MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL

PLAY AREA

Further installation work has been carried out, and this is now complete. Unfortunately the weather was against the project, and there were some days when the contractor could not get on site. At the time of writing, post installation inspections are ongoing, and minor adjustments are being done, to ensure full safety for public use.

REMINDER – ROAD CLOSURE SUNDAY 10TH NOVEMBER, 2024

New Road, Church Street, and the section of the A415 between Church Street and North Street will be closed for a short while on Sunday 10th November, to allow the parade from the Church to the war memorial in order to lay wreaths. The closure Order has been granted for between 10.45 a.m. and 11.15 p.m., but it should not have to be closed for the full duration. The diversion will be via North Street, Sheepstead Road, Faringdon Road and the A338. Bus services should not be too affected, as the X1 in both directions passes through the village around 10.40 a.m. just prior to the closure. Please plan your travel accordingly. VALE OF WHITE HORSE DISTRICT COUNCIL – JOINT LOCAL PLAN

The Local Plan for the area is now out for public consultation until 12th November. Vale of White Horse District Council and South Oxfordshire District Council have ioined together to produce one Plan looking at the next fifteen years and has looked at how much development is needed, new homes, employment, roads and schools etc. and has preferred sites for their location. OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL - FIX MY STREET AND HIGHWAY SUPER USERS

Fix My Street is an independent website, which makes it easy to report problems

in the community, regardless of whether you know who is actually responsible for undertaking any repair or clearing. If you are aware of a street problem, such as an abandoned vehicle, broken street light, potholes, fly tipping, traffic signs, or other road issue, then go to www. FixmyStreet.com where matters can be reported. Fix My Street then passes on any report to the relevant authority for further investigation.

In addition to using the Fix My Street website, the County Council has Super Users. These are, in effect, the eyes and ears of the County Council's Highways Officers, and are trained to report and action certain road repairs, specifically potholes and damaged kerbs, on low-speed, minor roads.

Although County Council highways officers inspect their areas regularly, additional help from local people increases the number of defects that can be repaired and makes the process more efficient. Marcham, currently has one Super User. So if you are interested in becoming a highway Super User then volunteercoordinationteam@ Oxfordshire.gov.uk for further information.

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OXFORDSHIRE COUPLE CYCLE FOR WILDLIFE

An Oxfordshire couple Richard and Sian Liwicki (aged 65 and 62 years) have just completed a month-long cycling trip along the longest river in France to raise funds for local charity, Wild Oxfordshire. In spite of the unseasonably inclement weather they pedalled over 1,150km along the Loire, climbed a total of 11,200m, carrying all their belongings in panniers.

The couple planned the trip and organised all the logistics themselves. Richard said, "We had cycled the Rhine before so we knew what we needed to pack, and how to organise and navigate all the stages in this long trip. We trained for weeks. What we had not planned for was the wettest September in France in 25 years. We cycled through two icy storms and faced strong headwinds in the mountains. We regularly got wet so getting dry for the next day was an added challenge. However, we knew we could not stop and the French locals were incredibly helpful and kind. Motorists are used to a vibrant cycling culture in France". Sian who has been a supporter of Wild Oxfordshire for many years added, "We wanted to

Sian who has been a supporter of Wild Oxfordshire for many years added, "We wanted to really spend time getting to know this beautiful part of France and travel sustainability. We used public transport to get to the start and for our return journey. We wanted to raise funds for nature in Oxfordshire because we knew it would spur us on during this challenging trip. We were even more determined when we heard that Butterfly Conservation had declared a Butterfly Emergency in September.

"Cycling is our way of experiencing and celebrating nature up close. We wrote a wildlife and travel blog along the way, and it was inevitable that we would make comparisons between our county along the Thames, and the Loire countryside.

"Our friends and family have been very encouraging and we are over half way to hitting our target of £7,000. We have just got to get around to telling everyone that we made it!"

