

MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL

New Parish Councillor

The Council was pleased to be able to coopt Warren Brooker to the Parish Council to fill one of the vacant seats that it has. Warren lives on the southern side of the village on the new Willows housing development. His particular interests are championing road safety, and building a young persons' programme of activities that appeals to the teenage population in the parish. The Council wishes Warren success in his new role.

Road Closure Packhorse Lane - GigaClear The road closure in Packhorse Lane, planned for GigaClear works, at the time of writing, is still going ahead, although there could be last minute changes of course. MKJ, working for GigaClear, needs to close a section of the A415 approximately between The Croft and a point just west of the former Baptist Church, between 26th July and 8th August whilst installation of fibre optic cables, customer connection pots, backfilling and reinstatement works are carried out. Access will be maintained for properties in the closed section, but there will be no through-traffic permitted. As this is an 'A' road, the diversion route will be on to other 'A' roads, the A338 to Wantage, the A417 to Rowstock, then northwards to the A34, and similarly the reverse route.

Code of Conduct

The group of Monitoring Officers who deal with Oxfordshire, have agreed a new Model Code of Conduct which governs standards in local government, and sets out the framework within which Councillors must operate. The new Code is to be applied on a countywide basis, and which will provide consistency across all the tiers — County Council, the Districts and City Council, Parishes and Towns. This will enable all councillors throughout Oxfordshire to be subject to the same requirements. Marcham Parish Council adopted the revised Code at its meeting on 13th June.

Longfields Bus Shelter – Cleaning

The Council has booked a contractor to clean the Longfields Bus Shelter when the firm is next in the area. The "windows" are made from GRP and not glass, and unfortunately have scratches and scorch marks, so not all of what appears to be grime will be able to be removed.

Neighbourhood Plan

A Parish Council is responsible for leading on a Neighbourhood Plan and has recently decided on preparing a Plan for Marcham, as it wishes to manage the changes that might occur in the future on key local topics in the area, by documenting policies. There is currently a small group beginning to work on a Plan for the area, but they would like some support from more people. If there is anyone who would like to have a say in local development or who has a particular interest then please consider joining the group. Further details are available from Cllr. Tony Mackelworth or the Clerk (contact details at www.marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk).

Councillor Vacancy

Following Warren Brooker's appointment, the Council has just one vacant seat to be filled on the Council, and has been inviting anyone who has an interest in the wellbeing of the local neighbourhood and representing the community to put him/herself forward to join the Council. The vacancy will be an agenda item next month, so this is the last call for anyone who wishes to be considered, to contact the Clerk. As there are formal elections next year, any appointment will be until May 2023.

Planning Applications considered by the Council

P22/V1179/N4D Bothy Vineyard. Change of user from class R status to Flexible Use to microbrewery for making craft beer. The Council had no objection to the use of the building as a small microbrewery, but it did have concerns if this leads to changes to other use classes which could have greater impact on the area.

P22/1283/HH First floor extension at 27 Anson Close. The Council had no objection. P22/V1269/FUL Erection of new dwelling on land rear of 21 Mill Road. The Council objected on grounds of potential flooding, and requested that a traffic review be undertaken, as well as a review of on-site parking. It continued to support its earlier concerns.

Dear Editor

I read in MADNews that the Parish Council are considering reducing the speed limit in the village from 30mph to 20mph. While the primary driver is to improve road safety, part of the reasoning was to improve air quality.

Leaving the safety benefits aside and being a curious engineer, I wondered how driving at 20mph instead of 30mph would affect vehicle fuel consumption and hence emissions and air quality. Clearly driving at a lower speed increases the time the vehicle is in the area. Also, the lower speed requires a lower gear thereby increasing fuel usage. Finally I gave up on the theory and tried a practical test. I drove our car, an Audi A3 diesel, along a straight flat stretch of road at 20 and 30 mph on cruise control. Unfortunately the only readout the car could give was instantaneous fuel consumption. Fortunately the reading was fairly steady with relatively minor variations.

 30mph 3rd gear
 90mpg

 20mph 2nd gear
 63mpg

 20mph 3rd gear*
 110mpg

The current DVLA recommendation is to use 2nd gear in a 20mph limit, 3rd gear in a 30mph limit etc. The car was very unhappy driving at 20mph in 3rd gear with the dashboard telling me to change down.

