Architect Dame Zaha Hadid died suddenly in March 2016, aged 65. She was born in Iraq, but made Britain her home early in her career and received the UK's most prestigious architecture award in both 2010 and 2011. Her reputation was global - this lecture maps her career from the visionary projects of the 1980s, through the years when her designs were considered unbuildable to the prolific crop of successful international projects built in the last decade of her life.



MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Marjorie Evans

The Council was saddened to hear of the death of former Parish Councillor, Marjorie Evans. Marjorie served, not only on the Parish Council for a considerable period of time, but she also served as the Councillor for the Marcham division on Oxfordshire County Council. See obituary page 5.

Grants from the Parish Council

The Parish Council has adopted a new grant policy for awarding grants to local worthy organisations. A copy of the policy itself is available for viewing on the Parish Council's website, or available from the Clerk. The Council now has a grant application form too, which it requires to be completed when an organisation wishes to apply for a grant. This is a change from previous years when a letter of application was sufficient. The application form is available from the Clerk, so any organization wishing to apply for a grant should email: clerk@marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk to request a form. The Parish Council will continue to consider grants once a year in November, so all grant application forms together with relevant accounts have to be received by the Council by 15th October.

Play Area and Youth Shelter - Litter Bins

Unfortunately the litter bins in the play area and at the youth shelter in the Anson Field have had soiled nappies and cat litter as well as other household refuse deposited in them. These bins are for general light pedestrian litter only, and not for domestic waste. Depositing household or trade waste in the litter bins can be regarded as fly-tipping, and can lead to action being taken by the Local Authority. Would residents please dispose of such items in their own black wheelie bin.

A415 - Vehicle Activated Signs

Several people have mentioned that the vehicle activated signs at the both ends of the village along the A415 are not working. These have been reported to the County Council.

Emergency Plan

After the excellent presentation by the County Council's emergency planning officer in May at the annual meeting for electors, the Parish Council has been considering whether a formal emergency plan should be prepared. One of the requirements is to have a convenient reception centre in case of evacuation. The Council has deferred the idea of preparing a Plan for the time being, as any new village hall would probably be the reception centre. It will review the idea of an Emergency Plan once Marcham has a village hall.

Street Naming

The Parish Council has been asked by the Vale of White Horse District Council to suggest street names for the new developments in the Anson Field and at the Institute site. If anyone has suggestions that they would like to be considered, then please contact the Clerk.

Planning applications

P18/V1472/HH Installation of vehicle and pedestrian gates at Pendlewood. Council supported the application but sought confirmation that the gates were opening inwards.

P18/V1570/HH and P18/1563/LB Variation of condition and amendments to previous consent at Marcham Mill. Council had no objection.

Marjorie Evans: *kind, calm, intelligent, sensible, loving, bold, welcoming, vivacious, sociable, warm and cheerful.*

Marjorie was born at home in Boston in Lincolnshire on 8th December 1930 - the only daughter of Wilfred and Florence May Wright. Her father was a Bank Manager for the National Westminster Bank or National Provincial Bank as it was called then, and as a result, he was posted to different banks across the country during the course of his career: Stevenage, Folkestone, Newton Abbot and Exeter but it was Devon that Marjorie called home, and where she spent most of her childhood.

Her love of gardening came from her father, who was also an avid bee-keeper and once sold a pot of honey to Winston Churchill at the Royal Kent County show. He commented on how rosy her cheeks were – or so the story goes....

Marjorie used to look after the various children who had been evacuated from London down to Devon during the war. There was one particular evacuee, a boy who she called “Little John” who had a lisp and a stutter. Unfortunately he was being picked on by the other children but Marjorie took him under her wing and helped him to stand up for himself, and find his voice. Mum and “Little John” became firm friends for life after that.

After leaving Bishop Blackall School in Exeter, she went onto Exeter University where she obtained a First Class Honours Degree in Geography. Something that she was always, quite rightly, very proud of. After University, she went to teacher training college in Stoke Rochford Hall in Grantham in 1953 and she spent 5 happy years there training to be a teacher. Then down to London to Goldsmiths College, where she trained to be a lecturer. It was whilst working as a lecturer at Kestervan College that she completed her PhD on the Hanseatic ports in only two years whilst working at the same time.

