GARD Newsletter for October 2023





GARD is a local community group formed to campaign against Thames Water's proposals to build a reservoir south-west of Abingdon.

Thames Water proposes 150 billion litre reservoir – the largest possible!

Thames Water finally published their Water Resource Management Plan on August 30th. It is not good news. The saga of the Reservoir has been going on so long now that people may feel like giving up — PLEASE DON'T! It has never been more important to act.

Thames Water has decided to go ahead with the 'Abingdon Reservoir' – with key developments:

- although we were all consulted on their 100 billion Litre proposal, they have enlarged this to 150 billion Litres that's 150 million tonnes of water sitting above us, with no apparent room for flood mitigation
- They have ruled out the quicker, we believe cheaper and more environmentally adaptive Severn Thames Transfer, designed to bring fresh water from the Northwest to the more drought-prone Southeast
- Southern Water, planned beneficiary of 2/3 of the reservoir capacity, is challenging the cost and logic of the water transfer scheme from the reservoir
- Thames Water has essentially rejected GARD's and probably your objections too, including the need to challenge the inaccurate population forecasts say they are forced to use.

The Rt Hon Thérèse Coffey MP, Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, could agree for Thames Water to proceed within weeks with no further consultation necessary. However, with Thames Water now accused of illegal sewage dumping and their own financial health in doubt, everybody should take action!

Lobby your MP:

We have support of the Vale of White Horse and Oxford County Councils, and we lobby within the industry, but you can still help:

- If you live in Abingdon, you can support your MP Layla Moran's opposition



- Parcelforce Worldwide will increase in price by 17-23% for inland services:
- All other services, including international, will remain the same.





Parish Council News

Grants

The Parish Council considers any requests for grants at its November meeting. Grant requests are considered usually just once a year. Therefore, if there is any worthy and needy organisation where Marcham residents benefit, which is considering applying to the Parish Council for a grant, and has not yet done so, then please note the deadline for submissions is 15th October, 2023. Applications received after that date will not be considered.

The Councils grant policy and grant application form are available in the publications section, on the Council's website www.marchamparishcouncil.gov.uk. Please complete the application form and return it to the clerk – details are on the form. Please also enclose a copy of your organisation's accounts.

Allotment Rent Collection

The Clerk will soon be collecting allotment rents for the year 23/24. It would be helpful in due course, if tenants could arrange to transfer the rent amount due straight into the Council's account via online transfer. Details of the amount payable will be available shortly. Any tenant not having on line banking can still send a cheque payable to Marcham Parish Council for the amount due to the Clerk's address at 90 Howard Cornish Road, Marcham.

Planning Applications / Street Trading Licence applications considered by the Council

P23/V1880/FUL and P23/V1881/LB Change of use from residential college to single family dwelling at Denman College. Council had no objections to the application, but did request a construction management plan, traffic plan and details of hours of working, to ensure that the conservation area, and nearby households were not affected. It requested that water run off from the site was not to go into the public sewer system, any historical carved stone blocks to be preserved, and a maintenance plan for trees near to and overhanging public footways and paths to be created.

Street Trading Licence applications have been considered. These were from various street food vendors in connection with Oak Taverns, to trade, one at a time, between the hours of 12.00 to 21.00 Monday to Sunday, from the yard at The Crown Public House, at the corner of North Street and Packhorse Lane. The Council made comments about litter, and the need for an appropriate receptacle.

Play Area

Work to construct the new adventure play area in the Anson Field began in August. The playground provides a range of facilities to cater for children of all ages and abilities and offers a variety of different themes for play. The Council thanks everyone for their understanding and patience during the construction period when it could not be used. At the time of writing, inspections of the installation are taking place, and any queries being dealt with. The new play area will open as soon as possible. Any information about the re-opening date, or other matters will be posted on the Council's website. The Council has a working party now looking at the items for outside the fence, together with landscaping and seating.