As you can see, the car burned 50% more fuel to cover a set distance at 20mph compared to 30mph. Other effects of a 20mph limit are the additional braking and acceleration either side and increased journey times. The latter is rarely appreciated but, to tradespeople and delivery companies, time is money.

I hope you find the above interesting.



Theories Behind Various Schools of Thought

This time I've been asked to review another book, after last month's book review was so well received. So, I'll focus on Peter Wohlleben's book, **The Hidden Life of Trees** (ISBN: 978-1771642484) – what they feel, how they communicate: discoveries from a secret world.

This is a book I wish I had read when I was younger. Not saying it's a life changing experience reading this, but it's a mind altering and expansive read, for sure.

In some shops, I've found this on the philosophy shelf. From the title,some assume before reading, this is the limit of this book, but it does have an environmental science influence.

The running order of the sections of the book, is a flowing series of interesting titles, and every chapter clearly covers the theories behind various schools of thought.

For me, at times, some of the contents seemed too repetitive, and too speculative for the average reader, who might be sceptical. For example, there's a lot of anthropomorphism in these pages, and some will argue, trees are not sentient beings, and should not be portrayed as such. People with experience in the field might be more receptive to some of the newer ideas written about. Whoever reads it though, it will certainly profoundly change the way you look at trees (and forests).

The author highlights areas where universal understanding of tree biology may be weak. We understand trees extract nutrients from the ground, but this book, surprisingly to some, maybe, reveals that we don't actually always know how they do it. Osmosis, capillary action, or transpiration cannot always account for the heights the nutrients reach.

I think how trees support the weaker specimens of the same species, hold metaphoric lessons for how humanity could maybe organise its societies better. The strong ones weaken themselves, to enable the weaker to strengthen, I don't think I'll ever forget Peter's writings about this. Everyone should make time to read this book.

A wonderful book, that's accessible, readable and clearly tells the story of the collaboration in a multispecies forest ecosystem. The writing style develops in the reader, empathy for the forest ecosystem and it's a book which subtly alters perceptions of reality. In many ways, the book is profound, maybe because when it was written, it wasn't meant to be?

REASONS TO REUSE WOOD


The current international supply chain issues affecting building materials have been felt acutely within the timber trade with knock-on effects for customers seeking wood for DIY projects. Timber shortages and high prices serve to highlight the environmental benefits and wisdom of being frugal and for reclaiming usable wood from waste. Just down the road in Abingdon, local social enterprise and charity Oxford Wood Recycling (OWR) have been doing just that for the past 17 years.

OWR is a lot more than a timber merchant. Although the Woodshop has been described as an Aladdin's cave of useful wood and quirky items, in fulfilling its mission to care for the environment and transform lives all of their business activities are solely for the benefit of our community.

Marcham and District residents may have seen OWR's caged trucks scurrying to and from domestic or commercial pick-ups of waste wood. At least 20% of the wood is reclaimed – the rest is recycled – resulting in 350-400 tonnes per annum of timber kept in circulation and available for DIY. Some staff started as volunteers at OWR before being offered permanent roles and they are rightly proud of the support provided to ensure that everyone develops and thrives. In 2021 with help from the Postcode Lottery 'Wood to Work' opened, a professional employability service serving individuals perhaps furthest from being able to compete in the jobs market. There have been fantastic early results with four of the first participants being offered employment in the past couple of months.

If you are popping in for some wood or just to look around, you will be warmly welcomed and be assured that the timber and furniture products are hard fought for and come with added value.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT EXTRA CLARIFICATION

As various people have asked me why I stepped down from my cabinet position in May, I thought I would start this month's report with some extra clarification.

Simply put, I have an ever-expanding family who need my help with child care and other family demands. In fact, at this very moment Richard and I are in San Diego, California, helping my daughter and son-in-law with all the extra needs that arise from the birth of a second child (our 8th grandchild) ...



many of you will understand how difficult it is for the first child to accept a new arrival! So, after a lot of soul searching, I decided that family must come first and that I had to reduce my council workload. Furthermore, it would not be responsible to stay as a cabinet member if I could not give the necessary number of hours each week to my portfolio. However, that does not mean that I am reducing my work as your District Councillor......on the contrary, I will continue to represent you fully and am more than willing for you to contact me whenever there is a problem you think the District Council might be able to help sort out. (see contact details below)

GETTING FAMILIES ACTIVE

The Vale has launched YouMove, a new initiative providing low-cost or free activities for children and families who receive benefits-related free school meals in Oxfordshire. Activities include cricket, swimming and badminton and more information can be found on the Vale website: whitehorsedc.gov.uk/youmove

In addition to the above, our leisure provider, GLL, is offering refugees a free three-month Better Health Centre membership or a subscription to a course or lesson.

