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
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Dear Readers

Thames Valley Police and Crime Commissioner Elections, Thursday 2nd May, 2024 – ID Requirements

Please remember your photographic ID when going to vote. This can be your passport, driving licence or blue badge, bus pass, voter ID document, or certain other government issued documents.

You will need to show your photographic ID before being issued with a ballot paper. You will not be able to vote unless you have proof of ID with you.

20 mph limits

Residents will have noticed that the 20 mph speed limit signs have been erected, and white line painting has been done. Oxfordshire County Council is just processing the Traffic Regulation Order and then the 20 mph will be fully enforceable. When driving around the village, please check the speed at which you are travelling, and make sure the new limit is observed.

Planning applications considered at the last meeting

P24/V0609/HH Single storey infill extension and front entrance porch at 42 Harding Way. The Council had no objections.

P24/V0580/HH Existing vehicle access dropped kerb extended at 87 Howard Cornish Road. The Council had no objections

P24/V0403/HH Demolition of existing singlestorey structure to the rear elevation and the construction of a single-storey extension and internal alterations at 16 Fettiplace Road. The Council had no objections.

Section 73 application for the continuation of development, without complying with certain Conditions as to the order of mineral working, at Hills Aggregate mineral extraction site on the A338. The Council required water flows to be properly monitored and reported on owing to the proximity to the Special Area of Conservation.

Vacancy for Councillor

Marcham Parish Council can have a maximum of 10 Councillors. At present the Council is looking to fill vacancies by cooption. Individuals who are on the electoral register, or own or occupy land in the parish, or work in the parish or live within 3 miles of the parish boundary can be considered for co-option. If you are interested in working in a small team to contribute to local life, taking forward projects which benefit people across the parish, then please contact the Clerk.

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

Eynsham Abbey was in continuous use from the late Saxon period to the Dissolution. Its first Abbot was the internationally renowned scholar and teacher, Aelfric. It was frequently visited by medieval kings and achieved fame in the 12th century with the Vision of the Monk of Eynsham and later with the acquisition of the arm of St Andrew. Following the Dissolution the huge structure was demolished and nothing of the Abbey now remains above ground.

Steve Parrinder read History at Kings College London. For 30 years he taught History and Archaeology at Richmondupon-Thames College. He is an active member of Eynsham History Group and has written a number of articles for the Eynsham Record.

March has been a busy month. We are as usual very reliant on our wonderful volunteers, on Wednesday 10th April we could not open as we were short staffed. We are looking for volunteers who can help us on a Wednesday morning. It is a day where Mothers and young children can come and enjoy each other's company. As well as groups who can get together and talk over coffee and cakes.

If You Hear A Robin Humming 'Eye Of The Tiger'

If you've ever strolled around the Global Retreat Centre in Nuneham Courtenay, Oxfordshire—like a spiritual detective on a quest for inner peace —you'll have clocked those 20 new birdboxes. Proper posh ones they are.

Now, the plan was to get more birds and birdsong closer to the house. But it wasn't just a case of sticking 'em up willy-nilly. There was a strategy. A proper tactical operation.

Some were slyly hidden near doors and windows. Why? So visitors could soak up the bird vibes without actually spotting the little feathered maestros. It's like VIP access to the avian orchestra.

I chipped in this year by putting up 20 new ones. My gift to the house: an upgraded natural sound experience. Forget whale songs; we're talking Blue Tits, Robins, bats, and owls.

We've got a grand total of 93 boxes (only 2 have done a runner in my 15 years of box babysitting). Each box has its own clientele: Blue Tits, they're like the regulars at the local pub; Robins, they're the hipsters who nest in hedges; bats, they're the night shift crew; and owls, well, they're the tree-dwelling professors.

But too many boxes ain't the answer. We're not running a bird Airbnb without planning permission here. We don't want to artificially inflate populations like a dodgy stock market. And let's face it, high-rise living can lead to bird drama – feathers flying, squabbles over prime real estate, and the occasional bird flu gossip.

So, next time you're sipping your herbal tea and contemplating life, spare a thought for those 93 boxes. They're like the feathered tenants of a swanky avian apartment block. And remember, it's quality over quantity – just like a good biscuit selection.

And if anyone asks, tell 'em: "Yeah, I've seen the birdboxes. Proper posh they are. Makes the whole place feel like a feathered version of Downton Abbey.

We're not just slapping up birdboxes willy-nilly. It's not a DIY frenzy where you grab a hammer and shout, 'Build it, and they will come!' Nah, we're more strategic than that.

We've got the Blue Tits. These little divas need their boxes high up in the tree, like they're attending a posh rooftop party. No facing the prevailing winds mind you – these birds want a view, not a wind tunnel. And no branches blocking their hole; they're not playing hide-and-seek.

Now, the Robins – they're the stealthy ones. Their boxes? Buried in hedges or trees, practically invisible. They're like the secret agents of the bird world. And get this: they prefer a lowaltitude approach. None of that high-flying nonsense. They swoop down, do a U-turn upwards, and voilà! Nest secured.

