MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

A415 Proposed zebra crossing

Initial discussion has been had with the County Council regarding the possibility of a crossing over the A415 from The Crown across to Mill Road. Sufficient funding seems to be available for a zebra crossing. The plan for the proposed crossing can be viewed on the Parish Council's website at www.marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk, together with the formal notice for the proposal. The Priory

Manor Oak Homes Ltd is proposing to build 19 houses on the field off Priory Lane adjacent to The Priory. The planning application can be viewed on the Vale of White Horse District Council's website under reference P/12/V2447/FUL. The Parish Council will be discussing the application at its meeting to be held on Wednesday 9th January, 2013 at 7.45 p.m. in the residents' lounge, Duffield Place. The Parish Council would encourage anyone with any views to write to the planning officer, Mr. S. Walker, at the Development Control Department, Vale of White Horse District Council, Abbey House, Abingdon, Oxon. OX14 3JE or by sending an email via the District Council's planning application section of its website. Residents' are also encouraged to let the Parish Council know their views contacting the parish clerk at clerk@marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk. There will be a public participation section on the agenda at the Parish Council meeting on 9th January, and anyone wishing to address the Council is advised to contact the clerk by 9.00am. on the day of the meeting, either via the above email address or by telephoning 01865 391833.

Council Tax 2013

The Parish Council has started to consider its budget for 2013/14. However the current council tax benefit scheme is going to be replaced with a local council support scheme. The Department of Communities and Local Government is funding some of the change by way of a grant to the Vale of White Horse District Council. Government expects that Council to pass on a relevant proportion to parishes in their area, and to work with the local Parish Council. The Parish Council is waiting to see what effect

the changes will have on its budget, the parish precept and the amount of the Parish Council element of the council tax before finalising its budget.

Parishioner of the Year Award

The Parish Council back in 2003 discussed the giving of an annual award for community effort. This was to recognise the efforts of local people from anywhere within the parish who had contributed to local community life. Marcham Parish covers the wide area from the A420 in the north to the River Ock in the South and from the A338 in the West across to and including most of Gozzards Ford in the East. The Council gives the award to anyone who, at any time, has significantly contributed to life within the parish. Should there not be any appropriate nominations, then the award need not be made. The certificate is presented at the annual meeting for electors each year.

The scheme has been running for the past 9 years and the Council is again inviting nominations for the next award. There are many people who have devoted much time and energy giving to the community now or in the past, who would be worthy recipients, Would anyone who wishes to submit a nomination, please contact the clerk, whose details appear below, sending a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to who he/she wishes to nominate and the reasons why the person should receive the award. All nominations to be received by 31 Jan 2013.

Increase in rural crime

In recent months there has been a steady increase in rural crime in the area. Horseboxes/trailers have been stolen from Wootton, Sunningwell and Boars Hill and there have been burglaries in Wootton, Dry Sandford, Whitecross and Marcham.

It is vitally important that residents report any suspicious behaviour and **report this to the Police** on the non-emergency number 101 or 999 if you think a theft or burglary is taking place. Times, vehicle details and descriptions of person/s should be passed via this number as soon as you see it, which could enable us to do checks on the person/s and vehicle/s involved.

Burglars take advantage of the dark winter nights so it is advised that when leaving your house unattended to make the premise look occupied. You can do this by keeping lights on, keeping a talking radio station on and speaking to neighbours and asking them to keep an eye out on the house. After an encore ballad of a Newbury man who died from over-speed custard eating, the evening was rounded off (we had sung two rounds earlier) with the marvellous Boars Head Carol richly sung by the Waits with chorus provided by the audience in full voice.

**‘Keep Warm, Keep Well’
in Oxfordshire this winter**

Taking steps to keep warm is not just for when you are heading outside. Cold homes have a significant impact on people’s health and one of the best ways of keeping well during winter is to stay warm.

The Warm Homes Healthy People Partnership, an initiative involving community and voluntary sector organisations from across Oxfordshire,

aims to tackle the adverse effects of cold housing during the winter months and protect people across the county to stay warm and avoid serious illnesses such as flu and pneumonia.

The chances of these problems are higher if you are vulnerable to cold-related illnesses because of one or more of the following:

- You are over 60
- You struggle to find enough money for fuel bills
- You have a long-term health condition such as heart disease
- You are disabled

Follow these top five tips to stay warm and well this winter:

1) Keep the heat in your home: Insulating your home helps to keep the heat where you want it, and ensures your money goes as far as possible. Ensure your heating is set for the right time and temperature – 21 degrees Celsius.

