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

ANNUAL COUNCIL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Council was held on 13th May and Mark Harvie was elected Chairman for the following year. Various working groups were set up to look at footpaths and climate issues, the play area, and allotments, as well as formal internal administrative groups to review policies, and audit processes.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Council was pleased to see residents from the village attend the annual parish meeting. The Local Government Act 1972 states that the Chairman of the Parish Council shall preside, so the job of running the meeting fell to Mark Harvie.

Some of the topics covered were:

Grass cutting in the parish The Parish Council has taken on the highway verge cutting which is currently the responsibility of the County Council, so this will enable the parish to have more control over the standard of cutting. There may be some teething problems as the transition is made, so please bear with us.

The Vale of White Horse District Council, which maintains the wide grass area in Howard Cornish Road, from the Salvation Army textile bank to Hyde Copse has allocated the section from the bus shelter eastwards to be a meadow area, so they will reduce mowing in that location.

Footpath from Churchyard westwards Grant funding is being sought in the hope of raising sufficient funds to be able to improve the walking surface of the path.

Play Area Drawings were available of phase 2 of the play area. The plan is to provide 2 further items of play equipment just outside of the fenced in play area together with a picnic bench and seating. The drawings will be available in the shop window in due course.

Art Funding As mentioned in the April issue of MADNews, some funds are available for funding an art project in the parish. Ideas so far are for bench seating, lighting on the path from Howard Cornish Road to Harding Way, and a project at the war memorial. A new suggestion made at

the meeting was for a noticeboard. Anyone who wishes to put forward any other suggestion should contact the parish clerk as soon as possible.

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JEAN CREASY: 10 JUNE 1930 – 1 MAY 2024



Jean Margaret Monk was born in London but soon after her birth the family moved to Exeter in Devon where Jean's sister Mary was born in 1934. The war years, as well as instilling her life-long sense of frugality, held a lot of memories for Jean, including their house being bombed: they survived by hiding under their reinforced kitchen table. Jean enjoyed school and worked hard, doing well and making several life-long friendships. Meeting a young French woman, Anne Frechet was to be a life-changing event as it introduced Jean to France. Anne's sister Colette remembers Jean and Anne as being very similar: full of energy, good at organising the younger ones (could we say «bossy»?!) and both with a strong Christian faith.

Jean won a place at Homerton teacher training college in Cambridge where she met her future husband, Donald, who was studying engineering at Caius. On Jean's 21st birthday Donald gave her 21 presents: the last an engagement ring and they were married in 1952, honeymooning on the Thames in a punt. After graduating from Homerton Jean was offered a place to read French at the Sorbonne university in Paris - but the role of wife was seen to be a full time job and she turned it down. Jean and Donald's first daughter, Susan, was born in 1955, and soon after Donald was offered an engineering post in Nigeria, first in Lagos and then Bamenda in the Southern Cameroons in 1958. Jean was always a «doer» and set up a playgroup for expat children and found ways of buying food collectively to ensure its quality and freshness. There were difficulties but Jean was not one to complain and one of her phrases was «swallow it down». She lived every experience to the full and made the most of each situation that she was in. Jillian was born in Nigeria and Ruth in the Cameroons and in 1960 they all returned to move into a new home in Benson on the day that Jean and Donald's fourth child, Helen, was born. Family lore has it that when the shocked midwife who was waiting with Jean to be picked up was told that they were on the way to their new house she said to Donald «I never would have let her go if I'd known» to which Donald replied «That's why I didn't tell you!»

The family spent 18 years in Benson putting time and energy into home and community - Donald was the chairman of the Parish Council and Jean ran the Sunday school.

Life was full, but Susan was very ill with hospital stays and in 1967, Susan died aged 11. It was the only time Jillian remembers seeing Donald cry as he told them the news.

Jean shared with Elizabeth (after her own daughter had died) that she was only able to keep going because the other children and other people, needed her.

With the old connection with the Frechet family still strong, Jean and Donald sold the Benson house and bought their first house in Cevennes, France and Yeomans Cottage in Marcham. Jean was then working at the Manor Prep school in Abingdon where she became assistant head.

Later they bought a bigger house in Molieres and they both took early retirement and spent 6 months in France and 6 months in England. English support for school children, playing the organ in church, singing in the choir, being involved in voluntary work (of course), discovering French food and culture, walking in the hills and entertaining a never ending stream of visitors who came back year after year were only some of their activities.