Marjorie continued to teach and lecture in Geography for a number of years after that and then in 1966 she decided to spend the summer in Canada and accepted the position of visiting professor at McGill University in Montreal. She was also “Dean of Women” which meant that she had responsibility for a ladies-only hall of residence. She quickly became an expert at comforting girls who were homesick or who had boyfriend troubles.

It was during the summer of 1966 in Montreal that Marjorie met her future husband, Ellis. He was wandering around the campus completely lost and she offered to show him around. That afternoon they went to a fete together in the little village of St Anne-de-belle-vue ... the beginning of a long and happy marriage!

They returned the following summer to Vancouver as visiting Professors at the University of British Columbia and they were married in Newton Abbot in December 1967, subsequently moving to Beckenham in Kent where Elizabeth was born in 1971.

Marjorie worked as a District Inspector of Schools and Ellis worked as an Educational Psychologist, both for the Inner London Education Authority.

In 1981, Marjorie accepted a job with the NFWI as Principal of Denman College and the family moved into the Show House in the new Farthings development. A gate was quickly knocked through the old stone wall in the back garden so that she could have a quick walk to work! Before long Marjorie had made friends and was fully immersed in the Marcham community. After a couple of years at Denman, she taught Geography at Headington School and then accepted a job at the University of Oxford, Delegacy of Local Examinations as Senior Subject Officer for Geography, which was the role from which she retired in September 1994.

Despite having a busy and fulfilling career, Marjorie would always make time for Marcham. One of her first achievements was to build a new play area for the village which is still loved by children and parents. She played a key role in the tree planting in the Millennium Arboretum and, in her role as Chair of the Parish Council, she campaigned tirelessly for a bypass for Marcham. From 1997 to 2001 she was a Conservative County Councillor and was also Chairman of Governors for Marcham Primary School for several years. She loved the community at All Saints' Church and would regularly read intercessional prayers and spent several years organising the flower rota. She always strived hard to improve Marcham for all its residents and to support the community's growth and prosperity and was thrilled to be awarded Parishioner of the Year in May 2016 in recognition of the many contributions she made to village life over the years.

Ellis died in January 2008, and Marjorie's health declined but she was able to stay in the home that she loved so very much with the support of her carers, family and friends .

Marjorie loved many things: her home and garden, Marcham and the community here, her many cats over the years, chocolate (of course), Wimbledon tennis, Archeology, the Royal Family and especially the Queen, but what she loved most of all, without question, was her family.

Marjorie has lived in Marcham for many years and has been involved in village life from the outset. She has shown a passion and commitment to improving the lives of parishioners of all ages, from being instrumental in seeking a better play area for children, providing more play equipment, an active proponent of the tree planting in the Millennium Arboretum, to being actively involved as a parish councillor for over 25 years. She was chairman of the parish council for several years and served on different working groups sorting out the various issues that arose.

Marjorie entered local politics when she was successfully elected as a county councillor for four years in 1997. She also served for many years as a governor of Marcham Primary School, and held the role of chairman of the school governors for several years.

Marjorie is a passionate and a generous parishioner who has the ability to think strategically, and would often suggest an innovative and ingenious solution to a problem. She has always strived hard to improve Marcham for its residents, and to support its growth and prosperity.



Introducing Oxfordshire South and Vale Citizens Advice

We recruit and train local volunteers to provide free, expert advice and information to everyone in the community. Our support helps people to overcome their problems and improve their lives. We put the emphasis on helping people to help themselves, giving them more control over their own affairs and sometimes also, in the process, helping to improve their health.

Winter 2018 Flu Vaccinations at Marcham Road Health Centre

This year the NHS is providing different flu vaccines for different age groups. This will mean that flu clinics will have to be arranged by age to ensure each patient receives the correct, most effective vaccine for them.

STAY WELL THIS WINTER

As the NHS guidance to the practice was changed late in the day there will be a national difficulty for surgeries and pharmacies to get flu vaccine supplies. Delivery of vaccine stocks are spread from late September until November.

This may mean that you have to wait to have your vaccination. We have been asked to vaccinate those aged 75 years and older as a priority. Text messages and letters will be sent advising individuals which flu clinic to attend.

Unfortunately, owing to the complexity of the programme this year, we will not be offering vaccinations outside of designated flu clinics. This means that if you are attending the surgery for a routine appointment, you will not be able to receive your vaccine at that time. Also, if you attend the incorrect clinic you will not be able to receive your vaccine at that time.

