

Community Facilities in Marcham

The Parish Council has been looking at two scenarios, what happens to the provision of a hall should the Anson Trust's plans come to fruition, and what happens if the Trust's plan to sell part of the field to a developer does not progress. The Parish Council has put forward an offer to the Trust, for the Trust to transfer the ownership and running of the Anson Field, and the buildings on it, to a village charity which has similar objects to the Trust, and where the Parish Council is the Trustee. This would provide an opportunity for the Anson Trust to work with the Parish Council, and the Charity Commission to transfer that part of the Anson Trust's objects which relate to community and recreational facilities, and to concentrate on the Trust's other objects using all of its remaining assets. The Council is looking forward to the Trust's response.

A34 Chilton to Milton Drainage Maintenance Scheme

The highways Agency will be carrying out essential maintenance works to the drainage system along the A34 between the A4130 Milton Interchange and A4185 Chilton junction. This scheme aims to reduce the risk of future flooding and supports the County Council's proposed improvement schemes at Chilton and Milton. Work is likely to start in December and continue until June 2015. There will be a 24 hour narrow lane in effect with a temporary 50 mph speed limit. There will also be occasional full overnight closure of the A34 between the two junctions with traffic diversions in place. Further information can be found at www.highways.gov.uk/a34didcotdrainage

A415 – Clearance of cycle track

The Parish Council has learned that the County Council is planning to clear the cycle track. This should involve chopping back the grass areas which have taken over the tarmac, clearing the weeds etc. The work is in the County's programme, and it is hoped that it will be carried out in the near future.

North Street – The Gap – Litter Bin

The Parish Council has been planning to fund a litter bin at the junction of North Street and The Gap. Unfortunately the Vale of White Horse District Council will not add the bin to its usual collection rounds at the moment, believing that the quantities of litter at this location are not sufficient to require a bin. The Parish Council is keeping the matter under review.

Parishioner of the Year Award

The Parish Council is again inviting

nominations for the Parishioner of the Year Award. This is to recognise the efforts of local people from anywhere within the parish who have contributed to local community life. Marcham Parish covers the wide area from the A420 in the north to the River Ock in the South and from the A338 in the West across to and including most of Gozzards Ford in the East. The Council gives the award to anyone who, at any time, has significantly contributed to life within the parish. Should there not be any appropriate nominations, then the award need not be made. The certificate is presented at the annual meeting for electors each year. Would anyone who wishes to submit a nomination, please contact the clerk (whose details appear below)? Send a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom he/she wishes to nominate and the reasons why the person should receive the award.

Planning Applications

P14/V2373/O Erection of 40 dwellings with associated means of access, car parking, new footpath links, amenity space and landscaping on land off Sheepstead Road. The Parish Council objected to the application as the proposal sited the housing well beyond the built up area of the village. In addition there were known problems with land drainage and sewerage in the village as well as lack of capacity at Marcham Primary school.

About a month ago there was discussion on Marcham Village Facebook page of a perceived need to provide more facilities for the youth of Marcham, and I offered to look into the possibility of setting up some kind of youth club to meet this aim.

Since then, I have had a number of discussions with individuals who currently run youth organisations or who have done so in the past, including talking to some of those involved in running the youth club in a neighbouring village. What I have learned is that there is much, much more to it than simply finding a hall and publicising the club. Setting up a youth club will involve research and data gathering, planning, organisation, discussion, negotiation, lobbying and fund-raising.

Then the club will need a management committee, a constitution agreed by all stakeholders. Then volunteer staff will need to be recruited, organised, training will be required, checks carried out, a paid activity leader may need to be hired. The list goes on.

I have learned that setting up a youth club will require an awful lot of enthusiasm and energy to get it off the ground, but more than that it will require a huge amount of time devoted to it if it is to stand any chance of success. Over the past four weeks, it has become clear to me that although I may well have the enthusiasm needed, I simply do not have the time required to carry this through.

I feel it is better that I lay my cards on the table now, rather than put it off past

ED VAIZEY WRITES...

We've all noticed in recent years that there seem to be ever more special days and weeks set aside to remind us of particular good causes. I've come across two recently which particularly struck a chord with me.