HOUSEHOLD SUPPORT FUND EXTENSION

More help has been extended for households who are struggling to afford energy, food and other related expenses. In June, the fund was opened to applications from residents who had not received support in earlier rounds. Information is available from the Vale website. And the Community Hub team is always available with help and advice.

DAMAGE TO PUBLIC TOILETS IN ABINGDON

Many of you will be aware of the dreadful damage that has been done to the public toilets in Abingdon, including doors being kicked in, tiles smashed and fixtures and fittings damaged.

The toilets at The Charter are now shut until the damage can be fully repaired, which is likely to take several months. As a result, residents and visitors are being asked to use alternative public toilets at Hales Meadow or Abbey Meadows. There is also a toilet for disabled users under the Archway by Abbey Cinema, and it is run by Abingdon Town Council. Access is via a RADAR key.

You may be interested to know that this year, Vale of White Horse District Council has already been forced to foot the bill for costly repairs following similar acts of destruction on facilities in Abingdon in April, as well as for repairs to the public toilets in Grove which have also been targeted by vandals. The council will now have to use more public funds to repair the Charter toilets, funds which could have been used for paying for vital services or to support vulnerable people in our community.

These vandalism incidents have been reported to Thames Valley Police, but if you see someone damaging public facilities, or know who is responsible, please contact the police on 101.

VACCINATION UPDATE

 People aged 75 and over, and people who are immunosuppressed are now eligible for a Spring booster vaccine. The NHS will contact those who are eligible to book an appointment. Visit

- www.nhs.uk/covid-booster for more information. Please do not contact the NHS.
- The NHS will invite people as they become eligible for their Spring/second booster. This may be as soon as 3 months since their last dose this can be booked through the National Booking Service or by calling 119 Please do not contact your local NHS. To find out more, visit www.nhs.uk/covid-booster.
- Appointments are available for children aged 5 to 11. Parents and guardians can go online https://www.nhs.uk/covidvaccination or call 119 to book an appointment.
- If a child has had COVID-19 they will still get extra protection from the vaccine, but they will need to wait 12 weeks before getting vaccinated.
- The following will continue:
 - all individuals aged 12 and over should be offered a primary course of two doses (or three doses if severely immunosuppressed at the time of their 1st or 2nd dose)
 - those aged 16 and over and those aged 12 to 15 in a risk group should also be offered a booster dose

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT SCAMS. -BEWARE.

Scamming has become increasingly common in recent years. COVID has given scammers many new opportunities and it seems that our ability to tackle the problem is permanently lagging behind the ingenuity/criminality of the scammers. Most

financial institutions have improved their security often seemingly at the expense of the customer's convenience and ease of use. Security phone calls and messages and an extra layer of complication to even the simplest of financial transactions. Until our systems have worked out how to trace scammers, we are stuck with the system as it is. It is now more important than ever that we protect the vulnerable and our family



and friends from scamming and other types of sharp practice. My recent experience has taught me that it is not only the 'elderly and vulnerable' who can be very easily scammed. I have discovered the hard way that obtaining an 'ESTA' form for foreign travel to the US is open to such sharp practice.

The first contact details that appear on a Google search for ESTAs all appear to be bona fide government websites with all the official logos. When contacted, the applicant is invited to fill in a form (name, DOB, passport number etc) and an official ESTA will be returned in a couple of days. All for a charge of somewhere between £120-£150 per ESTA. What you are not told is that they are transferring the information to an official government ESTA service form – a form that is no more complex than the one you have just completed – and sent it in to the official government ESTA-issuing authority. It costs them (in my case) \$14 for this non-service. In other words they have pocketed well over £100 for doing something you can do for yourself.

I am still to explain to my wife why our visit to the US to greet our new grandchild has cost £280 more than intended.

20MPH INITIATIVE

There has never been an Oxfordshire County Council initiative more popular than the installation of 20mph zones in any village or town that wants it. True, there some hoops that have to be gone through to qualify, but the process is straightforward. I am not aware of anyone who has failed. It would be a brave politician who tried to unravel or challenge the initiative now.