Jean loved small children and being a small child in Jean's care meant that you never had time to get bored: making, doing, being outside, reading, and, above all, learning. «Happy» and «busy» were key words for Jean and usually went hand in hand. Jean's occupations are legendary: calligraphy, cakes and shortbread, orange wine and elder flower cordial, gardening, singing, scrabble, walking, chatting to people, the French conversation group, feeding the birds and, of course, making and sending cards. If everyone who reads this made a personal commitment to send one card to someone once a week for the rest of our lives...Jean's output might possibly be matched! Perhaps this could be her legacy! Always busy, Jean told Gemma, (one of her Belle Vie helpers) «I dislike an empty day. I feel guilty if I am unable to do something every day to help someone else, a small gesture, such as a card to someone helps me feel as if I have made a difference to someone else». She believed in community and fairness and wherever she saw a need she was there: volunteering in the shop, helping with the lunch club, visiting people who were housebound. She truly lived out her strong Christian faith. She was curious about others and was interested in their beliefs: a friend of Ellizabeth's, Soulayman, a Moslem, loved talking to her about God and said that Jean «really understands». Jean was thoughtful, loved people and had a huge capacity for kindness. Debbie, her neighbour, said that she saw the best in everyone and was happy to accost strangers walking down Mill Road to help her with something she couldn't do herself. Not that there were many people she didn't know in Marcham!

Jean listened to other people's problems more than she talked about her own, so that others rarely knew what was making her life tricky. Even when thinking about her own funeral she didn't want to put people out. At the top of the list of ideas that she had jotted down to help organise this thanksgiving service (which included «flowers for cheerfulness») was written «not to be followed if inconvenient».

After Donald died in 2013, Jean's health

deteriorated, but these problems that only slowed her down to the speed of a normal human being (Jillian talked about trying to find a support group for people with hyper active parents). Determination was Jean's life force and when she broke her pelvis a few years ago, staying with Helen and her family in Edinburgh; John, her son-in-law, enabled her walking up and down the stairs to their third floor flat, exercise recommended by the physio, remembered her with gritted teeth and tears in her eyes with the pain, but refusing to stop.

Her steely will and the support of Ruth and Mike enabled her to make the long journey to visit France one last time in the summer of 2023. Jean visited familiar haunts, her only complaint was that the old ladies were harder to understand as they had less teeth...but she then reflected that perhaps her deafness also played a part!

In the past few years Jean needed more support as her eyesight and hearing got worse and other problems became more apparent, and she was diagnosed with vascular dementia. Although everyday things were manageable, anything out of the ordinary was often a source of anxiety. She continued to think of others though, arranging the Santons in her window at Christmas (she put a low stool outside so that children going past could see the scene too) and continuing to make and send cards. With home care from Belle Vie (who Jean called her «Blessed Virgins»!) and regular support from Jillian and Jim, Jean was able to stay at home ... she desperately did not want to go into care. This helped her to keep doing the things that she loved...filling the bird feeders, planting sweet pea seeds, walking down the road, speaking French and swimming. The BVs all remember her as someone who listened to them...and it was a BV, Ali, who found her the morning of her stroke and stayed with her until she was taken to hospital.

Jean spent three weeks in hospital where «everyone is so kind» and then a few last days in a care home in Abingdon. Neighbours and friends called in to say goodbye and it was very moving for her daughters to be able to share some of those moments with them; hearing their appreciation and respect for Jean enabled them to see her through other people's eyes.

All of the daughters spent time with her, reassuring her that she could leave this world when she was ready...and Elizabeth told her that if heaven exists she surely had a good place waiting for her: the Pearly Gates were already wide open, no need to even knock, the trumpets were already polished and Saint Peter forewarned, and Donald, Susan and Roisin and all her old friends were impatient to have her with them again and share a good laugh. And after such a long life, lived to the full and shared generously with so many people, those of us staying behind needed only to bid her adieu and joyfully wish her «Bon voyage».

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LANDLINES & MARCHAM VILLAGE SHOP AND POST OFFICE

Changes to Telephone Landlines

The UK's telephone network is being upgraded, which means that landline services are changing. You can still have a landline in your home, but the technology that powers it will be different. This means that in future, landline calls will be delivered over digital technology called Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP), which uses a broadband (internet) connection.

For most, switching over will be straightforward, but some people may need new equipment or support to make the changes.

The decision to upgrade has been made by industry, not Ofcom (the telecommunications ombudsman) or the UK Government. However, Ofcom does have rules that telephone suppliers have to adhere to, in order to protect customers in power cuts, and to require phone companies to provide access to emergency calls.

Your supplier will let you know when they are moving you. For example, BT who are rolling it out region by region, will begin making the change in **Oxfordshire** in spring 2024. If you already have a broadband connection, you may only need to plug your phone into your broadband router or use an adapter to connect your phone and router together.

Contact your telephone supplier and let them know if you:

- Have a disability or any other needs that mean you will need extra help with this change - including a pendant/wrist alarm or other telecare devices. If yours is supplied by Oxfordshire-based Carium, they will be in touch.
- Don't have a mobile phone or if the mobile phone signal at your home is too poor to ring for emergency services

Your telephone supplier may be able to delay changing your system or provide additional help during the change.

