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

Parishioner of the Year - Reminder

The Council is again considering the possibility of an award for 2021, to be presented at the annual meeting of electors should one be able to be held later in spring. The Award recognises the efforts of local people who at any time, have significantly contributed to life within the parish. The Council would invite anyone who wishes to put forward a new suggestion, to submit a short statement of not more than 200 words, as to whom he/she wishes to nominate, and the reasons why the person should receive the award. All nominations to be emailed to the Clerk at the email address below. The Council, owing to Covid 19, was unable to give an award for the past 2 years, and the names of those previously nominated will be carried forward and considered this year along with any new nominations.

Council Tax 2022/23

The Parish Council considered its budget for 2022/23 at its January meeting. It is requesting £71,500 from the Vale of White Horse District Council to help with the costs of the parish. This sum is shared between the council tax paying properties in the parish. This element of the Council tax is currently £75.40 per band D property. This will rise slightly by an increase in the region of £1.36 next year making the amount payable £76.76 The budget can be found on the Council's website www.marchamparishcouncil.gov. uk. As well as needing to undertake regular maintenance, and grass cutting within the village, the Council has set aside funds for awarding £6000 in grants to organisations that support the parish, and £5000 towards the costs of undertaking a Neighbourhood Plan. **Play Area**

The Council has a working party looking at the play area in the Anson field, and considering how this could be improved to cater for the growing village. The group will be meeting, remotely, approximately 6 weekly in order to progress ideas. If there is anyone interested in being actively involved in planning this area then please contact the Clerk.

Marcham Mill - Bridleway 17

The County Council has advised the Parish Council that work is set to commence on the repair and reconstruction of the bridge this spring, as soon as the water levels have

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reduced and stabilised. At present, the plan is to have the bridge reopened this summer. As soon as the County Council has firm dates for the commencement of the work they will let the Parish Council know.

Planning Applications considered by the Council

P21/V2520/FUL Amended plans for the demolition of existing buildings and erection of a 6 bedroom dwelling (C3b) for people with highly complex disabilities at the Baptist Church Packhorse Lane. The Council maintained its earlier concerns regarding access, drainage and materials to be used.

Dear Editor

Neil Rowe responded in 2020 and gave a good outlook, but the un-named response in January 2022 MADNews is unacceptable. Thomas Homes, were introduced to the villagers at a meeting, prior to any development starting, as a very professional company supporting the village financially for the Anson Trust to provide a new village hall and sports facility.

Thomas Homes have possibly made good money building all the houses, flats and the village facilities on the land and building bequest by the Anson sisters to the village. The Anson Trust says that Thomas Homes are responsible for the care and custody of the sundial.

Under these circumstances they, Thomas Homes, should show their responsibility and interest in the village by replacing the sundial, at their expense, before the Anson Trust, the Trustees of the village heritage, claim on Thomas Homes insurance.

Was the theft reported to the police and a crime number issued? Was the Anson Trust and the Parish Council informed of the theft?

I have been told that the Parish Council has no knowledge of the sundial and its replacement, but they are the ones issuing the planning permission that says the facade of the Institute has to be left at the end of building as original.

The Anson Trust should be claiming replacement from Thomas Homes insurance. It must also be part of the council's remit to be responsible to see that planning consent is adhered to! **BRIAN HARROW**

The Silver Thread: Silver Filigree and Traditional Arts of Kosovo

From the early Kosovan silver mines, which are mentioned in Dante, a silver thread winds through Kosovo history. Its most intricate tanglings are in the country's cultural capital, Prizren, where a seventh generation of filigree artisans use 'filum' and 'granum', zigzags, 'mouse-tooth' into magic lacy creations from dull

sticks of raw material. The results - in boxes, buttons, jewellery, religious ornamentation, and the talismans of superstition are a fine narrative of Kosovo's history and traditions.

Treasures beneath our feet and finding the Watlington Hoard James Mather

The Watlington hoard was discovered by James Mather in 2015. During his career in Marketing, James developed a hobby in metal detecting and has had numerous exciting finds including individual Treasure items and several hoards. Once retired, he achieved his most important find to date, the very valuable and archaeologically significant Watlington Viking Hoard, now on permanent display in the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford.