The first was SUDEP Awareness Day on 23rd October. This day was set up by SUDEP Action, a charity which was set up by Jane Hanna OBE and which is based in Wantage. SUDEP Action campaigns to raise awareness and understanding of the risk of Sudden Death in Epilepsy. I was very pleased indeed to be invited to become President of SUDEP Action and to host an event at the House of Commons on 23rd October which helped MPs to understand both the risk of sudden death for those with epilepsy, and the relatively simple steps that can be taken to reduce that risk quite significantly. It was sobering to hear from families who had been bereaved through sudden death in epilepsy and inspiring to see how determined they are to help others learn from their very sad experience.

If you, or someone you know, has epilepsy even in a very mild form, please do take a look at the website www.sudep.org and spread the word about this important but little-discussed issue.

Adoption brings challenges, immense rewards and can make a huge, positive difference to the lives of children and those who adopt them. National Adoption Week, which took place from 3 - 9 November, made all of those points and more.

This is particularly important for children who often wait the longest to be adopted - sibling groups, children with disabilities, children aged 5 and over and children from some black and minority ethnic backgrounds. The campaign encouraged us all to think about, and hopefully come forward, to adopt these children and give them a loving home. As you'd expect, there's a website for this week too where you can find more information about adoption - www.nationaladoptionweek.org.uk/adoption. If you've ever wondered if this might be something to consider, why not take a look at that too. It seems that every day or week now has a special label or significance. Not all are relevant to many of us, but some really do bring an opportunity to highlight an important issue and make a real difference.

Community facilities – progress so far

Last month, we reported on the MCG Open Meeting and the proposals, strongly supported by those present, to work with other organisations in Marcham on plans for new community facilities independent of Anson Trust. These proposals are being carried forward by the Community Facilities Steering Group.

Community Facilities Steering Group

Four meetings have been held of the Community Facilities Steering Group, which is drawn from the Parish Council, the Parochial Church Council, the Baptist Church, Marcham School Governors, Marcham Scouts, Sports and Social Club, and Marcham Community Group. This group is working on details of a range of options and outline plans for new community facilities. The group met with the Anson Trust in October to understand their proposals in more detail.

The Parish Council has drawn up a list of all sites that could be considered as possible in principle for new facilities. These are being reviewed to understand their suitability, in terms of their location, access for parking, and potential planning issues. We plan to short-list sites likely to be most suitable and to look into these in more detail. The Steering Group has started work on the outline specifications for new facilities, so as to establish some basic requirements. We have made a good start, although there is much still to do.

The Steering Group regards communication as important and will continue to report progress towards new facilities in future MAD News editions. We will regularly update representatives of all known community organisations in Marcham about progress, and provide opportunities to become involved and have your say in the process.

We will need a range of skills and a lot of hands on deck to deliver these plans. If you are keen and available to help with this process of developing new facilities, you may have skills that we need, and we would be pleased to hear from you.

In the meantime, we wish all of you who have supported MCG a very Happy Christmas, and we look forward to a good and productive New Year in 2015, one in which real progress will be made. Let's hope that Father Christmas will bring real hope of Community Facilities to Marcham!

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT TO FRACK OR NOT TO FRACK...

The trouble with so many of today's issues – Europe, Immigration, the Environment and so on, is that there is an ocean of misinformation out there. I am one of those attempting to sail a boat across this ocean in an effort to reach an island where sensible, achievable, evidence-based solutions are found. Solutions on which I can base my opinion. Solutions I can support with my vote.

The County Council held a full meeting dedicated to the subject of "Fracking" in general and "Fracking in Oxfordshire" in particular. Having waded my way through a flotilla of placards (I may as well stick to my metaphor) demanding "No to Fracking", we then heard a number of speeches demanding "say No to Nuclear" "say No to destroying our countryside" and even "say No to wind farms". It seemed the easiest thing in the world is to say "No" to something.

