MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL PLAY AREA

Progress is being made with the installation of the new play items in the Anson field. This project, aimed at enhancing the recreational facilities for our community, has been eagerly anticipated by residents of all ages. The installation has been carried out by a team of professionals who have ensured that all equipment has been set up according to the manufacturer's guidelines and relevant standards. At the time of writing, a post installation inspection will be required, once everything is complete to ensure safety for public use. The equipment should be accessible soon. Two picnic benches, and a seat are also being added.

VOLUNTEERS FOR SPEEDWATCH

Would you like to help manage traffic speed in the parish? Community Speedwatch is a national initiative where proactive community members, with the support and supervision of local police, record details of speeding vehicles using approved detection devices.

The small team in Marcham needs more volunteers to join them. Once trained, you'll go to selected locations in the parish with a speed detection gun to record vehicle speeds and registration numbers. Details of those exceeding the speed limit are given to the police, who then contact the vehicle's registered keeper.

MEETING WITH **OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL**

Some Parish Councillors, Clerk, and the County Councillor met officers from the County Council's highway engagement team to talk about road matters, and to show them the issues such as overhanging hedge growth, potholes, and obscured vision at road junctions that Marcham residents face. General discussion took place too about the A415, speeding traffic, and the new entrance into Bloors site and the crossing for cyclists. The County Council took away with them a note of various points that they were going to investigate. The Highways Engagement Team is newly formed, and is dedicated to enhancing the quality of our highways to ensure a smoother, safer journey for all. The visit allowed them to better understand the local concerns, assess the situation on the ground and they will work with the Parish Council to find the best solutions to the local problems. If anyone has a highways issue, then please continue to use Fix My Street, as items listed there are transferred to the new team.

ALLOTMENT RENT COLLECTION

The Clerk will soon be collecting allotment rents for the year 24/25. It would be helpful if, in due course, tenants could arrange

to transfer the rent amount due straight into the Council's bank account via online transfer. Details of the amount payable will be available shortly. Any tenant not having online banking can still send a cheque payable to Marcham Parish Council for the amount due to the Clerk's address at 90 Howard Cornish Road, Marcham.

APPEAL TO BE CONSIDERATE TO **NEIGHBOURS**

As Halloween approaches, children may be eager to go out trick or treating. While this is usually a fun activity, it can be unsettling for some residents who receive unexpected visitors. If you plan to go out, please respect those who do not wish to participate.

For those who receive unexpected callers, ensure your door chain or bar is secured before opening the door. Only allow entry to individuals whose identity you are comfortable with. For police assistance, call 101 or dial 999 in an emergency.

Fireworks - Although it is only October, fireworks night in early November is fast approaching. Please plan ahead and be considerate of your neighbours and the many pets and animals in the village when setting off fireworks.

Fungi of Oxfordshire's Golden Triangle

Fungi come in a multitude of forms; from mushrooms, toadstools, brackets and boletes to puffballs, stinkhorns, coral fungi, rusts, smuts and mildews. Many are essential to plant and tree growth, some cause disease, many are important in decay and re-cycling. All sorts in many colourful forms are to be found in the exceptionally wildlife-rich area on the Jurassic Corallian sands of the Marcham – Cothill – Frilford area, the 'golden triangle'.

Judy Webb is a local ecologist who has been fascinated by fungi for many years and leads surveys for the Fungus Survey of Oxfordshire which is a local group who love fungi and are concerned with recording fungal species for conservation purposes. She rarely eats wild collected fungi and will happily tell you why.

A Young Naturalist's Safari

The other day, a young voice, wise beyond her years, posed a question that left me pondering the wonders of our garden's wildlife. "What creatures can be found in gardens during Spring, Summer, Autumn, and my favourite, Winter?" she asked, her eyes sparkling with curiosity.

Spring: The Awakening

Spring in the garden is like a grand opening of a nature-themed Broadway show. The ladybirds are the first to take the stage, their red and black polka-dotted costumes dazzling under the sun. Tadpoles wiggle in the pond, rehearsing their transformation into frogs. Winter, the young naturalist's favourite season, transforms the garden into a serene wonderland. Redwing birds, with their striking plumage, add a splash of colour to the bare branches. Regardless of the list, we're all part of the greater picture of a healthy and fully functional ecosystem. All playing a part, all having a place.

So next time you step into your garden, remember, you're not just an observer. You're a participant in this grand, everchanging play called nature.





Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labour in vain (Psalm 127:1). If you have walked past All Saints Church recently then you will have noticed that we have some work going on: Building for Community. At the west end, under the gallery, the kitchen is being enlarged and refurbished, with a new wide servery opening into the main body of the church. There will be a new universal access toilet on the ground floor with baby changing facilities, and a new toilet installed on the first floor next to the church office. It is the most significant reordering work at the church since the 1980's, and we hope it will significantly enhance the welcome we can offer to the parish for all church and community events. None of the work would be possible were it not for generous donations from the Anson Trust, Oxford Historic Churches Trust, Thames Water and many individual congregation and community members. Thank you. We have managed to raise £75k in grants and £45k from individual donors. The church council (PCC) also pledged up to £50k. It turns out that grants and donations will cover the cost of the internal works. This means that the PCC is able to fund repairs to the porch roof that suddenly became urgent over the summer. Classic Builders are doing both projects at the same time this autumn, and the work should be completed by Christmas. We look forward to inviting you in to enjoy the new facilities

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

RESERVOIR

Like many local residents and fellow council members, I was deeply disappointed by the news that the government has approved Thames Water's Water Resource Management Plan 2024 (WRMP24), thereby accepting the need for a 150 billion litre reservoir to the south of Marcham. The leader of the Vale, Cllr Thomas, had previously written to the Secretary of State (SoS) for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, Steve Reed MP, to ask for a meeting to discuss the reservoir and alternatives. The SoS has not even responded to the letter, never mind agreeing to the meeting. I wrote in last month's report that the government had made positive noises about building a better relationship with local government: when it comes to them turning words into deeds, this has not been a good start.

As for the next steps, there is currently an Environmental Impact Assessment Scoping consultation in progress. Thames Water is preparing a Development Consent Order (DCO) application for submission in 2026, which will again be decided by central government.

JOINT LOCAL PLAN

Residents may remember from my earlier reports that the Vale's emerging Joint Local Plan (together with South Oxfordshire) was due to go out for a final consultation in early 2025 so that it could be submitted to the Planning Inspectorate in April 2025. Owing to changes in circumstances, the decision has since been made to accelerate this process by 4 months so that the JLP can instead be submitted in December 2025. Following approval by both cabinets (South and Vale) and both full councils in mid-September, the final consultation will therefore now open on 1st October. This consultation is a final check on the soundness and legal compliance of the draft JLP, rather than an opportunity for further major changes.

Amidst the dry process of the approval process, it's easy to lose sight of the significance of this JLP. It really is something we're immensely proud of, that will deliver tangible benefits to the region over the next 15 years or so. The improvements in accessibility of affordable housing, climate action, filling many of the 'gaps' in building, and so much more will be dramatic – not only compared to the Local Plans

that we have now, but also compared to other Local Plans across the country. We are now just a few months away from (hopefully) reaching the finish line – wish us luck!

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

It is with pleasure that I write my first column for the monthly magazine. I apologise upfront for the late start — I was elected councillor back at the end of June, and then promptly went on holiday with my family, followed by the normal summer holidays through to the end of August, which has meant that I am only really coming up to speed now in September. However, I have now attended the council meetings for all of the six parishes in my division, as well as sitting on two full county councils and three committees that scrutinise council work. Public life as a councillor is quite different from my normal work, lots of wordy reports to read and more formalities — but more formal for a good reason to ensure everyone gets their democratic say, so worthwhile and rewarding.

In terms of news, we are waiting to hear about the new HIF road and bridge across the Thames in between Appleford and Sutton Courtenay. I spent a lot of time over the summer trying my best to help resolve issues with school buses which have faced considerable challenges over the holidays to prepare for the new school year. I visited the massive landfill site in between the two villages, where I saw what action is being taken to prevent bad smells re-occurring from leachate problems over the past year, and I have asked to visit the waste transfer site there to find out what they are doing to minimise their impact on us.

I am trying to support the new pavilion for the football club at Milton through planning difficulties. I will be trained on the legalities of planning before being allowed to join the county planning committee in November, where I will then scrutinise plans for the landfill site, gravel pits, waste transfer stations, the HIF road, and other infrastructure and large new local developments, to try to get the best deal for local residents and long term outcomes for communities.

At county, district, and parish level, we objected to Thames Water and their proposed SESRO mega reservoir, and I continue to feed into the consultation to improve their strategic plans for the Thames, improving resilience to flooding, harnessing flood waters, stopping leaks, stopping sewage spills, and improving water recycling, as well as safe-guarding water supplies.

This week, I am going to meet the county highways team at Marcham to discuss improving the roads, and to find out what steps they are taking to make the repairs to pot holes last longer

and be more resilient to the climate changes increasing their prevalence.

I am also being briefed on the master plan to redevelop the Dalton Barracks next to Abingdon, and will find out more about the new Joint Local Plan ahead of next month.

More next month, until then enjoy the last of the summer sun.



Tell them what you know, not who you are

Have you been asked to donate money to help people of recent disasters? Please protect yourself with the following information:

- Scammers will pretend to be legitimate wellknown charities, creating their own charity names, and impersonating people impacted by the war in Ukraine.
- Scammers will be cold-calling, direct messaging and creating fake websites and pages on social media to raise funds. Avoid clicking on links or downloading attachments in unsolicited emails, texts or social media messages. They may attempt to lure you into unwittingly downloading malware onto your device or take you to a fake website to steal your money and personal information.



- Do not donate via fundraising pages on platforms that do not verify the legitimacy of the fundraiser or that do not guarantee your money will be returned if the page is determined to be fraudulent.
- Be careful about crowdfunding requests as these may be fake and also come from scammers.
- Check the terms and conditions of funding platforms and ensure you are dealing with official organisations. If you are unsure, make your donation to an established charity instead.
- If you think you have paid money to a scammer, please contact your bank immediately.
