#### MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL

The Council which manages the children's play area in the Anson Field, was shocked again to learn of more nails being glued to the play equipment in a second incident.

This is being investigated. It apologises for any inconvenience whilst it had to close the play area for a short while to enable safety checks to be made.

Again it would remind anyone using the play area should follow playground equipment rules:

· Look before using

- Be mindful of surroundings
- Take care when using, or even avoid, wet equipment
- Wear appropriate clothing
- Play games away from playground equipment

The play area working party has been progressing the next stage of play equipment, and bench seating, and has taken the comments from residents into account. 2 items of much lower height equipment are now planned for outside of the fenced area, and drawings have been in the Post Office window, and were presented at the annual meeting for electors. It is hoped that the installation can take place late August.

You will need to show your photographic ID before being issued with a ballot paper. You will not be able to vote unless you have proof of ID with you.

#### PARISHIONER OF THE YEAR

Each year Marcham Parish Council invites nominations for a Parishioner of the Year Award. This is usually given to an individual or individuals who have made a real difference to the community. ### GRASS CUTTING AND OVERHANGING TREES AND HEDGES

It is that time of year when we are all out cutting grass, trimming hedges, and managing our gardens. Please can residents who live adjacent to public roads and footpaths, kindly keep any growth which is overhanging, cut back. The rural paths can become quite dark and soaked, when low wet branches are overhanging. In turn, later in the year leaf fall causes the paths to become extra muddy. As Marcham village grows, more and more people are walking the paths, and it is therefore important that they be kept clear so that they remain light, and are able to dry out. The Parish Council has a contractor who strims any growth from the floor, but help from residents is needed to help keep the overhanging growth from their gardens trimmed.

### RECYCLING AND WASTE COLLECTION

The Vale of White Horse District Council provides a successful recycling and waste collection service for all its residents in the district. In addition the recycling centre at Drayton is open 8.00 a.m. – 5.00 p.m. 7 days a week. If visiting the Drayton site, please remember that a booking scheme is in operation for non-household DIY waste so please visit Drayton household waste recycling centre on the Oxfordshire County Council for more information – www. oxfordshire.gov.uk – as you may need to book a slot for your visit.

Please do not fly tip grass and garden waste on highway verges, private land, paths, or any recreation area, as such action interferes with the enjoyment of these areas.

## ART PROJECTS FOR MARCHAM - LAST CHANCE TO COMMENT

The Vale of White Horse District Council collects contributions from housing developers towards art in the district. There are some funds which are at risk of being returned to the developers should they not be used soon. The current thinking is to aim to use some of them for a noticeboard in the village, as the former one outside the Institute was taken down when it was converted to housing. #### MARCHAM PARISHIONERS OF THE YEAR 2024

In 2015 Jill and Neil Rowe had a vision for a community café which could have a huge benefit to Marcham. They quickly formed a small team of willing people to take the project forward, and during Jill and Neil's 'Welcome to Marcham' house calls for new residents, they were extremely fortunate to recruit Sarah Lunn who had the experience and qualities to make a significant contribution towards the project. A formal committee was established and Thirsty Café was underway. At this point plans for the new village hall were taking shape, and it was clear that this would be the perfect place for the community café.

Funding was next on the list and successfully obtained through various grants and organisations, along with volunteer training and the completion of hygiene certificates.

Thirsty Café currently has sixty-six volunteers which include young people undertaking their Duke of Edinburgh Awards, table and chair set-up team, chefs and baking teams, washer-ups, front of house, servers and kitchen staff. There are also two employees – an Administrator and a Manager. Both staff and volunteers have contributed to the café's admirable success, enabling Thirsty Café to offer annual grants to local clubs and organisations – their current aim is to contribute £2,000 per year into the community.

Thirsty Café took a few years to come to fruition, including the challenging times of Covid, but their aims have been achieved by providing superior quality local food, helping people back to work, assisting those with mental health difficulties and loneliness – thus giving a wonderful service to the people of Marcham.

This award is befitting to a brilliant team who are giving their time for the benefit of so many. Thirsty Café is an exemplar of a 'community contributing to a community'.





Girlguiding Oxfordshire teams up with Sobell House to launch a limited edition OxTrail challenge badge



Girlguiding Oxfordshire has teamed up with Sobell House Hospice to launch a limited-edition challenge badge for this year's OxTrail, Oxford's first ever art sculpture trail, in aid of Sobell House Hospice, which takes over the city from 6 July 2024 for 8 weeks.

Girlguiding Oxfordshire are currently fundraising for four mini oxen; one each for the Rainbow, Brownie, Guide and Ranger sections. These oxen will be displayed in the Westgate Shopping Centre.

The challenge badges are £1.50 each, plus post and packaging and are available online to all girl guides across the UK. The fundraising for the oxen will be from the sales of this challenge badge, as they strive to reach their £4,000 target for Sobell House.

As part of the trail, Sobell House has teamed up with Oxford Brookes University to offer the OxTrail Learning Programme to engage with children across the county; to date more than 37,580 young people have had access to the educational tools.

Once the trail is over, many of the sculptures from the trail will be auctioned off to graze in their forever homes. The funds raised through the auction will help to fund the lifeenhancing care that Sobell House Hospice provides.