"As a long-term supporter of Wild Oxfordshire, we're so delighted and grateful for Sian and Richard's fundraising efforts. The funds will contribute towards our work enabling more people to take action for nature across Oxfordshire. Our sincere thanks to all those already contributing to nature's recovery, and we look forward to working with even more people in the future," said Camilla Burrrow, Chief Executive Wild Oxfordshire.

Les Trois Grandes Dames' of Impressionism: Marie Bracquemond, Mary Cassatt, and Berthe Morisot Sarah Burles

The Impressionists were an innovative and radical group of artists who took Paris by storm in the 1870s, creating paintings of modern life which shocked and horrified the art establishment. From the start the group included women artists but their contribution to impressionism has often been overshadowed by their male contemporaries. Marie Bracquemond, Berthe Morisot and Mary Cassatt all exhibited regularly. In 1894 they were given the title "Les Trois Grandes Dames d'Impressionisme" by the art critic Gustave Geffroy. The lecture discusses their lives and work revealing their skill and originality.



Now a peaceful parkland area, the site was occupied from the Roman age to the nineteenth century and continuously from the Anglo-Saxon period. Over the years it saw advances in comfortable living, park design and women's education, as well as playing host to some important visitors and a significant role in the English Civil War.

Jane Harrison is an Early Medieval specialist and fieldwork director who has run excavations across Britain. She has taught at Oxford University's Department for Continuing Education, worked with Newcastle University, published widely and most recently excavated on Hadrian's Wall, and sites in Oxfordshire and North Northumberland.

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SPORT REVIEW

Marcham village is very lucky to have the new Marcham Centre adjacent to the extensive playing field which accommodates football and cricket (with a small overlap during the appropriate seasons). The Centre houses the changing rooms, with separate rooms for officials. There is a bar which opens during and after matches, and a large patio area for spectators conveniently situated for the cricket enthusiasts.

Football

Football is thriving in Marcham. There are an impressive seven teams representing Marcham, so many that they have over-spilled from the playing field by the Centre into Abingdon Prep School, and Tilsley Park:

Adult team who play in the North Berks League

The following teams are collectively known as the Colts:

- Under 11 Boys and Under 11 Girls who play at Abingdon Prep School (due to shortage of space in the Village)
- Under 10s
- Under 9s Blues
- Under 9s Maroons

The Vets team (nothing to do with poorly animals as far as we know, just humans over 35-years-old) play in the Hellenic Vets League Div 1 W and their home ground is Tilsley Park.

There is also Mini football that takes place on the field by Marcham Centre at 9.00AM on Saturday mornings, open to all, that is well attended with enthusiastic players and parents.

The adult team had a stutter at the start of the season, losing to Woodcote Development, but since then they have won their last 2 games against Watlington Town Reserves and Berinsfield Reserves 4-0 and 3-1 respectively. There is a home game against Long Wittenham Athletic on 26 October, and an away Cup game against the same opponents on 2 November. On 9 November they are at home to AFC Grove First. Sadly the North Berks League do not publish the fixture list beyond that date at time of writing.

The Vets have played 2 matches this season, a home loss to Clanfield (85) Vets 1-3 and an away draw to Chinnor Vets 2-2. There is a local derby on 30 October where Abingdon Town Veterans Exiles play Marcham Vets at Thame. Further Vets games through November comprise home games against Bicester Town Vets First (6 November), Icarus Veterans Masters (13 November) and Chinnor Veterans (20 November).

Marcham Cricket Club - 2024

2024 was a very successful season on and off the field. Off the field a great deal of hard work improved the playing areas, especially the `hallowed square`. Nathan Warne, ably supported by many members, undertook the envious task of improving the playing surface. Not that the square was in a poor state, but it needed someone to lead on the weekly responsibility of pitch preparation, assisted by those that had very diligently worked on the surfaces during previous seasons. Nathan undertook this task with the utmost care and attention.

Since Covid the club had struggled each week to get sufficient players to enable two teams to play in the Cherwell Cricket League on a Saturday. 2024 saw a vast improvement in membership and players committing to playing regularly due to a recruitment push by members. The need for cancelling second team matches was therefore eradicated.

