

MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL

CLOSURE – SHEEPSTEAD ROAD

A temporary road closure for a section of Sheepstead Road just north of Harding Way is being planned for 7th September to 19th September. This is to allow for excavation for water services works. The route for Harding Way properties will be through the village. Those houses further along Sheepstead Road will have access from the north, off the Faringdon Road.

Please note therefore that the Cow Lane allotments area is unlikely to be accessible by car if you approach from the south, should the road closure become operative.

PLAY AREA

The Parish Council has been working with the playground manufacturer, following completion of phase I inside the fence, to progress the play area plans shown initially in May 2023 which included 2 items of equipment just outside of the play area fence. All the comments received at that time were taken into account, and the plans reworked. The manufacturer's revised drawings were exhibited at the annual meeting for electors this year, and displayed in the Post Office. comments received subsequent have also been fully debated.

At the time of writing, installation of the additional items is expected soon. The location of the items is the best achievable bearing in and the need to protect all users of the field, protect the sports pitches, and occupants of housing, whilst providing facilities for a fast growing village.

VOLUNTEERS FOR SPEEDWATCH

Do you wish to help control the speed of traffic in the parish? Community Speedwatch is a national initiative where proactive members of local communities, with the support and supervision of their local police, join to record details of speeding vehicles using approved detection devices. There is a small team in Marcham that needs more people to join them to go out, once trained, to selected places in the parish, with the speed detection gun, and to record speeds and registration numbers of vehicles. Details of those exceeding the speed limit are given to the Police, who then write to the registered keeper of the vehicle. If you can spare an odd hour or so from time to time and are willing to help with the Speedwatch campaign, then please contact James Plumb at Jamesplumb22@gmail.com or by telephoning 07779 386205, or contact your local parish councillor.

The Parish Council is pleased to see that the paths on Monks Walk have now been tarmacked by the developer and the link through to The Willows has now been installed. There is a gate on the link with a latch which may be difficult for those with disabilities to open, so this is being monitored.

WINTER FUEL PAYMENT - MESSAGE FOR PENSIONERS

you are concerned about the lf announcement Chancellor from the Rachel Reeves regarding the change in the qualifying rules for the Winter Fuel Payment, then organisations such as Age UK, Citizens Advice Bureau and Vale Community Impact in Wantage can help. They have trained advisors who can help with benefit checks, budgeting and debt management, or can point you in the right direction for advice. Please do not worry in silence. The organisations are there to help and support you.

Their contact details are on the respective websites, or for assistance please speak to your local councillor.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS CONSIDERED

P24/V1299/FUL Proposed change of use from residential dwelling to registered children's residential home at 8B The Gap. The Council had various concerns regarding the need for support from the County Council, safeguarding policies, the stated number of employees at the site being 14, and likely numerous traffic and transport movements in The Gap.

P24/V1326/FUL Erection of new 3 bed dwelling at Blackgate Lane (off A338). The Council objected to development in the green belt, access off the A338 which crossed public footpaths, the overshadowing effect on those paths, lack of parking, and the effect on the special areas of conservation which were close by. P24/V1359/HH Single storey, part rear and part side, extension at 6 Pointer Place.

The Council had no objection. P24/V1513/HH Two storey rear extension at 13 North Street. The Council had no objection in principle, but asked that the materials used be in keeping with the remainder of the building in the conservation area, and that in view of the increase in the number of bedrooms and therefore occupants, that there be adequate on site parking to prevent vehicles being left in the

narrow North Street. **Date of Next Council Meeting**

Monday 9th September at 7.30pm in the Village Hall, Barrow Close OX13 6TY.

The Council meetings are open to the public, and the Council welcomes anyone who has issues to raise on parish matters to attend, or speak to their local parish councillor.

The Winter Fuel Payment will now only be paid to people receiving certain benefits. It's more important than ever to check if you're eligible for Pension Credit.

CHANGES TO THE WINTER FUEL PAYMENT

Did you know that the Government announced changes in July, meaning that from this year the Winter Fuel Payment will become means-tested?

This means that you will no longer receive the Winter Fuel Payment unless you are in receipt of certain benefits.

WHAT IS THE WINTER FUEL PAYMENT?

The Winter Fuel Payment is an annual tax-free payment for households that include someone born on or before 23rd September 1958 (for 2024-25) designed to help cover heating costs in winter, with households receiving up to £300. Previously, the payment was not meantested, but now only those in receipt of certain benefits will receive the contribution to heating costs.