Over the years James has published numerous magazine articles and has appeared on Radio Berkshire in "The Big Dig" and on National TV in Professor Alice Roberts' "Digging For Britain" series. His talk will cover some background information on responsible metal detecting, a selection of interesting local finds and the discovery, excavation, conservation and significance of the Watlington Hoard.

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



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Premature Awakenings

Another year does dawn, and already record high temperatures have been recorded for the time of year. So global warming really is occurring then, whether or not you believe human activity is causing it, or, just making it



worse. 'It', being the natural warming and cooling cycles of the planet itself.

I'm already seeing people out in their gardens at this unseasonably warm time of year. The new season vigour and energy, so visibly seen, is something to behold. Don't be too keen though, as a cold snap could still do a lot of damage.

Alongside, keep in mind the wildlife that shares our gardens with us, may still be hibernating, so try not to disturb it too much, too early. Otherwise, you'll risk unsettling the balance. Much of what's hibernating could well be the predators of what we call pests, so they're our friends and companions.

Hibernation is a way many creatures survive the cold, without needing to forage for food, or migrate to somewhere warmer. Animals may die during hibernation from lack of fat, really severe weather, or premature disturbance by us, if we are out gardening early in the year.

So although many gardeners are already waking up early this year, due to the warmer than normal spell, remember, that hibernating creatures are not as adaptable as us to going back into hibernation once disturbed if the weather happens to get bad again for any extended period.

Let's enjoy the warmer winter by all means, but let's do it with balance.



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

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

This month, I thought I would highlight a few news items from the VWHDC website newspage.

THE RESERVOIR

Some of you may have seen that at the last Full Vale council meeting, councillors passed unanimously a motion opposing Thames Waters' proposition for a four-square-miles, bunded reservoir to be built in the Vale and demanded more evidence for the need for such a reservoir and its environmental impact. It was also agreed to recommend to the water services watchdog OFWAT that a carbon calculation is conducted on the proposals. This would scrutinise the amount of carbon produced and, it is hoped, result in Thames Water detailing how it planned to reduce the carbon footprint of its proposal and how quickly it could achieve this.

Thames Water are going through a 4 Gate consultation, and the results of the first one has just been published. It shows a lot of opposition to the reservoir and the demand for much more scientific evidence for the need, especially as the forecast from ONS suggests that our population numbers will drop rather than rise in the future. There are other more climate friendly and cheaper alternatives to a reservoir. I would highly recommend that you come along to **Marcham Centre on 22nd February (7.00-9.00)** to hear a presentation from a highly-informed scientist from GARD, who will take any questions you want to ask.

TREE RECYCLING

Most of you will know that you can recycle your Christmas tree by putting it in your brown bin for collection or taking it to a recycling site. But what you may not know is what happens to it then. It is sent to be composted, and in Christmas 2020, 1,599 trees were composted and saved 0.45 tonnes carbon from being emitted into the atmosphere through incineration. That's the same as

* charging 833.33 phones each day for a year.

COVID-19 UPDATE

Our Community Hub has had a fairly busy start to the year supporting residents. Since 4th January we have handled 142 enquiries, mostly around financial hardship and food poverty, and 135 people were referred for additional support.

We've also made 241 calls to people told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace to offer further support. There have been 31 successful applicants so far this month for the £500 test and trace support payment, and we've also been able to allocate additional supermarket voucher support to 12 of these residents.

ROUGH SLEEPERS

For the first time since 2013, no rough sleepers were recorded on 31st December 2021 in either the Vale or SODC. Both councils are committed to ending rough sleeping and, through targeted prevention and early intervention measures, the housing needs team have 85% success rate. There are a small number of entrenched rough sleepers with complex needs, people who have physical and mental health issues and had previously refused help. By working with partner agencies, the team have found them appropriate support and accommodation so that their future looks more promising in 2022. HELP MAKE NIGHT-TIME SAFER

SODC and VWHDC want to hear from anyone who has felt unsafe in either town on a night out, or when returning from an evening out elsewhere, such as Oxford.

The two councils are working with Oxford city, who has been awarded £426.000 government grant to introduce measures to help prevent violence against women and girls travelling in and out of Oxford at night.