What effect the change will have on your phone number and bill?

- You will be able to keep your current phone number.
- Your supplier will be able to offer you a telephone plan at the same cost you currently pay, or you can choose to upgrade your service, if you wish.

If you are in any doubt about your phone service or any of your devices that rely on a phone line, it is best to act now and contact your telephone supplier.

It's exam season. Many of our young people have been sitting GSCE and A level examinations. We are not quite at that stage in my household yet, but we will be next year. Already though, it feels like our children have had quite a few years of relatively serious exams, ones with things riding on them. I sympathise with the view that children are tested too much too early these days, potentially placing undue stress on young lives. We do need to let children be children. But we also need to gently help them get used to the pressure of exams too, thereby preparing them for the testing world in which we live. Exam season is a good time to learn to trust... trust your revision (assuming you have done some), trust your ability to shine through at the right time, and if you are a parent, trust your child to give a good account of themself. Like everyone, I have had some exams that went surprisingly well and some that went surprisingly badly. But in both situations, I learnt to trust that neither eventuality was the absolute guarantee of anything. Doing well is great, but doing badly often serves as a valuable life lesson too. Ultimately life is testing, and when it is I have found trusting in a loving God who has our best interests at heart makes a huge difference. Sometimes my best interests have been to learn lessons the hard way... that no work means poor marks, and that sometimes things can go wrong even when we are well prepared. That's life, and God never promised it would be easy. But there is a Bible promise that says "in all things God works for the good of those who love him." (Rom 8:28) That "good" may not always seem good at the time, but in time, because of God's character, it always turns out for our good. God calls us to put childlike trust in him, and in my experience he never lets us down especially through testing times. 

The emerging Joint Local Plan and plans for the Dalton Barracks site redevelopment in particular; pushing back against Thames Water's plans for a huge reservoir to our south; contributing to the Vale's climate and environment policies; and a plethora of smaller issues. Roll on 2024-25!

COMMUNITY SPIRIT

The fantastic success of Marcham Big Weekend was a testament to the village's community spirit: the great turnout was a clear indication of a strong appetite among residents to spend time with one another – although the glorious weather may also have contributed! Such events don't appear spontaneously however, and we owe the organisers huge thanks. The ties that bind our community together are created and maintained by volunteers: ordinary people who give up their time to help make Marcham such a wonderful place to live. Organisations around the village are in need of more support, though, so please consider helping if you can: the Parish Council, Thirsty Café, MAD News, and many others have roles in need of filling.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

We are awaiting election results for our new county councillor.

MP'S REPORT

I have had a number of meetings in the last month to progress various local campaigns that are a priority for me and my constituents.

I met with the Health Minister to again push my campaign for better local health services and for our infrastructure to keep pace with all the new housing that is being built. This is a priority for the Government, too. For the year ending October 2023, there were 50.9 million more GP appointments compared to October 2019 - but there's more to do. Improving our health services is a key campaign for me and I am pleased the Minister has agreed to write to the local health leaders on our behalf.

I met with the Water Minister to again raise constituent concerns about the proposed reservoir and to call for public scrutiny of the proposal. In December, I wrote to the Environment Secretary about this, echoing GARD's call for public scrutiny and have been regularly

raising concerns with **Thames Water** and the **Environment Agency**, who I took to Steventon recently where I discussed it with them.

This meeting came just before we got the great news that Wallingford Beach has officially been designated as a bathing water site by the Government. This is something that residents have long been calling for and the Water Minister has rightly recognised the strong show of local support.

I took **Niamh Dernie**, from Grove, to meet the Minister for Victims and Safeguarding so she could tell the Minister about her campaign against the sexual harassment she and her friends have experienced and what she would like to see happen.

It was also great to welcome the Science Minister to meet with and take questions from our great local science and technology organisations at my latest Wantage and Didcot Science and Technology Forum. I was glad to hear the Minister confirm that the Government will spend £20 billion on investment in science and research this year which is welcome news for our local sector.

In other news, I had the pleasure of hosting a reception at Number 10 Downing Street for people working in our great early years sector and was pleased to bring **Julie**, a childminder from Didcot who spent 14 years fostering around 30 families, as my guest to recognise her incredible efforts. It was a really uplifting atmosphere as MPs from across the country brought people they wanted to thank for the work they have been doing to shape young minds as well as to help deliver this Government's record expansion of childcare.

Didcot TRAIN works with young people, especially those who are disadvantaged or vulnerable and provides various essential services including youth clubs, mentoring and outreach programmes. They are doing great work to empower young people. Thank you to Ben and the team at Didcot TRAIN who

UKRAINE / YKPAÏHA

To mark the anniversary of the invasion of Ukraine, Paul asked Olga to give MADNews some insights. The interview was recorded and translated from Ukrainian into English by a Marcham resident (Yaro) whose native language is not English so apologies for any mistakes.