2) Get financial support: There are grants, benefits and sources of advice available to make your home more energy efficient, improve your heating or help with bills. Financial help, such as the Winter Fuel Payment, is available to people finding it hard to meet their heating costs. For more information call **0800 107 0044**.

3) Eat well and keep moving: Food is a vital source of energy, so try to ensure you have hot meals and drinks regularly. Keeping active will generate body heat, helping to keep you warm.

4) Get a flu jab: Available free from your GP to protect against seasonal flu if you are over 65, have a long-term health condition or care for someone.

5) Look after yourself and others: On cold days, try to avoid going outdoors; but when you need to, remember to wrap up warm. If you have older friends, neighbours or relatives, look out for them during winter to make sure they are safe and well.

TOP TIPS FOR THE WINTER

How you can help:

- Offer to get in an extra loaf and some milk for an elderly neighbour,
- Ask if your neighbour has a pendant alarm and if they would like one, offer to be one of their contact numbers,
- Check if a neighbour would like you to acquire some grit for their path,
- Offer to sweep the snow away from their path
- Check if they have an alternative source of heat and light should the power fail
- Check they know what to do if the pipes freeze - where’s the stop-cock?
- Offer to let them know when you are going shopping.
- Suggest they get some provisions in for reserves
- Offer to collect prescription/arrange for delivery- remember to get enough in for any holiday.
- Check they know what events are on in the area over the Christmas period- eg WRVS dinner etc
- Offer to walk the dog!

How to help yourself:

- Make sure you have all of your contact details up to date (friends, family, neighbours)
- Try to have a little stock of non-perishable foods (tins are very good)
- Eat regular meals to help keep your energy levels up during winter
- Heating is being used more so give thought to your ventilation
- Wear plenty of thin layers, rather than one thick one
- Are you receiving all of your benefits and winter payments? Call Age UK Oxfordshire to find out.

I recently visited **105.5FM** in Swindon, an amazing community radio station that can be heard in the west of the constituency. One of the things they mentioned to me is **Weeeuse**. This excellent idea means that corporate companies can support organisations such as Swindon 105.5FM, merely through channelling their unwanted IT inventory through the Weeeuse process. Any charitable project which would benefit from a donation of IT equipment, or any institution looking to channel their old hardware through a reuse process, can read more at www.weeeuse.org. I know that Weeeuse would be delighted to hear from you.



There's another opportunity for local groups with the **Carnegie Trust**, which is launching a new project 'Neighbourhood News' in January 2013. The Trust will be seeking applications from local commercial and civil society organisations across the UK and Ireland to become a Carnegie Partner and develop new and innovative ways of producing local news. The Trust will make £10,000 of funding available to five Partner organisations during 2013. This funding will enable each Partner organisation to deliver a local news project in a clearly defined geographic area. There are many local organisations that might benefit from such funding, so please do pass the information on.

If you are looking for another way to help others, the **Charity Commission** recently contacted me because they are looking for more people to consider becoming charity trustees. Charities do a huge range of very important work and cover just about every conceivable interest, both locally and nationally so there is bound to be something to interest everyone. In fact, there are 513 registered charities in Wantage and Didcot, and you can see them all at charitycommission.gov.uk/ShowCharity. There are also charities such as Helen and Douglas House and Creation Theatre, which do great work for people in the constituency but are based just outside. There is more general information about what is involved at in being a trustee at trusteesweek.blogspot.co.uk/p/becoming-trustee. It may not be as complicated or difficult as you think, so do have a look. If you are interested, you might like to look at the trustee finder service which allows people to enter areas of interest and run a postcode search so they can find opportunities in their local area:

trusteenet.org.uk/jobs-search. If becoming a trustee is more of a commitment than you want to make at the moment, then why not consider volunteering with one of those 513 local charities?

I asked in a recent newsletter where else in the area constituents might obtain impartial advice in relation to energy efficiency. I've been told by Mike Edmunds that the **Blewbury Energy Initiative** (BEI) website www.blewbury.co.uk/energy offers general information about climate change and green energy, as well as impartial advice about improving your home's energy efficiency and installing renewable energy systems to cut your bills and reduce carbon emissions. It's run by Sustainable Blewbury, a very active local group.