And don't even get me started on the bats. These nocturnal creatures are pickier than a food critic at a fancy restaurant. They need their boxes in groups of 3, like a cozy bat condo. Why? Temperature control. If one box gets chilly, they can shuffle to a warmer suite. It's like a bat version of a holiday resort.

On the **Marcham Weekend** the Café will be running a barbecue and a cake and drinks stall during the day as well as doing pizzas in the evening.

So, next time you see a birdbox, remember: it's not just wood and nails. It's a carefully curated avian real estate market. And if you hear a Robin humming 'Eye of the Tiger' while nesting, you'll know they mean business.

We've got more birdboxes than a magpie's got nicked trinkets. Seriously, it's like the avian version of a property boom. Worth



a mention, we've got the bat box on the historic chapel. Roof missing, right? But I'm not playing Bob the Builder here. Why? Because there should be three of these bad boys at every site, not just one, so hardly worth repairing. It's like the Three Musketeers, but with wings.

Now, brace yourself for the owl boxes. These ancient cribs are perched so high up the trees, you'd need a Sherpa and a telescope to spot 'em. Back in the day, they were like ground-floor flats. But these conifers grew taller, like they were on some botanical steroids, and now the owl penthouses are sky-high. Solid as a rock though – built to last.

We've got room for 20 more Blue Tit and Robin boxes along the Thames boundary. But it's not a case of 'could we?' Nah, it's 'should we?' Like deciding whether to add extra biscuits to your tea break.

But wait, there's more! House Sparrow boxes — three chambers so they nest communally, like a bird B&B. Problem is, our local Sparrow population is about as active as a sloth on a Sunday, they're just not there. So, it's like inviting guests to a party when your fridge is empty. I just don't put them up.

And finally, Swift boxes which we don't currently have. These birds are pickier than a Michelin-starred chef. To attract 'em, you'd you need to fool them into thinking we have a well established colony already. You'd need audio devices blaring their calls every 40 metres, from their nearest site, to here, as they arrive from Africa in May. It's like hosting a Swift karaoke night. But trust me, even with the 200 speakers I estimate to be needed, passing birds are more likely to roll their eyes and fly off.

So, next time you're strolling the grounds, keep your peepers peeled for those 93 boxes. And start with the two ninja bat boxes on the Pollard Memorial. They're like the James Bonds of the bird world—silent, mysterious, and probably ordering martinis.



DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

JOINT LOCAL PLAN (JLP)

A huge thank you to everyone who contributed towards the consultation on South and Vale's draft JLP, which has now closed. Over 1,200 individuals and organisations commented – either to the full survey or to the In-a-Nutshell version – and officers are now busy incorporating the consultation findings into the 'full' draft JLP, which will then be published later in the year for review & comment by the community, before finally going to the national Planning Inspectorate.

HEART OF THE VALE

The Vale's proposal for a new 4-year Corporate Plan (the 'Heart of the Vale') is currently open for discussion. This establishes our vision, ambitions, and priorities for the district council over the next four years and has three key threads: providing the home people need; supporting climate and nature recovery; and creating healthy, sustainable, and inclusive communities. Do please share your thoughts via www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/HeartOfTheVale or via paper copies at council buildings, such as Abbey House in Abingdon.

WILDFLOWERS

Residents may already be aware of the Vale's Let It Bee initiative, to support wildflowers and so pollinators by reducing the frequency of grass cutting on targeted sites owned and maintained by the Vale. The sites chosen do not impact on sightlines for drivers, and are also near areas of shorter grass and pathways. I'm delighted that a site in Marcham has just been added to the list of Meadow Areas: a stretch of verge between Howard Cornish Road and Hydes Copse. This will be monitored over the year and further sites may be added in 2025.

CLIMATE ACTION FUND (CAF)

Another round of the Vale's CAF is due to open on 3rd May, with a new maximum grant size of £10,000 (double that previously permitted). Local non-profit community organisations are encouraged to apply, whether directly or in collaboration with the Parish Council.

FRILFORD JUNCTION

The Vale's planning team recently approved an application for improvement works to the Frilford Junction (A415-A338), including widening of the road in places and extra path space for pedestrians and cyclists. To see the plans, search for application P22/V1757/ FUL on the Vale's planning portal.

OXFORDSHIRE INCLUSIVE ECONOMY PARTNERSHIP (OIEP)

South and Vale have recently signed the OIEP's charter, and so pledged to (1) account for the social value to the local community when assessing suppliers, alongside the value/financial cost of

the contract; (2) buy from purposeful local organisations wherever possible; and (3) support council employees to volunteer on local community projects.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

ONE FINAL ARTICLE....

Although my record keeping is far from accurate, I calculate that sometime in 2024, I attended my one thousandth Parish Council meeting. Like many, I came to local government in later life following a life as a teacher. I can honestly say that, far from regretting the last 19 years, I have found local government enormously rewarding. I have met many people for whom I have the utmost admiration – even when I have disagreed with them.

Whilst knowing when to step back is never wrong, a recent and unexpected bout of ill health is forcing me to step down a little earlier than originally intended. As a result, this will be my final



contribution to Parish newsletters and I will be stepping down as District and County councillor at the end of this month. There is a list of outstanding issues – some big – some small – which I will be handing over to my successor – whoever you elect at the forthcoming bi-election.