On the playing side, the first team finished second in its Division 8D league. Winning 15 of its 18 matches, performances with the bat by Mike Palmer of 120 not out -v-Wolvercote and 87 -v Witney Mills stood out. Other `fifties` were made by Harry Phipps (74) and Ed Warwick (69). Ed was the top scorer with total runs for the season of 365.

First team bowling saw new club captain Dan Hill take a 6-49, with other 'fivers'during the season from Neil Cotterell 5-23; Will Clerk 5-24; Tom Finnie 5-25 and Mike Palmer 5-31.

The 'second' team finished 8th in their Division 8B, winning five of its 18 matches, but importantly, as mentioned before, managed to play almost every fixture. Individual batting scores during the season included an 81 by Nathan Warne (before he was nabbed by the first team!); 47 by Johnny Moore; 43 by Matt Mugglestone and Deepak Patel and 41 by Neil Cotterell. 'Fifers' included a Deepak Patel 5-31; youngster Isaac Davies 5-34 and Adam Webb 5-44.

Secretary Matt Ainsworth took the role of captaining the `seconds`, contributing in so many ways to the improvement and functioning of the team. Matt is the person to contact about membership for 2025. Contact details will be in future editions of Madnews. Other club information, including winter indoor `nets`, will be covered on the Club`s Facebook page.

Aunt Sally 2024

Mid March, half a dozen guys stood at the village hall bar and spoke about the possibility of having an Aunt Sally team at the Marcham Centre. This was just two weeks before the registration deadline, so it was agreed to put a poster up in the bar with the aim of getting twelve interested people, this being deemed the minimum necessary for a team of eight. A week later there was 25 signatories! Of this, at least 15 had never played the game before. A decision was made to enter two teams in the Abingdon Aunt Sally League, with fixtures taking place every Wednesday from early May until mid September. A home game every week.

Aunt Sally is a local Oxfordshire-only pub game, the details of which I'll leave you to 'google'! The A team played its sixteen fixtures in 'E-section', finishing a respectable 4th, winning nine matches and losing seven. In simplistic terms each player throws a stick at a 'dolly', this being a wooden doll type figure on a piece of iron. You do really have to 'google' to fully understand! Each player throws six sticks, and at our level, six misses (a 'blob') is quite common. I explain that because it puts the stats into perspective.

In winning nine of its sixteen matches, the following players in the A team averaged decent scores and scored four `dolls` (i.e. hit the doll with a stick) on some occasions.

Brian Boseley – Averaged 1.92, scoring four dolls on three occasions Lee Hutton – Averaged 1.59, scoring four dolls on three occasions Kieran Beesley – Averaged 1.58, without scoring over three dolls Tom Ricketts – Averaged 1.46, scoring four dolls on three occasions Tristan Barratt – Averaged 1.42, scoring four dolls on one occasion Meanwhile the `B` team finished a very respectable third in its `F`section, winning eight matches, drawing one and losing seven. Top scorers were:

Richard Wiltshire - Averaged 1.83, scoring four dolls on three occasions

Brett Phipps – Averaged 1.73, scoring four dolls on two occasions Dan Boyle – Averaged 1.46, scoring four dolls on two occasions Though both teams did very well for the first season, there were two major `wins` in addition to the results. Those being getting people together, many participating in a fun pub game for the first time, meeting people they didn`t previously know, and the other, visiting pubs and clubs which many of us hadn`t visited before.

The Village Hall bar (Marcham Community Trading Company) supported the introduction of Aunt Sally by paying for all the new kit required. This was ably supported by the likes of Tom Ricketts, Harry Moore and Brian Harrow, using their technical expertise to build some of the kit required on a voluntary basis. Thanks to them, but the biggest thanks goes to Brian Boseley for pulling together all the kit required for two teams. No mean feat!

2025 season will start at the beginning of May. Marcham Community Trading Company (Directors Geoff Dix and Trevor Hill) will continue to financially support Aunt Sally, albeit the capital outlay of this year will not be needed next.

All new players will be welcomed next year, details will be made available in the spring.







DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

RESERVOIR

As mentioned in my MAD News column last month, Thames Water published a draft Environmental Impact Assessment Scoping Report for consultation. The Vale responded and raised several concerns, but two these we felt to be so worrying that I also proposed a crossparty motion at full council on 23rd October. Firstly, TW appears to believe that it can "design out all credible and significant embankment failure modes", i.e., that its design is so perfect that the reservoir embankments could never fail and so they do not need to bother (publicly) assessing the risk of this happening or planning for how to respond if it did. I don't think I need to spell out how devastating an embankment failure could be to the local area, potentially including Marcham. Secondly, TW accepts that they would need to be able to lower the water level by 1m per day in the event of an emergency, and that this could lead to flooding along the Thames valley (the discharge rate would be about 75 m3 per second, which is similar to – and might be in addition to - a typical winter flood). However, by law they do not need to assess this risk and plan for its mitigation until they want to fill the reservoir, rather than before they start building it. What would be the point of building it if they cannot fill it? We are therefore calling on TW to address both of these major concerns and on government to support us in this.

FOOD TRUCKS AT PUBS

Another previously discussed topic: the Vale's licensing of food trucks operating from the car park of The Crown in Marcham (and other sites across the district). The new draft Joint Street Trading Policy is currently out for consultation and I'm please to report that it contains a section on "Multiple site traders" specifically aimed to simplify the process for venues such as The Crown. Resident are welcome to respond online at www.southandvale.gov.uk/StreetTrading until the 26th November.

SHEEPSTEAD ROAD FOOTPATH

Many Marcham residents have been in touch with concerns about the footpath along Sheepstead Rd, which has been extended north to the junction with Cow Lane. Pye Homes carried out this work as part of the Davies Edge housing development and, in principle, I am fully supportive of it. The concern, however, comes from the reduced

width of the roadway, particularly since it lies on the inside of a corner bend. Pye Homes and the Oxfordshire County Council Highways team are aware of the concerns, and I will continue to work with Cllr Peter Stevens, the Parish Council, and others to get this resolved somehow.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Work has now started on building the new slip roads onto the A34 at Lodge Hill Interchange north of Abingdon so traffic can go both ways. Before building, they check for archaeology, and the archaeologists have indeed uncovered evidence of ancient river systems and early human life half a million years ago. Worked flints were found, probably from the Neolithic to Bronze Age periods, along with quantities of Roman pottery and medieval tile fragments. These flint tools give an insight into the mobility of these ancient humans, since flint raw material would not have been available locally. The human species involved was probably *Homo heidelbergensis*, ancestors of the Neanderthals, who periodically occupied Britain in warmer climatic episodes between c. 800,000 and 400,000 years ago.

These days we need to recycle old stuff rather than throw away. I am pleased to say Oxfordshire has a 57.2 per cent recycling and composting rate, making our residents the best in England for 10 years in a row. This year's annual Recycle Week theme is 'Rescue Me, Recycle'. Around half of the average rubbish bin is made up of items that could have been recycled. So, the ask is for people to

look for things that could be recycled (like old aerosol cans or any plastic) and put them in the recycling. Please see if you can.

Now that autumn is with us, the county's Tree Service are starting their annual planting, so look out for new trees across highway network, which help both bio-diversity and climate change.

On roads, there is often dissatisfaction over the regular traffic queues on the Sutton Courtenay – Culham bridge, so I have investigated improving the flow rates – letting more traffic flow north during the morning rush hour and south for the evening rush. An Engineer has checked the operation of the signals and found them to be working correctly without any current faults. I can confirm the site does run VA (vehicle actuated) mode so the lights will stay green longer when there are more vehicles detected on the approaches to the signals. The maximum available green times have been set to allow for more flow northbound during the morning peak and then more southbound during the evening peak. They will continue to monitor but the current timings are the best achievable at this location for now.