At the time of writing there are still no details on the exact location of the new site the Anson Trust has chosen for its proposed leisure facilities, or of the access routes to it. It is two months since they announced in the November issue of MADNews that they would apply for planning permission by the end of October. Informal feedback from Anson Trust (included here with permission) is that they continue to make progress with their negotiations, and now expect to submit a new planning application in mid- to late January. MCG remains very concerned at the lack of any consultation.

Midfielder Fathers, playing up front for the first time for the club found the top corner with a wonder strike from 35 yards. Cousins, making his first start of the season after injury picked up the ball in his own half and ghosted past 4 Benson players before tucking the ball in the bottom corner of the goal past the despairing keeper. The Reserves lost 3-1 at home to Blewbury. A game marred in controversy after Blewbury scored a goal after Marcham had played the ball out of play for one of the Blewbury players to receive treatment for a head knock. Instead of playing the ball back to the home side Blewbury threw the ball to their striker who stuck the ball into the net!! The Reserve scorer was Leighton Jackson.

M and Q

Here we are on the threshold of a new year but as you look back on 2012, what have been the abiding memories for you? The Diamond Jubilee and the London Olympics, the incredibly unusual floods, the New York Hurricane, or the unbelievable and horrendous slaughter at Sandy Hook Elementary School? It certainly has been a year for major news events.

As we look forward to another year, what does the future hold for us? Just before writing this, I heard of supposed Mayan predictions for the impending end of the world and out of curiosity looked it up on the internet. The predictions were all geared to the ancient Mayan calendar that was started in 355BC but which ran out on 21st Dec 2012, with some who picked up on the Mayan calendar predicting the end of the world on that date. The Mayan doomsayers surmised the destruction of the world by solar flares, or an asteroid smashing into the earth, or an overload of the earth's magnetic field and a whole host of other ways that the earth might reach its end on that date. Well, we are still here. However, the Bible does foretell a time when the world will come to an end but it also says that no man would know when that would be.

What does the future hold? 'God only knows' is the common throwaway response often made when we haven't got a clue. In this case it is absolutely the right response. God is indeed the only one who knows when this earth will come to an end and more immediately he knows what this next year and even today holds for you. God stands outside of time, sees the beginning from the end and on a personal level knows your past, all that you are going through now and what the future holds. It's about trust in The One who holds the keys to the future and to life and death itself. To gain an understanding of God, what He has done for us and how He wants us to trust Him, we need to look to how he has spoken to us in the Bible.

Starting at the beginning of January and going through the year, we will be studying week by week, verse by verse through Matthew's gospel to understand more about God and what He has done for us in Jesus Christ. On the first Sunday in January, we will be seeking to answer the questions -

- *Who was Matthew?*
- *Who was he writing to?*
- *What was his background?*
- *What was the purpose of his book?*

But you might be thinking what does *gospel* mean? Well, it simply means *good news* and I'll come back to that in a bit.

Like those who predict doom in connection with the end of the Mayan calendar, the Bible too does talk much about the end of the world and Matthew records the fullest account of what Jesus said about that in chapter 24, as He spoke of *the signs of the end of the age*. However, the difference between the Mayan doomsayers and what Jesus said is that Jesus said that no man would know the date but that we are to watch for the signs. In Matthew chapter 25 are recorded parables that Jesus spoke about the judgement to come and our need to trust in Him and Him alone. This is what is meant by *gospel* – the good news of what Jesus came to do and to offer us.

One of the many things that Ruth and I did this year was to go and see Skyfall, the latest James Bond movie in which M meets her demise and Q is the young computer whizzkid who works with Bond to track down the film's villain. At Marcham Baptist church, we too will have an M and a Q. Our M is Matthew but who or what is Q?

Matthew's gospel is widely regarded as the one of the four gospels that the early church leaned heavily on, in teaching about Jesus; who He was; what He said and did and how we need to trust in Him for our future. Why not join us on 6th January, as we introduce you to Matthew and then over the coming weeks and months, allow Matthew to introduce you to the most significant man who has ever lived?

Have no fear about the end of the Mayan calendar and predictions of the date of the end of the world..... the calendar that matters is the one we use today, which started with the assumed year of Christ's birth.

As you put your 2013 calendar on the wall, why not note the 6th January at 10.30 to come and start investigating Matthew's gospel with us?

Oh and come and find out about Q too!!