HOW CAN I CONTINUE TO RECEIVE IT?

Pension Credit is the primary way people of pension age can continue to receive the Winter Fuel Payment, and with an estimate of more than 4,000 older people across the county not claiming the Pension Credit to which they're entitled, it's more important than ever that you check whether you might be eligible.

Pension Credit is an income-related benefit that tops up weekly income to £218.15 for a single person and to a joint £332.95 for a couple.





The Belvoir drinks have been a big hit, and we also had some lovely handsoap dispensers – great for presents! Apparently, our boxes of Twinings teas are cheaper than a lot of the big supermarkets. We will endeavour to continue stocking a variety of items and, hopefully, keep the price as low as possible.

As in previous years, we stocked a selection of plants over the summer. These included Echinacea plants, begonias and hanging baskets. In addition, some of the volunteers who are keen gardeners have been donating their excess fruit and vegetables to the shop. England's Oldest Town? The Archaeology of Abingdon

Roger is a professional archaeologist who grew up in Abingdon. He spent most of his career working in archaeological roles at English Heritage (now Historic England). He is also currently chairman of the Abingdon Area Archaeology & History Society (AAAHS).

Abingdon famously claims to be 'the oldest town in England' – the oldest continuously occupied town in the country. Taking this claim as a starting point, Roger's talk will look at the impressively rich archaeology of Abingdon and its environs, which has major sites and discoveries of every period from prehistory onwards. The talk will also consider the relationship between the archaeology of Abingdon and that of Marcham, including the important Roman temple site at Manor Farm, Marcham.

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

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Birds and Their Quirky Nesting Habits: A Comedy of Twigs and Feathers

A young Reader sent me an interesting question to churn on this month, and I wonder what you think the answer is? Not sure I gave a great answer, but it was humorous.

The question, "why do different birds use different types of nest design?"

Ah, the age-old mystery of avian architecture! Why indeed do birds have such wildly diverse nest-building preferences? Let's dive into this feathered conundrum with all the seriousness of a penguin trying to fly.

Picture this: a Wood Pigeon perched on a branch, surveying the world with its beady eyes. It glances at the nearby nest, a haphazard collection of twigs that looks like it was assembled by a tipsy squirrel. The pigeon shrugs, mutters, "Good enough," and settles in for a cosy night's sleep. Meanwhile, the Long Tailed Tit is inside its mossy ball, sipping herbal tea and reading "Nest & Garden" magazine. Clearly, these birds have different interior design tastes.

The Minimalist Approach

Wood Pigeons are the Marie Kondo of the bird world. Their philosophy: "If it doesn't spark joy, chuck it off the branch!" Their nests consist of a few twigs, a leaf, and maybe a lost sock. They're the original tiny-house enthusiasts. When asked about their design process, Wood Pigeons reply, "We're going for that 'rustic twig chic' look."

The Hipster of Nests

Goldfinches are the hipsters of the avian world. They use horsehair, because nothing says "trendy" like repurposing equestrian accessories. Their nests perch atop small trees, looking like bristly beards. If you listen closely, you can hear them discussing obscure indie bands with their nest neighbours.

The DIY Enthusiasts

Blue Tits are the MacGyvers of nest-building. They find a hole (preferably in a tree), gather moss, twigs, and a dash of optimism, and voilà! Their nests are cosy, energy-efficient, and equipped with Wi-Fi. When predators approach, Blue Tits activate their secret defence mechanism: they play dead. It's like a Shakespearean tragedy with feathers.

The Twig Collectors

Blackbirds are the hoarders of the bird world. Their nests are like miniature art installations made from twigs, leaves, and existential dread. They take indirect routes to confuse predators, leaving breadcrumbs (literally) to their nests. When asked about their design inspiration, Blackbirds say, "We're going for a 'chaotic yet thought-provoking' vibe."

The Urban Architects

Pied Wagtails are the urban dwellers. They build nests in dry stone walls, like tiny real estate moguls. Their motto: "Location, location, location!" When a predator approaches, they perform a synchronized dance routine to distract it. It's like "Riverdance" meets "Property Brothers."