## Top tips for hot weather



- Listen to the news and check your local weather forecast so you know when hot weather is expected.
- Make sure you're drinking plenty of fluids at least 6–8 glasses of liquid a day. Don't wait until you're thirsty to drink, and take a bottle of water with you when you're out and about.
- Wear loose, lightweight clothing.
- Stay away from very sugary or alcoholic drinks—these actually cause you to lose more body fluid.
- Know the symptoms of heat exhaustion/heatstroke and what to do
  if you or someone else has them.
- Public buildings such as places of worship, local libraries or supermarkets may be cooler than your home. If they are nearby, consider visiting one of these as a way of cooling down.

#### **OUT AND ABOUT**

- Don't spend too much time outside between 11am and 3pm, the hottest time of the day. Try and keep in the shade when you can.
- Look after your skin Use sunscreen of at least SPF 30. Apply it generously and top up regularly.
- Wear a hat to protect your head, face, ears and eyes.
- Choose sunglasses that have a CE mark and a UV400 label.

#### AT HOME

- Avoid using the oven to cook if you can, as it will make you and your home hotter.
- Keep your home cool by closing windows and curtains in rooms that face the sun.
- Check on friends and neighbours and ask someone to do the same for you.

#### **KNOW THÉ SIGNS**

Heat exhaustion occurs when the body overheats and cannot cool down. It does not usually need emergency medical attention if you cool down within 30 minutes. If you do not take action to cool down, heat exhaustion can lead to heatstroke. Common symptoms of heat exhaustion include tiredness, weakness, feeling faint, headache, muscle cramps, feeling or being sick, heavy sweating and intense thirst. Heatstroke is where the body is no longer able to cool down and the body temperature becomes dangerously high.

Common symptoms of heatstroke include confusion, lack of coordination, fast heartbeat, fast breathing or shortness of breath, hot skin (that is not sweating) and seizures.

Heatstroke is a medical emergency. If you think someone has heatstroke you should dial 999 and then try to cool them down. HOW TO COOL DOWN

- Move to a cooler place such as a room with air conditioning or somewhere in the shade.
- · Remove all unnecessary clothing like a jacket or socks.
- Drink cool water, a sports or rehydration drink, or eat cold and water rich foods like ice lollies.
- Apply cool water by spray or sponge to exposed skin. Using cold packs wrapped in a cloth and put under the armpits or on the neck can also help.

On 18th July six adults and seven teenagers will be travelling from All Saints' Church, Marcham to Moldova to run a Holiday Club in a village called Zumbreni, which is about half an hour from the capital Chisinau.

Inding Jesus Day by Da

The holiday club will run for three days and will be for children aged 9 - 13 years.

They will be staying in Chisinau for two nights and learning about Moldovan culture and visiting some important sights. Then they travel to Costesti where they will stay for the remainder of the trip, travelling to Zumbreni each day for the holiday club.

Moldova remains amongst the very poorest nations in Europe. The influx of Ukrainian refugees over the last two years has added further pressure. Many adults leave to travel west for work and send money back for the family remaining in the care of grandparents.

All Saints' church has had links with Moldova for the last 15 years through the charity *Agape*, providing much needed support through winter food parcels, providing equipment for schools and agriculture, and sending groups out for visits.

This trip will be one of the final events in our supportive work as *Agape* will be no longer be operational by the end of this year.

There are many costs including flights, accommodation, food, transport whilst in Moldova and resources to run the holiday club. The team have already self-funded and raised money through grants and fund-raising.

#### **ELECTION FEVER**

By the time you read this, Marcham (together with Sutton Courtenay, Drayton, and surrounding areas) should have a new County Councillor, elected at the by-election on 20th June. I write before the result is announced but whoever they are, whatever party they represent, I look forward to working closely with them to serve our communities.

**Up next**: the General Election on 4th July. Please, please vote. I understand the frustration voiced by many on the doorstep that our political system isn't working as we might like it to, but giving up is no way to fix something. It is only by fighting for change that change will happen, and engaging with the democratic system is the best way to do so. And please remember to bring a valid form of Photo ID if you are casting your vote in person.

#### **THAMES WATER**

Thames Water (TW) have recently launched a consultation regarding SESRO, the proposed reservoir to the south of Marcham. A series of "community information events" are planned, including one in Marcham Village Hall on 18th July (2-8pm). The consultation will run until 28th August.

Of note in TW's Summary Brochure is a claim that the new reservoir would provide 271 million litres of water per day (Ml/d). Meanwhile, TW loses around 624 Ml/d due to leaks and is failing to achieve their target of reducing leaks by 162 Ml/d over 2024. Thames Water also faces a fine from Ofwat for breaching rules around paying a shareholder dividend despite its poor performance.

Ofwat has also suspended its draft determinations on the five-year spending and investment plans of all Britain's water companies (including TW) until after the General Election.

#### **FOOTPATHS**

As residents of the Monks Walk and Willow Farm housing developments will be aware, there has been a long-running issue over footpaths in and between the two areas. I have been working on getting this resolved since I was elected in May 2023, but it goes back many years beyond this. I'm therefore delighted to see that (1) the two developments are finally joined by a linking footpath and (2) the hoggin path on the Monks Walk side has been replaced with tarmac.

A huge thanks to everyone involved in getting us to this point, especially the Vale's Planning Enforcement Officer who worked tirelessly behind the scenes to coordinate the relevant organisations.