Q1: Where were you when the war started 2 years ago?

My 2 years old son Leva and myself were in Odesa (south of Ukraine - from the translator). My husband was working under contract in the Czech Republic. His contract was ending 3.03.2022, but his visa was extended under the scheme to help Ukrainians. We had a shock and did not know what to do during the first days after the Russian invasion. I had to admit that there was a small hope that the war was not going to last long, but soon we realised that this was wrong thinking. knew that we could not join my husband since he was living in the shared dormitory type accommodation in the Czech Republic. On 3.03.2022 my friend with her children and ourselves decided to go abroad by car. We stuck at the Moldova border and after waiting for 24 hours we got cold, tired and hungry and had to come back to home in Odesa. After we took a decision to go on evacuation train to Lviv. After arriving we got very scared when we saw military planes flying above our heads. Our thoughts were that we escaped Odesa to die here. I have to admit We were relieved when we saw Ukrainian flags on the planes. After we took a bus to the Czech Republic. We arrived only after 2 days and waited 15 hours at the border. To make it short we changed 3 different places near Praha in 4 months. The most important thing was that we were safe. My husband was able to join us and find a job in the same town where we lived.

Q2: Why have you chosen to go to the UK?

In May I found out that there is a possibility to go to the UK under the home for Ukrainian scheme. I have some level of English knowledge so I would have better chances to find a job and it would be useful for Leva to study English. After first look atl the requirements I thought that we are not going to be eligible, however after double checking with a volunteering organisation we were told that we should try to apply. My husband and I got our UK visas after 1 month but Leva's visa was delayed for 4 months. We were very worried thinking that our hosts are not going to wait for so long... Meantime we had to go back to Odesa since my mother was ill and Leva got his first international passport. So we made a new UK visa application for my son with his new passport. Eventually Leva's UK entry was cleared for the application which was formally cancelled Had to contact the UK Home Office and they said it should be ok. However we were stressed until we crossed the UK border in October 2022.

Q3: How was your host family?

They were simply amazing. The most kind and supportive family one could wish to meet in our circumstances. We were feeling very welcomed. Even though we moved to Abingdon in September 2023 due to Leva starting at the Europa School and to be more independent, we stay connected with our host family and new friends we met in Marcham. I can say without hesitation that I have part of a family here. Also I am happy to add that our host family continue to help us and they are currently helping my mother who has recently relocated from Odesa, which is constantly under shelling as you might know from the news, to Marcham. She cooks delicious Ukrainian food (yummy - from the translator).

Q4: How do you find living in the UK?

Better than I imagined (smiling). Very nice country and lovely people. My husband was able to quickly find a job. My son met lots of new friends in school. And I am improving my English and looking for a job. So I feel like we become part of the local community.

Q5: When do you think the war in Ukraine will end?

Difficult one. The main problem is that our 'neighbour' is not going to disappear anywhere so even after the end of the war it is going to be extremely difficult to plan anything and imagine a peaceful and safe life in Ukraine. However as they say 'where there's life there's hope'! Our family would like to say a huge thank you to the UK and its people for continued support to our country and Ukrainians during the last two years.

RESERVOIR NEWS



GARD is a local community group formed to campaign against Thames Water'
proposals to build a reservoir south-west of Abjurdon.

News from GARD

When GARD issued its call for a Public Inquiry, we asked via Freedom of Information request to see the Environment Agency's advice to Secretary of State, Steve Barclay, on the Thames Water plans.



Finally last month, DEFRA agreed to our request and released the EA's advice, revealing that the EA have serious

reservations about the plan, and quite a few of these echo GARD's criticisms about lack of substantiation that SESRO represents the best value plan, and our doubt on its resilience to droughts, amongst others. However, the most important take-away from this advice is the EA recommendation on page 6-7 in the Executive Summary:

"We recommend that:

Thames Water is not allowed to publish its plan. The company should make further changes as set out in ... These changes will require regulators to review them before the company's plan is allowed to be published. We also advise that due to the public interest shown in the consultation that Defra considers whether further public scrutiny is required before the plan is published."

Not being allowed to "publish the plan" equates to the plan not being acceptable as it stands. Clearly our call for a Public Inquiry has stayed Barclay's hand, reinforced by the EA opinion.

There are many forms of further 'public scrutiny', e.g. a consultation of a "revised-revised-draft Plan"(!), but we believe the most efficient, in-depth, and probably even the quickest, would be a Public Inquiry.

Please write to DEFRA supporting our call for a Public Inquiry into this dangerous, damaging, and unnecessary project, citing the Environment Agency opinion.