Ground-Level Innovators

Chiffchaffs are the rebels. They nest on the ground or low in trees, defying gravity and common sense. Their nests resemble cosy burritos made of dried leaves and grass. When asked about their design philosophy, Chiffchaffs say, "We're all about that 'groundbreaking' aesthetic."

McMansion Builders

Mute Swans are the real estate tycoons. They construct massive nests on riverbanks, complete with infinity pools and walk-in closets. Their nests are so opulent that other birds apply for timeshares. When predators approach, Mute Swans hiss, "You shall not pass!" (Yes, they're secretly Gandalf fans.)

Conclusion

So, why are bird nests so diverse? Perhaps it's because birds, like humans, have unique tastes, personalities, and Pinterest boards. Or maybe they're just messing with us. Next time you see a nest, remember behind those twigs and feathers lies a world of architectural drama, rivalling any reality TV show. And as the sun sets, the Wood Pigeon nods approvingly at its twiggy abode, thinking, "Home sweet home... until the next gust of wind."


And that, my feathered friends, is the secret to avian interior design: a dash of chaos, a sprinkle of creativity, and a whole lot of bird-brained brilliance.





There were so many wonderful sporting achievements to celebrate at the Olympics Games this summer, and shortly there will be the Paralympics to enjoy as well. But a name from the past has been mentioned alongside all the present-day athletes who have been competing in Paris. It is 100 years since Eric Liddell famously won the 400 metres in 1924, a moment immortalized in the 1981 film Chariots of Fire; cue Vangelis music. Liddell represented Scotland at rugby as well, but he kept a promise to God, and to his sister, to cut short his sporting career to go back to China, the country of his birth, to serve as a Christian missionary teacher. He died tragically young of a brain tumour in 1945 in an internment camp. Perhaps mainly due to the film (and the music) his story, and that of his friend and rival Harold Abrahams, lives on. "I believe that God made me for a purpose. But He also made me fast, and when I run, I feel His pleasure." It's stirring stuff. Pleasure... we dedicate so much energy seeking pleasure for ourselves in the way we spend our time and our money. But what about God's pleasure in us? Do we aspire to know his pleasure in us by living our lives in the manner and for the purpose he designed them? This seems to be the promise of Jesus when he said that he came so that his followers could live lives to the full (John 10:10). This requires two simple acts of faith, to trust Jesus that he knows best, and to be prepared to surrender our self-will. Perhaps this is what the swimmer Adam Peaty meant when he said recently: "I'd rather have my faith and my relationship with Jesus and come second than have gold."

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

I hope that residents have enjoyed the summer, despite the decidedly mixed weather. Huge amounts have happened since I wrote my report for the July issue, so I will try to distil the most important matters into the space available!

ALL CHANGE IN GOVERNMENT

The incoming Labour Government has already announced its intention to "reset" the relationship between central government and local authorities. The overall positive tone is very welcome, with Deputy PM Angela Rayner committing to working with local government on a cross-party basis, but it is not difficult to imagine potential disagreements over the details which may test this noble ambition. Much of this will emerge over the coming months and I will do my best to update you on matters that impact local residents the most.

RESERVOIR

I hope that readers were able to attend one of the SESRO events put on by Thames Water (TW) over the summer; the Marcham event was certainly well attended when I visited. The non-statutory consultation has now closed; the Vale submitted a 'robust' response to this, highlighting the lack of crucial information provided, among other concerns. The leader of the Vale, Cllr Thomas, has also written to the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, Steve Reed MP, to request

- a pause in the approval process for TW's draft Water Resource Management Plan,
- for serious consideration to be given to alternatives such as the Severn to Thames Transfer – and
- for a meeting together with our local MPs.

FOOD TRUCKS AT THE CROWN INN

Many residents will remember the 'kerfuffle' between the Vale and Oak Taverns, owners of The Crown in Marcham, over licensing of food trucks operating from their premises. The Vale has a statutory duty to license such activities, under the 1982 Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, and so could not lawfully ignore these. That said, the Vale's Joint Street Trading Policy (together with South Oxfordshire) has seen little revision since its adoption in 2014, and much has changed in that time – most notably, the pandemic and associated shifts in economic behaviour.

I have been pushing behind the scenes for a rethink on this and so

am delighted to pass on news that the Policy is due a substantial rewriting, news which was first announced in response to my formal question to the relevant cabinet member at July's full council. The new draft policy should go out for consultation soon and I encourage residents to respond.
