives. A huge black spider in the bathroom didn't stay long - we never got on. A stripy tail emerging from behind a chair disclosed a large iguana. Indignant at being disturbed it scuttled off into the compound.

During the rainy season, accompanying the drumming of the rain on the zinc roof of my bedroom and the sound of the sea, would be a chorus of frogs beneath my window.

When I returned from UK leave it was to a new bungalow in Bota, a little further inland, where I had fewer 'residents' but more neighbours. (The roof of my des. res. Had collapsed while I was away.) It was there that I met Tom - but that is another story!



SEND A COW

I wonder if the above phrase means anything to you? If I add the phrase TO HELP A POOR FAMILY IN RURAL AFRICA you probably start to understand what I'm talking about.

In 1991, Marcham Church congregation actually did send a cow to a poor family in Uganda. Neil Rowe milked the precious animal before it was loaded on to a plane. Many years after, Neil found out what had happened to it. Its milk had transformed the lives of the family who had received it, and later, its offspring, given to neighbouring families under the pass it on scheme, had helped more and more families in that area.

These days, the SEND A COW people source fine animals from within Africa, and operate in The Cameroon, Ethiopia, Kenya Lesotho, Rwanda, Uganda and Zambia. The diversity and innovation practised mean that sometimes gifts will include Fruit Tree saplings; Medicinal shrubs; A fuel saving stove; Water storage facilities or all the teaching skills that are so necessary. In addition a family might receive a donkey, or chickens, or rabbits, or seeds and tools.

LOCAL WOOD SHOP ON MILTON PARK

If you use wood for DIY projects then you may like to take a look at "The Wood Shop" on Milton Park. It's a simple name for a really interesting business. The Wood Shop is run by Oxford Wood Recycling, a social enterprise that hates waste. In the shop they sell used wood that they have collected from local businesses. Their aim is to ensure that no reusable wood within 30miles is wasted. Step inside the shop and you'll find a real Aladdin's cave of construction timber, plywood, mouldings, reclaimed doors and gates and plenty of interesting pieces often with their own history as well as firewood and kindling. It's the perfect place to find timber for allotments, outbuildings, fencing and animal shelters and it's a great source of old scaffolding boards – ideal for making raised beds.

They also have a good supply of bone dry kindling and firewood produced from locally sourced and recovered wood. The people that find their way to the Wood Shop are as diverse as the range of timber inside, recent customers include bee keepers needing to restore their bee-hives, art students needing timber for a final year installation and someone wanting to build a log cabin in his garden. However, there is more to Oxford Wood Recycling than just the Wood Shop. As a social enterprise it offers work experience and employment to people who face severe barriers to employment. In 2010 it was awarded the title of European Social Firm of the Year for its work in this area.

The team in the Wood Shop enjoy helping people find just what they need for the job in hand and they know about wood. Very often people buy a higher specification of wood than is actually needed, simply because that's all that is available on the shelves in the DIY store. The idea is that visitors to The Wood Shops can wander about and discover just the right piece or the team will find it for them, they'll even cut it to size and deliver if necessary.

Does the thought of your next heating bill leave you cold?

- Grants and loans to help with heating system replacements
- Government and energy company payments
- How to switch energy suppliers to get the best deal
- Advice on fuel debt
- How to be more energy efficient in the home

Some of these improvements can take a few months to install; don't wait until it gets cold to phone.