However, there is an undeniable fact that in the next 10-20 years we, particularly in the UK, will be facing an "energy gap". If we wish to keep the lights on, we have to fill this gap. We are told that additional nuclear power takes too long to happen, that renewable energy technology is growing too slowly, and that traditional gas and oil supplies are running out. We are told that here is a looming threat of the UK being forced to rely on energy from politically unstable parts of the world. Saying "No" to anything which might offer a solution, or even part of a solution is simply not an option.

So in this ocean of misinformation, sensible people are looking earnestly for a few "islands" of certainty. Islands where "real, undeniable facts" are to be found. For what it is worth (and to stimulate urgent debate) here are the 5 "islands" I have found, on which I will be developing my opinion on "Fracking".

The latest UN report on Global warming and its causes I find utterly compelling. Even for those who wish to argue that global warming is not man-made, to do nothing about it is a risk I would not wish the world to take. If we do not cut world carbon emissions to zero by 2100 it will be too late. I do not want our great, great grandchildren to blame us for doing nothing about it now.

A bit of good news (lost in all the current "anti-EU" rhetoric). Under the leadership of the UK Department of Energy and Climate Change, all EU nations have just signed up to an agreement to cut their Carbon emissions by 40% by 2030. Still a long way to go, no doubt, but an initiative which will encourage/shame other nations to follow suit.

Say "No" to coal. Not here, not in Europe, not anywhere. The impact on carbon emissions alone of coal burning are unacceptable and make the current targets unachievable. It is possible that carbon capture and storage technology will advance to make coal burning an option in the future – but certainly not in time to do anything about the energy gap. Fracking has much less impact on C emissions than coal. Given the shortage of options, it should certainly be considered in the mix. Unfortunately UK geology is nothing like US geology and the amount of gas which could be economically gained in the UK could only be a small part of the solution to the energy gap. In Oxfordshire, it is likely that there are only a small handful of sites which would be suitable. For the UK at least, the answer lies in a short term mix of energy sources – some of which will make the emission targets harder to achieve but we have to keep the lights on.

We need to keep up the pressure to develop renewables of all types – wind (offshore and onshore), solar, tidal and others. Anything or anyone who impedes this is, in my view being irresponsible.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Anson Field

An extraordinary meeting was called on the 13th October to discuss how we move forward with the Anson Trust and their proposals for the Anson Field. The meeting was chaired by the County Councillor, Richard Webber, and was attended by two representatives of relevant Marcham groups: the Parish Council, MSSSC, Marcham School, Marcham Church, The Baptist Church. The MCG and Anson Trust, while I acted as the secretary taking the minutes. Clearly, I can only write a rather brief account of the meeting as some actions are at a delicate stage.

A calm and constructive atmosphere pervaded with each group being able to voice its own concerns and hearing those of other groups. A general discussion resulted in the main risks and opportunities being identified, and it was agreed that the problems of the Anson Field, and the shortage of village recreational and social facilities go back a long way - more than ten years. It was felt that the Anson Trust proposals have severe constraints and the divisive nature of these ideas must now be addressed and solutions found as a matter of urgency. Each group's role was identified and the Parish Council, as the elected body responsible and answerable to all the residents of Marcham, was encouraged to take a more proactive role in seeking a solution. Having decided the immediate actions to be taken, it was agreed that further meetings would be called in the future. So watch this space.

S106 and CIL

You will be aware that a new way of raising money from new development is about to come into action next year called CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy). It does not replace the New Homes Bonus but it does replace much of the S106. I think that many of us have been very disillusioned by the way the latter has worked, as the village's desires on how to spend the money raised from new developments in their village seems to be considered last, and therefore we are not getting the infrastructure in our village that we know we need. Clearly localism is not working. So it is with some pleasure that I can report that CIL will give the Parish Council complete control of at least 15% of the funds raised! (25% if you have a Neighbourhood Plan). Furthermore, this money is non negotiable! So at last we have some say over what we want for our village.

The Local Plan for consultation

We now know that Milton Heights has been spared the prospect of expanding by 1400 homes from its present 200. It may be small comfort, but Marcham too, has been spared a further 200 homes south of Packhorse Lane. Milton and Marcham's gain is at the expense of north Abingdon and the Green Belt. The AONB area (area of outstanding natural beauty) around Harwell is also under severe threat. VWHDC is accepting the entire SHMA (Strategic Housing Market Assessment) figures in an effort to get its Local Plan accepted more quickly. This, they argue, will protect us from future speculative planning applications. The County Highways department have said that the road network can cope. We need to hope that they are both right!