RETROFITTING HOMES

As you will know, if we are to meet our target of achieving a carbon zero district by 2045 and country by 2050, one of our biggest hurdles is to retrofit our homes to make them sustainable. The leader of the Vale council is calling for a nationally funded and sustainable scheme across the country to ensure the energy efficiency of existing housing stock through installing insulation or carbon neutral heat pumps. Furthermore, she is calling on the government to guarantee that at least 2,250 homes per year in the Vale are retrofitted if we are to meet our carbon zero targets. However, there is also a critical shortage of workers across the UK who have the skills to retrofit homes, and the Vale is lobbying the government and working with its partners to identify what action could be taken locally to address the skills gap.

CAN YOU HELP US SPREAD THE WORD TO REDUCE YOUR WASTE IN 2022?

The Vale and SODC are running a short social media campaign at the start of the year to remind people to reduce their waste where possible. This supports the councils' joint aim to help tackle the climate emergency. Why not join in and share the councils' social media posts? Among the messages, they are asking people to buy fruit without packaging, to seek out zero-waste products and to buy previously owned products where possible. They are also reminding people to use reusable water bottles and shopping bags too. You can see them on our websites here:

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

My children like to make sure that I am fully informed and updated on any new ideas and ways of thinking. This Christmas, I was given a book by a young, eminent Dutch economist who is passionate that many of our economic problems could be solved with a universal basic income given to everyone together with policies providing housing to the homeless free of charge and obligation. He believes that there is overwhelming evidence that the homeless, the unemployed and those below the poverty line would respond very positively. Whilst I am not fully persuaded, I am intrigued enough to start reading the economist's follow up book.

However, in our part of Oxfordshire - particularly in the Vale we have, thankfully, very low unemployment, homelessness and poverty. But we do have a related problem, and it is getting steadily more acute. This is the problem of housing affordability. A few weeks ago, I was approached by a young local scientist who was despairing of ever being able to get onto the housing market. He was in his early thirties, on a well above average salary but had no access to bank of mum and dad. He had been saving towards a house deposit but price increases were outstripping his rate of savings. The village he would like to stay in now had almost nothing for sale under £350,000. There are almost certainly far more people in our area in this bracket than those in poverty.

One possible solution is simply to build more homes. We've been trying that for some years now. The latest government survey had both VWHDC and OCC in the top 10 of 150 councils for

the numbers of houses built since 2010. But whilst housebuilders insist on building more large homes for the wealthy and London commuters, this simply feeds more house price inflation. We need more affordable housing or rather, housing that people can afford. But there is little profit for developers in low cost, affordable housing. And there is no evidence in this country that building more houses reduces house prices.

With some ingenious use of capital reserves, VWHDC has managed to build 10 affordable homes in the past year. Very few councils have been able to do this and, anyway, it is a drop in the ocean of what is needed. Without major changes in the way councils are allowed to finance building, it is doubtful that solutions lie in this direction. So how does a wealthy area like ours provide homes that the next generation of local residents can afford? No one really knows. There is, however, some unlikely light at the end of the tunnel. Latest ONS statistics suggest that population numbers in this country (and indeed worldwide) are falling. This may give us some economic challenges, but fewer people need fewer houses. If this trend continues, one might expect a steady downward pressure on house prices which would allow more young people to get on the housing ladder. It would also mean less house building in the future.

But does this mean that the solution lies in less economic growth? I need to get on with my Dutch economist's next book.

MP'S REPORT

I held my debate on the role of developers, house-builders and management companies at the beginning of January. You can watch it on my Facebook page, but I used as many constituency examples as I could of the low-quality of some homes; their environmental impact; the lack of affordable homes; the role of management companies, who charge large fees for very little work; and the overall broken process by which the houses come into being, including the failure to provide the infrastructure that is always promised.

My recommendations included ensuring a higher building standard for the homes; 'use it or lose it' planning permission; making builders build to the latest environmental standards, not the ones that existed when they got planning permission (often several years before); a tougher regime for management companies that prevents them hiking their fees and treating home-owners the way they do; and for the infrastructure to support new homes to go in first, as people no longer believe it will follow afterwards.

As I said, my campaigns for better infrastructure – including Grove Station to be reopened, improvements to the A420 and A34 and much better medical facilities for the constituency – are the least we should see given the number of houses we've had. There was quite a bit of cross-party support for what I said, and it is something I will return to regularly.