Oxfordshire County Council - 20 mph proposal for village roads and extension of 30 mph limit to Cow Lane

The County Council's Cabinet Member for Highway Management reviewed the proposals for the extension of the 30 mph limit northwards along Sheepstead Road up to Cow Lane, and the 20 mph limits put forward by the County Council for the village centre. He listened to all the comments and concerns that had been submitted. The policy of the County Council is that lower speed limits are safer, and he deemed that the schemes met the policy as set out. A request had been lodged by one correspondent that even more lower speed limits should be created, and the officers dealing with the matter were asked to keep this in mind. The schemes for both the 20 mph limits in the village centre, and the extension of the 30 mph limit along Sheepstead Road have therefore been approved.

Advance Notice - A415/Church Street/New Road

As Sunday 12th November, 2023 is Remembrance Sunday, a Road Closure will apply to the A415, Church Street and New Road to allow the parade to the War Memorial following the service in Church. The timings are currently being finalized but will be approximately between 10.45 a.m. to 12.15p.m. The diversion during this period will be North Street, Sheepstead Road, Faringdon Road and A338.

Trick or Treat - 31st October

It is approaching that time of year again when children can be tempted into going out trick or treating. Normally it is a harmless pastime for children, but it can also be both frightening and intimidating for some residents who have unexpected knocks on their doors. If you go out at Halloween, please respect the wishes of anyone who does not wish to participate.

If you do get an unexpected caller, make sure the chain or door bar is on before you open the door. Do not let anyone in your house unless you are happy with their identity.

If you need to talk to the police call 101 or dial 999 in an emergency.



MP's Report





I was honoured last month to be appointed the Minister for Children, Families and Wellbeing.

It's particularly special for me to be placed in the Department for Education given my prepolitics career was spent running organisations for children and young people. It often surprises people when I tell them that,



before I became an MP, I had never been in politics before, whether as a councillor, advisor, or candidate.

In my new role I have responsibility for a wide range of areas such as early years and childcare – including the delivery of the Government's new commitment to provide 30 hours a week free childcare from when a child is 9 months old until they start school - as well as Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), children in care, adoption and kinship care – vital areas that help support some of our most vulnerable young people - not to mention mental health.

I am delighted to have the opportunity to work on giving children across the country the best start in life.

It was also a delight to attend the unveiling of the new Agatha Christie statue in Wallingford, a place she lived for 42 years. The architect has done a really great job and it was a pleasure to meet her grandson, Matthew, who did the actual unveiling. I recommend a visit to see it when you have time!

Some other recent visits made by me included meeting with a group of unpaid carers in Wallingford, facilitated by Val Wolsey and Carers Oxfordshire, to talk about their experiences and listen to their concerns, attending an Innovator Day at Harwell Campus where I gave a speech and talked to staff and investors about the world-leading work that Harwell is doing, and visiting SeeAbility in East Hagbourne who provide support services for people with learning disabilities, many of whom have sight loss.

I have been campaigning to see Grove Station reopened since I was elected nearly 4 years ago and have now launched a petition of Parliament. This is something MPs can do on matters that are important to their constituents and I've done so to keep the pressure up. I am delighted that 1,750+ people have signed so far and the more signatures we collect, the stronger the message we send to the Department for Transport – so please do sign if you are able to and encourage your friends and family that live in the constituency to do so too.

County Councillor's Report

OCC Children's Services

As you may have read in the Press, a recent Ofsted report listed Oxfordshire's Children's Services (along with others) requiring improvement. There is particular criticism of the lack of support given to children and parents of children



with special needs. We have a number of families who have been affected by this The Council has accepted the findings of the report in full and has already begun to take actions to rectify the problems including increased funding (with consequent pressure on the budget). I will give further details on the actions to be taken in my next report.

20mph zones

I am disappointed that this issue is becoming a political football for a minority of residents. Just to make it clear, I was elected to take decisions some of which might be contentious. I repeat that the overwhelming number of people who have contacted me support the proposals. Rather than write separate emails to the 7 people who have contacted me opposing the initiative, I am restating my position here. 20mph zones are Parish Council proposals but I fully support them. There is mounting evidence that lives are saved and that the quality of life in our towns and villages is improved by 20mph zones — with or without enforcement.