It is a moot point whether or not the damage will already have been done before the Local Plan is in place.



A FRIDGE ON AN ICE CUBE?!



On 12th November, we saw on the news euphoric scenes at the European Space Agency, when after 10 years travelling through space, the Rosetta lander Philae (the size of a domestic appliance) touched down 4 billion miles from earth, on comet 67P that was moving at around 84,000 mph. One online cynic quipped "*we spend all that money, time and expertise to land a fridge on an ice cube!!*" But while this was undoubtedly an amazing achievement in scientific and engineering terms, I'm sure the online cynic was not the only one to wonder - *Why?*

The news broadcasts gave us a clue when they commented about the supposition that billions of years ago, comets could have brought water to an ancient and rocky dry earth water that scientists see as essential to the self genesis of life. The news broadcasts also mentioned the possible discovery on the comet of organic molecules, the building blocks of life that evolutionists think could have seeded life on earth.

Water covers 75% of the earth's surface and its deepest point is 11km below sea level. According to the US Government Water Science School website, there are around 1.4 billion cubic kilometres of water in, on and above the earth. So, if our water were to have come from comets, I wondered how many crashing into an early earth it would have taken. Comet 67P is reckoned to be comparatively large at 4.1 x 4.3 x 3.5 kilometres - roughly 62 cubic kilometres. Scientists' investigation into the data so far sent back by Philae lander indicates that when they tried to drill into the surface of the comet, it could only penetrate a few millimetres. Maybe this indicates that it is not solely ice but possibly also contains significant amounts of rock..... But even if 67P is all ice, it would have taken 22 million comets of the size of 67P to have provided the water on earth. Is that really plausible ???

But what about the possible discovery of organic molecules on comets molecules that some consider could have started life on earth organic molecules that Philae lander possibly 'sniffed' in comet 67P's atmosphere? But even if the supposed basic building blocks for life on earth could have come from comets, it's a huge leap from that to even a basic single celled creature capable of self replication..... and if that huge evolutionary leap were not big enough, imagine the transition from single celled creatures to human beings!!unbelievable with the huge complexity of the human body. But it's not solely the question of physical change that is the problem.

Every cell in your body teems with DNA - essentially a storage mechanism for the intelligent information that gives each cell the ability to self-replicate. But is it reasonable that this information came from lifeless, inanimate matter? Surely only an intelligent mind An intelligent Creator could give rise to intelligent information?

And what about human intelligence?Where did our ability to think come from? And what about our emotions and our creativity? Is it really reasonable that you and I, with our ability to reproduce, to think, create and love originated from organic molecules from outer space, that came from lifeless matter out of nowhere?

Many scoff at the existence of God because He cannot be seen, or empirically tested. But this massive universe and life on earth, with all of its interrelatedness, complexity and intelligence can only be explained in one of two ways.

1. as The Bible says '*in the beginning God created the heavens and the earth*' and that after creating everything else '*God created mankind in his own image*' Some might call that unbelievable
2. Or the alternative of gradual evolution from ape-like creatures that gradually had mutated from more primitive life forms that had developed from organic molecules which had self-generated from lifeless matter that came from nowhere created by nobody..... now **that** surely is fanciful!!

Emotions, will, intelligence and creativity surely cannot come from inanimate matter nor life from non-life?

God is loving, creative and intelligent and He created mankind in His own image, not that He has literal hands, or eyes but creating us in His image, essentially means that we too have the ability to love and create and think as He does. It was God who gave those space scientists the intelligence and the creativity to achieve what they did in landing on Comet 67P, as well as the obvious emotions shown as they leapt in jubilation at their success.

Do join us for our carol service on 21st December at 10.30, to sing some traditional carols, eat some mince pies and celebrate the incarnationthe arrival of God Himself in human form, born as one of us, ultimately to point the way into a restored relationship with our Creator.