We would greatly appreciate your patience and understanding regarding this matter and apologise for any inconvenience or frustration this may cause.

Marcham Centre—project progress

MarchamCentre — project progress

The project to build new community facilities—Marcham Centre—continues to make progress, although it is taking a little longer than we hoped to make a full start on the construction phase.

We have had to resolve some matters relating to planning and section 106 funding with the Vale of White Horse planning department, partly due to the complexity of the project. Fortunately, none of these are show-stoppers, but they have led to extra work which caused us some delays, which are being cleared. The current timetable is for site work to begin in autumn (subject to contractor arrangements) with a target completion date of late 2019.



MCG trustees are meeting regularly to make progress with the final hall design details, lease and service agreements, arrangements for external storage, fund-raising plans, hire and pricing policies, business planning including setting up a trading company to work alongside the charity, risk assessments, licences, insurance, and contracts for utilities and services, maintenance of the field and boundaries.

Much of the detailed work is being delegated to the three committees of MCG: Hall Committee (Chair: Chris Ricketts—chris.ricketts47@btinternet.com), Field Committee (Chair: Trevor Hill—trevor3chancel@aol.com) and Finance & General Purposes Committee (Chair: Warren Brooker—WarrenBrooker@outlook.com). The three Chairs have made good progress identifying people to join these committees, and there are still some seats to fill.

We are keen to have people drawn from across a range of interest areas and, especially, to involve people who have recently moved to Marcham who may have skills, experience and new ideas that we would value. Warren is new to Marcham and brings valued business experience and ideas. Please contact Jim Asher (as below) or the relevant committee Chair if you would like to know what is involved.

The Community Facilities Steering Group (CFSG) continues to oversee the project, with MCG increasingly the focus for the actions. We will keep people in Marcham updated regularly on progress and will be happy to answer any questions you may have about this project.

We are keen to recruit more members for MCG. This helps to support our case for external fund-raising to complete/equip the new facilities. Annual subscriptions are £5 (single) and £8 (family). Thank you also to all those who have been collecting 5p coins to donate to MCG— we are nearing the 10,000 coins mark! All Life Gets A Thirst

I'm writing this in the middle of another heatwave – 2018 looks like it's going to be a long and hot summer. I'd need to check the data, but I personally compare this to the summer of 1976. Who remembers the population explosions of ladybirds and thunder blights?



We're not seeing that this summer, although the hot weather is making it clear what plants like the conditions. There's one thing I know though – most life still needs the wet stuff, H2O, water!

This morning I spilt a cup of water on my concrete path, and almost immediately a wasp landed and started to drink. I could almost see its excitement as it kept returning. It got me thinking, we need to make sure there is water available to wildlife in our gardens in hot weather. We also need to remember that wildlife easily becomes dependent on that water source. So to stop putting it out could be catastrophic.

So where is the line between helping nature, and making nature too reliant on us? Artificially propping up and distorting populations of birds, insects and other creatures? Are we keeping some animals alive, that would naturally die out? Should we be preventing all extinctions, or is that part of nature in and of itself? The panda for example, is a kind of evolutionary dead-end, not really helping itself by low birth-rates and specific habitat needs.

My point, well, it's to start a debate about when man gets involved with food chains, like those found in wildlife gardens. How far should we go in helping nature?

Is what we perceive as helping, something to the contrary?

Speeding After receiving complaints from residents I carried out a speeding survey at the White Hill farm turning on the Cumnor Road about 250 yards from Henwood. I carried out the survey on Tuesday 10 July 10am–11am as the visibility and conditions were good. I put the Speedwatch cones out and I was in a marked PCSO car. 87 vehicles came past during the survey of which 75 were travelling at over 35mph and 12 were under 35mph. Of the 75 that were speeding ten were going over 50 mph with the top speed of 62mph. It appears that with the lighter traffic the higher the speeds. (I checked the calibration of the kit as this is a really high figure for speeding). This information has been passed onto Traffic Management who will be sending a speed check van down in the near future.

Drug use I have had reports of drug use in the woods at the bottom of the playing fields in Wootton. High visibility patrols will be increased in the area. If you witness this or have any information please call 101.