Making predictions about Covid is a mug's game but, at the time of writing, we do seem in a much better place to what we were last year. I am glad that people could, in general, have a better Christmas and New Year than they did the year before. I am particularly pleased our schools have remained open for all children (most were open for at least vulnerable children throughout the pandemic) as it is the best place for them to learn.

Regular readers will know I am the lead parliamentary sponsor of the Local Electricity Bill, which would enable local communities to buy their energy from local, renewable sources. At the moment a community operation generating renewable energy would have to pay in the region of £1 million set-up costs to access the grid and agree to supply the whole country, rather than just, for example, their local village. This year, I'll be chairing a new All Party Parliamentary Group of MPs and Lords to try and help push this forward.

I know many of you are continuing to have problems with your post. I am in regular contact with Royal Mail about this, which is something I held a debate on in Parliament in June 2021 and which I have raised multiple times. As ever, the Royal Mail staff are working hard but something is still not working correctly. I'll continue to keep on the case of Royal Mail HQ.

Through to the next stage

There have been lots of developments this month regarding the proposed Abingdon reservoir. The regulator has released their view on the water companies' recent submissions as to how they will provide water over the next 50 years and the reservoir has been given the go-ahead to proceed to the next development stage. This is very disappointing, but not unexpected. It is also disappointing that the regulator has largely ignored many of the points against the reservoir raised by local groups, organisations, and councils.

The regional water company grouping, called Water Resources Southeast, are due to reveal their big plans in the week beginning 17th Jan and there will be a consultation period. Once we formally receive the plans and can analyse them, we will be highlighting what local people and organisations can do to help fight these proposals. **The proposed reservoir**

As a reminder, the reservoir will be the largest of its kind in Europe, rising 25m above the ground and filling the area between Marcham, Abingdon, Drayton, Steventon and East Hanney – the construction will be at least 10 years of misery for us.

We know that much of the information on which the reservoir has been planned so far is incorrect. As a simple example, an increasing population is one of the main reasons why Thames Water argue that it's needed. For the last 4 years we have been trying to get them to use sensible figures for this increase, rather than the ludicrous worst-case scenario they always seem to use. Only this week, the Office for National Statistics published figures reducing their expectation for future UK population increases - due to the falling birth rate, deaths will now outnumber births for the foreseeable future. In fact, immigration is now the only reason why numbers will stabilise or increase. This is the 4th update in a row where the ONS has lowered its forecasts and any actual increase will only be a fraction of what Thames Water are planning on. This fact alone makes the argument for the reservoir ridiculous.

Upcoming meetings & opposing the reservoir

We have lots of meetings coming up with Thames Water, local MPs, Oxfordshire County Council and VOWH District Council, where we will be helping to develop a unified opposition. "Where is the love?" sang the Black Eyed Peas in 2003, the year Jane and I got married. Despite it being a protest song rather than a love song, it still comes to mind as we approach Valentine's Day again. It falls on a Monday this year, which is not the best. I find Monday evenings tend to be filled with domestic chores and ferrying children to activities if I'm not at a church meeting. Maybe I'll push the boat out and surprise Mrs Weldon this year with a romantic dinner for two, not least because I'm wondering where the love is here in the parish. We currently have no weddings in the diary for either of our two churches. It is the first time in 15 years of ordained ministry that I don't have a wedding in my diary. There is to be a renewal of marriage vows at All Saints in the Spring, but apart from that, where is the love? The number of church weddings is in decline nationally. Civil ceremonies have remained steady at about 175 thousand a year in England and Wales since 2000. Church weddings number about 50 thousand services a year, a drop of two thirds since 1992. So that is part of the story sadly. It's decades since this parish had lots of weddings every year, and I think the main reason for that is changing demographics. But even so, for the last 20 years, Marcham and Garford have averaged 3 weddings a year, so one would expect some in 2022. Perhaps there are other factors... a lack of affordable reception venues, and couples increasingly marrying where they meet rather than where one is from. If you can think of other possible reasons, I'd really like to know. Maybe the pandemic has quenched the love. At the very least, I hope those of us that are married will take a little more care to treasure our spouses this year, being a better example to those that might follow. Taking weddings is one of the best parts of my job, and both our churches are wonderful venues. If you or any family members are interested, there is a dedicated weddings page on our website with more information.