Looking back, there have been successes and achievements. Some of those in which I take most pride being:

Helping (together with my wife) to deliver Marcham Village Hall; Encouraging Parish Councils to institute 20mph zones thereby saving lives; Reducing speed limits on some of our most dangerous local roads; Being involved in the delivery of the Drayton Neighbourhood Plan – the first in the Vale.

But there have also been failures, frustrations and disappointments. These must include:

That the Reservoir is still a live issue; a failure to persuade colleagues that building new roads such as Hif1 is an old fashioned solution to increasing gridlock; the painfully slow delivery of the sporting facilities in Drayton; the persistent problem of noises and smells in Appleford and Sutton Courtenay.

Call me an optimist but the first list has always far outweighed the second if only because the battles involved in the second list are far from over and my successors will continue the fight.

If I may be allowed the privilege of one final moan. Parish council meetings are often very poorly attended by members of the public. The exception is when a group of concerned residents appear to raise a particular issue. Most are very well meaning and public spirited, and their contribution helps to make their parishes better for all residents. However, once their issue has been addressed, too often they are never seen again. Local democracy is at a stage of crisis at present. Elected representatives, be they MPs, County, District or Parish councillors have to take much blame for everything that is wrong with the world and being involved in local democracy can become dis-spiriting. As a result, many worthy people are put off from standing as Councillors and there is a growing shortage - particularly of Parish Councillors. This puts ever more strain on the shrinking number who are prepared to stand. I would like to appeal directly to all residents - but particularly all new residents to our Parishes - to make our local communities better places for all by considering joining their Parish Council. Becoming a Councillor is rewarding and very worthwhile. Please consider being part of reviving faith in local democracy.

MP'S REPORT

Along with the other Conservative MPs in Oxfordshire, I wrote to the CEO of **Thames Water** to demand that more action is taken



to tackle sewage pollution in our waters, and have secured a meeting with him.

The Government has taken decisive action to address the sewage issue, including putting in place the strictest ever legally binding targets, which I was proud to vote for; increasing the monitoring of sewage discharges in England to 100% (up from 7% in 2010 under Labour); ensuring fines against water companies are unlimited; and requiring Thames Water and other water companies to deliver the largest ever infrastructure investment of £56 billion to fix this problem. However, people are rightly very angry about this issue, as am I, and I expect Thames Water to act with far greater urgency – which I will make clear during my meeting with the CEO.

I met with the new Chief Superintendent of **Thames Valley Police** for Oxfordshire and discussed local policing and my campaign to tackle anti-social behaviour, which I know is a huge concern for

local people. Thames Valley Police has now recruited 784 more police officers since 2019 (which has meant more officers overall than ever before) thanks to extra Government funding and tackling this should be a priority for them.

I met with the **Roads Minister** to discuss my campaign to improve our roads and the results of my Local Roads Survey. The Government has given Oxfordshire County Council millions of extra pounds (a 30% funding increase this year) to improve our roads and fix our potholes. We discussed how they should use this money effectively, including filling potholes correctly and not in a way that means they reappear within weeks, as we all know often happens on our local roads.

Autism Family Support Oxfordshire provides vital support to parents across my constituency. Local families wrote to me after Oxfordshire County Council announced they were going to cut their funding which would have had a huge impact. I wrote to them on behalf of all my constituents who rely on this vital service and was glad to hear that the Council have (finally) listened and reversed their funding cut which will be a relief to many families.

I am hosting a **fair for families of children and young people with special educational needs**. It will take place on Tuesday 28 May at Didcot Civic Hall from 12:30pm to 4:30pm and will be attended by various local and national organisations who help SEND families. Please register on my website at **www.david-johnston.org.uk/ SEND** if you plan to attend. I look forward to seeing you there!

Visits this past month included to Drayton Community Primary School to present Local Hero Awards to four pupils who secured help for an unconscious woman and meeting Kathleen Law in Wantage, at the invitation of her son David,

to wish her a happy 100th birthday.

Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue Service – keeping Oxfordshire safe and well

Safe and well visits offer practical advice to older and vulnerable residents about the risks in their home that could lead to falls, fire, or any source of harm. Firefighters or dedicated advisers will talk to residents about smoke and



carbon monoxide alarms (or fit them) and about how they can keep themselves safe in the event of a fire.

They can also provide advice and signposting on alcohol use, staying well and warm, and scams and doorstep crime prevention. If you work or support vulnerable people in their own homes, you can refer someone for a safe and well visit on the county council's website here:

If you have spotted any of the following, then consider a referral:

- There are no working smoke or carbon monoxide alarmsThe resident may find it difficult to react quickly in the
 - The resident may find it difficult to react quickly in the event of a fire or emergency
 They are using electrical equipment with trailing leads
 - They are using electrical equipment with trailing leads, lots of extensions or possible unsafe wiring
 - There are large amounts of post or other indications that the resident is being targeted directly by possible scams
 - The resident has made comments that they have concerns about staying safe.

There's no cost for a safe and well visit. It's just practical advice and peace of mind.