Phoning the Police Our call handling teams are receiving a large number of calls and many of them are not police related. 999 is an emergency number so please think:

- Is it an emergency?
- Is it a police matter?

If it is not an emergency please call 101. Other agencies would also be better suited to deal with some issues. For example you should contact Environmental Health for noise issues, Trading Standards for rogue traders and the Highway Department for potholes etc. Finally if a car is parked on a road, and as long as it is taxed, insured and has a valid MOT and is not causing an obstruction or going against any parking restrictions (like yellow lines) it will be parked legally. Organising a Funeral

If you have to organise a funeral for someone and there are no clear instructions in the will, bear in mind that you can organise the procedure without using the services of a funeral director. The Cemeteries and Crematorium Department of your local authority can offer help and guidance, and there are many sources of help online, for instance the Natural Death Centre at www.naturaldeath.org.uk. At the current time, when the high prices charged by funeral companies are under government investigation, an alternative funeral can also cost much less. If you're on certain benefits you might be able to get help paying for the funeral. Citizens Advice has guidance for people planning a funeral for themselves or their near ones:

- Shop around and get quotes from local funeral directors. These quotes can vary surprisingly, sometimes by as much as £2,000. Also, try asking for a "basic funeral" and get the costs itemized so you can see what you are paying for.
- Choose "direct burial" – that way, there is no need to pay for embalming or visiting rights.
- Purchase a biodegradable cardboard or cloth-covered coffin, or a wicker basket.
- A woodland or "natural" burial site is an option. There are 200 of them around Britain and several in Oxfordshire.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Privacy, Openness and Transparency

Last week, we met a friend, to whom we have not spoken for some time over the garden wall. We spent a happy twenty minutes catching up. Within the hour, we received a phone call from the same friend to tell us that she had just received a message from Google asking her to rate her visit to Orchard Barn (our home). The first reaction was to laugh, the second was to wonder how Google knew of our conversation. The third was to realize how much Google (and others) can find out about us via mobile phones, emails and social media. There was absolutely nothing in our conversation which would have interested anyone else, but it was a private conversation. It's a scary world.

Whilst I believe passionately that privacy is an important principle that we should do everything possible to protect, privacy is too often a defining principle in Government – both national and local. On a recent visit to Nottinghamshire County Council to find out how they run themselves, we were told that they are now passionate about openness and transparency. Everything they say, think and do is put in the public realm. No more secret papers. All salaries, plans for the future and failings of the Council are published alongside their successes. The only papers kept from public view are those that concern commercial confidentiality (while bids for contracts are coming in) otherwise everything is open to public scrutiny. They claimed that this approach had already had three major benefits.

- One:** There was a noticeable increase in trust of their Council by Nottinghamshire residents.
- Two:** There were now no time-consuming and costly Freedom of Information requests.
- Three:** Their relations with the local Press had improved immeasurably.

To be fair to Oxfordshire, it is probably more open and transparent than many local authorities. Its new Corporate Plan will contain not only a list of the Council's successes, but also a list of its failures and what it intends to do about them. This is all commendable. Not so transparent are the conversations around shared services and management with Cherwell District Council, or the discussions around the Growth Deal and the Oxford to Cambridge Expressway.

Until Government treats those who elected it as wholly deserving and capable of being involved in discussions and considerations of policy, they can hardly be surprised if they are not trusted.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

What should we do about disposing of our bulky rubbish?

Waste, particularly large stuff like furniture, is a constant problem for residents, who don't want to pay for their waste to be removed, and for the Vale, who have to deal with the result of those people who resort to fly-tipping. So, I thought it would be useful to know what to do with different types of rubbish, particularly as I understand that recently some large items of rubbish were left outside a house in Marcham for several weeks.

Bulky waste, such as washing machines, fridges, freezers, furniture (like sofas), mattresses, televisions can be disposed of by the Vale, but will need to be booked for collection by the waste team (01235 422406) and will need to be paid for. The cost is £36 for up to three bulky items and £7 for each additional item, but there must be no more than six items per collection.

The Vale has had some success in catching and prosecuting some people who have resorted to fly tipping....a particularly underhand method of getting rid of rubbish, not least because it is an eyesore and a health hazard for those who live nearby. Recently, a man was ordered to pay just over £1,300 for dumping two mattresses outside the Sue Ryder shop in Abingdon. Another man, who was caught on camera when he dumped 70 wooden pallets in Cumnor, was fined £1,200.