I have received a couple of enquiries asking exactly what is the justification for this initiative. It's a fair question, so here is my attempt to answer it. Obviously safety is the overriding justification. All Councils are trying to get people out of cars and make walking and cycling a more attractive and less risky option. The chances of death or serious injury are drastically reduced as speeds reduce from 30-20mph. With increasing numbers of electric cars, any concerns that 20mph produces more pollution are becoming less persuasive. Enforcement is an issue, but the safety benefits increase every 1mph reduction in traffic speeds. If some drivers are determined to drive at 30mph in a 20mph zone, other people are safer than if the same driver drives at 35mph in a 30mph zone. In other words, enforcement, in my view, should never stop us introducing speed limits. Every life saved, every injury less severe is progress.

Much will be happening in the autumn with decisions on the Reservoir and major local road building. So, wishing everyone a good holiday, free of Covid and, if possible free of travel disruption.

MP'S REPORT

I've just launched a campaign to help young people at local state

schools get work experience at the great employers we have in the constituency. This was part of what I used to do when I ran charities because most work experience goes to the relatives of existing employees or clients, meaning young people without connections struggle to get it. It's vital to get, because it gives you first understanding of the world of work, teaching you what to wear, how to interact with people, how an organisation fits together and giving



you something you can put on your CV – as well as your first connections. It has almost disappeared as a result of the pandemic, so I'm leaning on the employers at Harwell and Milton Park, in particular. If your organisation can help, wherever it is, do please get in touch.

On 2 consecutive days we had debates that allowed me to raise some of the constituent issues I am most often contacted about. First, we had the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill, which contains the Government's planning reforms. I am very pleased the Government has listened to those of us who raised objections to the zonal system that was being suggested. It is also going to put more weight on local plans and not require a 5-year land supply if your local plan is up to date – welcome news for us.

The planning process will be fully digitalised, and I asked again for hybrid meetings to be permitted (as well as measures to ensure the digitally excluded can still participate). I banged the drum again for my campaign for new houses to be built to the latest environmental standard, not the one when they got planning permission, which is often several years earlier. I also stressed there is still an issue with housing targets. South and Vale have typically exceeded their targets, but we continue to have an issue with the city of Oxford demanding the highest number of houses then hardly building any of them, meaning the burden falls on the rest of the county.

And, of course, I raised lack of infrastructure, which I did again the following day in a debate about Ofwat. The Government has just set new priorities for Ofwat, and I used a debate on these to talk about the sewage releases in Oxfordshire waters, the poor water infrastructure that often accompanies new homes and the objections to the reservoir proposal. You can find both speeches on

my website/Facebook pages.

I had a great 4 days of Platinum Jubilee celebrations including in Didcot, Faringdon, Wantage, Grove, West Hanney, Harwell and Wallingford. Along the way there was lots of food, plenty of games, Vikings, morris dancers, animals and an impressive array of classic cars — well done to everyone involved. God save our wonderful Queen.

ABINGDON RESERVOIR – LATEST FROM GARD

The Water summit to be hosted by Oxfordshire County Council that was scheduled for June has been postponed until September. We will provide an update once the new date is confirmed. GARD have been reviewing the WRSE consultation response and points to highlight at this stage include:

- The Reservoir is the strategic project which had the most opposition - over 500 out of 1150 responses opposed the scheme.
- Whilst WRSE appear to acknowledge our response and criticisms (GARD is mentioned 25 times compared to Ofwat's 18), they have made little attempt to address our concerns now. Many of these concerns were shared in Ofwat's view of the plan, especially on lack of detailed cost, or environmental justification, or consideration of alternatives.
- WRSE state that they do not propose to provide a detailed response to the issues raised at this stage in the process but that more detailed information on the assessment of costs, benefits and potential environmental effects of the options will be made available in Autumn 2022, for the options selected in the draft regional plan, and for the alternatives. This will include a reasoned justification for the overall strategy in the draft regional plan, and for the selection of options within that strategy.
- The Severn Thames Transfer was the option with the biggest support (more than one in four of responses), including much support for the transfer to be done via the Cotswold canal.

It's clear GARD and all local residents who responded to the consultation have made an impact. Thanks once again to everyone who took part.

More encouragement came from our MP, David Johnston, who spoke against the reservoir plans (and Thames Water's appalling record on sewage) in a debate in Parliament. This was covered by the Oxford Mail, and you can view the debate at https://fb.watch/dzvLwY5PZw/