Hobbyhorse Lane Appeal

The third attempt to get this application (turned down by planning committee several times) approved is currently being heard by a planning inspector. As such, it would be improper for me to express an opinion here. There will be time for that later.

However, I wanted to commend on behalf of all Sutton Courtenay residents, the enormous amount of effort over many months put in by the Parish Council, their advisors and many well known residents with particular knowledge and experience. Whatever the outcome, it has been a pleasure to work with them.

GigaClear Box at Parkside, Marcham

Walking down New Rd in warm weather, it is impossible to ignore the noise of the cooling fans and the disturbance caused to residents of Parkside. A number of public spirited residents have helped monitor the situation and, together with officers from VWHDC, OCC, and District and County Councillors, pressure is being exerted on the installers to address the problem. With District responsible for noise measurement and County responsible for internet provision, there has been a need for a coordinated effort.

Accidents and the Young

With the recent tragic accident in Marcham involving young people in mind, I have signed up to a task and finish group of the Police and Crime Commissioner Scrutiny Committee. This will allow me to raise the issue of education of future young drivers in schools and colleges. Education in schools has made a considerable difference in the approach of young people to drugs, smoking and alcohol. As a self confessed attendee of a speed awareness course, I am convinced that education is the most effective way of changing behaviour.

Hif1

Leaving aside the fact that the country is divided on whether or not road building is a solution to congestion, a decision on the future of this project is now in the hands of the Secretary of State. He has "called in" the decision of the Planning Committee to refuse the application. We should hear the result in the early new year.

MEPC

One of my roles as an elected councillor, is to Chair regular meetings of the. MEPC Liaison committee involving local parish councils and MEPC reps. Of all the meetings I have to attend, these are the most informative and constructive.

We are fortunate in this area to have such a successful and environmentally aware commercial operation in our midst. It is clearly a great place to work. I can recommend the bus services and the coffee. And, in case you are wondering, I do not have shares in the operation.

District Councillor's Report

In the run-up to the local elections in May, a concern that I heard often on the doorstep was the state of Abingdon town centre: many of the local shops of years past had closed down, and there was an impression that what replaced them did not compare to Abingdon's former charm. In between getting up to speed on the District Councillor role and grappling with some urgent issues that have sprung up since I was elected, I have been looking into this:

The Central Abingdon Regeneration Framework (CARF) was published in February, following a process that included consultation with residents. The CARF is a long-term plan for regeneration of downtown Abingdon, aiming to revive the high street and promote active travel in and around the area. There is no magic bullet in here, but the CARF describes the long-

term ambition for Abingdon that will help inform decisions over the coming years, both directly and through its impact on the upcoming Joint Local Plan and other development plans.

The Charter car park in the centre of Abingdon has been partially closed since March 2021, as the building's structural integrity was found to be unable to safely support the combined weight of vehicles on the higher floors. There has been some recent activity on the car park, with procurement of a specialist concrete contractor for repairs underway, but there are not yet any timelines known for changes to the car park's capacity.

After several years of sitting empty, Old Abbey House was bought by a local, family-run business in 2021, with the intention of converting it into a hotel. Renovation work has been underway since then and is now approaching completion: I look forward to the day when it reopens, and the business contributes towards tourism in the area and to Abingdon's regeneration.

The 'other' Abbey House, which is temporarily the headquarters for VWHDC and for South Oxfordshire District Council, and also hosts some staff from Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) and the Citizens Advice Bureau. South and Vale should one day be moving to a new headquarters in Didcot, freeing up space that could be put to use for community or retail purposes.

Upgrades to the White Horse Leisure & Tennis Centre, in east Abingdon, are upcoming. These include heat pumps and solar panels to reduce energy costs and carbon emissions, and refurbishment of the outdoor tennis courts.

Finally, a County matter rather than a District one, but worth mentioning anyway: the much-needed extension to the Lodge Hill A34 junction, adding slip-roads to the south, has been approved by OCC Planning. The OxWAb MP, Layla Moran, is applying pressure on central government to ensure they transfer the budgetary contribution they pledged, so that work can hopefully soon begin.