So can I urge people to use the Vale waste team to dispose of their bulky rubbish and not to risk the big fines that can be levied on those who resort to fly-tipping?

REPORT FROM GARD - AUGUST 2018**Thames Water concede the case for a second public consultation on their plans**

On 10th August, Thames Water issued a press statement conceding the case for a second public consultation on their revised draft Water Resources Management Plan 2019-2024 (known as rdWRMP19). They also announced a month's delay until 'early September' in producing the revised plan, which will be published alongside their response to all the public comments (individual and organisational) which they received in the first consultation which closed at the end of April.

This action by Thames Water is as a direct result of the pressure from Oxfordshire organisations, led by GARD, in demanding the right for the public to look again at Thames Water's plans, as it was obvious from the shambles of the first plan that they would be forced into making deep changes, and not just minor revisions. GARD, Oxfordshire County Council, Campaign to Protect Rural England, Wantage and Grove Campaign Group and Steventon Parish Council all wrote to the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Michael Gove) putting a strong case that Thames Water must be forced to consult again. This call was heeded and it is a good example that public pressure works when we all work together. GARD would like to thank all the organisations for their support, and also particularly to Councillors Mike Fox-Davies (Steventon and Hendred) and Richard Webber (Drayton and Sutton Courtenay) for leading the County Council's campaign, and our MP, Ed Vaizey for his support in intervening with Michael Gove. The second consultation will last for 8 weeks. We now await the details of the new plan. GARD will be tackling the new plan, and looking particularly to see if it remains shrouded in secrecy as to how projects are compared on cost, and how decisions are made. If we find that the transparency of the plan has not improved (and hopefully it will have since both Ofwat and the Environment Agency asked for more transparency), then we are almost certainly going to join the Vale council in demanding a Public Inquiry. It is regrettable that the actions of Thames Water force these conclusions – it remains to be seen if they have had a culture change, or whether they must be dragged into a legal process in order that Oxfordshire's citizens can be protected.

We of course do not yet know the contents of the revised plan, but we do know, from statements by Thames Water on TV (ITV Meridian news - 10th August) and in the press (Oxford Mail - 10th August) that the mega-reservoir is still the centre-piece of their plans, and may even be advanced in time to be begun in 2030. GARD will be fighting such proposals every inch of the way, and insisting on an honest, level-playing-field comparison of options.

Thames Water finally forced to take action on leakage

Another snippet we know of the revised plan is that Thames Water have finally committed to a proper plan to reduce their appalling leakage. They are committing to reduce leakage by 50% by 2050. They have been forced into this commitment by the water regulator Ofwat, who finally lost patience with Thames Water's leakage programme, as leakage has actually got worse in 2016-2017 (going close to 700 million litres per day for the first time). Ofwat's report concludes that the failure to reduce leakage has little to do with the difficulty of the task and is mainly due to Thames' poor management, and lack of Board-level commitment to the leakage programme. In order to avoid a massive fine for missing the leakage target, Thames have had to commit to the Ofwat target of 15% reduction by 2025, and a 50% reduction by 2050. If this 50% reduction is met, it amounts to a saving of 300 Million litres per day of water, equal to the amount which the proposed reservoir

would supply. So, local residents would be right in concluding that the case for the reservoir would be even harder to justify.

GARD New Committee

Chris Tooley – elected as Hon Treasurer

Nick Thompson, the Hon Chairman for over a decade and Hon Vice Chairman for the last two years, has stepped down as an officer, but remains on the committee. He was thanked by the meeting for his tireless contribution over the many years. In particular we are all indebted to him for his leadership which saw GARD win the Public Inquiry in 2010. Lesley Hotchin also stood down as Hon Treasurer, and was thanked for her work over the past year.

The other members of the new GARD Committee are Sharron Jenkinson, Ian Moodey, Nick Rogers, Clare Tooley and Wren Wooster.

Joining GARD

It is clear that we still have a fight on our hands to defeat the Reservoir project and ensure a sustainable water future for Oxfordshire and the South-east.

Our membership continues to grow, but we need even more members. At some point it will become very important to demonstrate the strength and depth of the local opposition to this plan, and, of course, we do need 'boots on the ground' to help push the message across.