Last month saw historic levels of rain. We were hit with more than a month's worth of rainfall in the space of 36 hours, which created many localised flash floods, and general flood levels rise to heights not normally seen until late winter. Climate change means that for some time now this country has been seeing more intense spells of rain and increased instances of flooding. None of the issues are Oxfordshire specific – all of our neighbouring areas have experienced the same incredibly difficult impacts this week. Indeed, drainage systems across the UK and Europe were overwhelmed by extreme rainfall last month. Unfortunately, this has been compounded by underinvestment by water companies. To help, Oxfordshire County Council, have diverted extra funding to flood prevention, and there is a national programme funding flood defences.

We know that climate change is accelerating, and this will get worse for at least 30 years while we get to net zero emissions. Even if it were possible or affordable, replacing all of our drainage pipes with bigger ones, won't work when a month's rain can fall in a day. We need to work out with every local landscape, how vou hold back rainwater wherever it lands, slowing down the rate at which it hits or flows down our streets, flooding rivers and highways. We need to look at smarter 'water farming' practices, putting trees and other water holding measures on hillsides, and breaking up impermeable paved areas in villages, towns and cities. Fortunately, all of these can also make better places to live and work, and protect against air pollution and other weather extremes like heat, and gales. It is going to be a long term thing. If residents or businesses are in a flood risk area, they can access the council web site's flooding toolkit (www.oxfordshirefloodtoolkit. com), which provides advice and support, including on preparing for instances of flooding. Residents can call the Environment Agency's flooding hotline for advice and support at any time on 0345 988 1188. NB. Please avoid driving through flood water, as just 30cm of flowing water is enough to lift and move a car.

We continue to feed into Thames Water's strategic water management plans which includes a massive new reservoir to serve the South East called SESRO. If this reservoir was overwhelmed during flooding, it could double the worst floods we see. This risk needs to be addressed and mitigated properly. There are several other issues which I have fed into the consultations for Thames Water to address ahead of building SESRO, including:

- Sewage discharge Thames Water must prioritise stopping this first, and along with stopping spills, better waste treatment means recycling more
- Recycling water if we matched what Los Angeles and Australia already achieve, we would not need SESRO
- Fixing leaks if we stopped losing so much water, apparently, we could save more water than SESRO would provide
- Transport water from areas of oversupply it would be more environmentally friendly to transport excess water from wetter areas in the UK to London than build a reservoir that would take years to build and fill and may struggle to keep filled if the South East does continue to get drier
- Turbid flood water currently large amounts of flood water go to waste - strategy should be developed to manage turbid flood water, and treat it for consumption ahead of new reservoirs, as

this would also help alleviate local flood levels.

- Use local gravel pits first Thames Water should take the water held in local gravel pits and use these first ahead of building new reservoirs. Given the ongoing strategic need for gravel extraction, there is a plentiful supply of gravel pits for water reservoirs.
- Focus on grey water a lot of water is never drunk by enabling businesses and homes to use rain and grey water locally collected – would reduce demand for clean tap water, and reduce demand for new reservoirs. Strategically, Thames Water should help develop local grey water suppliers, rather than making everything drinkable.
- We are also concerned about the impact of construction and ongoing operations for local villages and those downstream of it

Lastly, the new Joint Local Plan is now for open for public consultation. The plan identifies just one major redevelopment – the brownfield site of Dalton Barracks on Abingdon Airfield – as we believe enough house-building has already been authorised to meet central government targets. The rest of the plan focuses on driving better standards for house building and better places to live.

With that ambition for building better places to live, I sign off for this month – Enjoy the Autumn

An essential new reservoir for the South East

Progress Update

Thanks to everyone who participated in our summer 2024 public consultation on the new reservoir proposals. We received over 1,500 responses and more than 1,200 people joined our community events.



In August 2024, we secured government approval for our Water Resource Management Plan which sets out the action and investment needed to make sure your

water supply is resilient and sustainable for the next 50 years and beyond. To inform our design plans, work has now begun on geological surveys, including a clay compaction trial on the proposed reservoir site.

The Great Green Tomato Chutney Adventure

Finally, jar up your chutney and admire your handiwork. You've turned those unripe, unloved green tomatoes into a tangy, spicy masterpiece. Serve it with cheese, slather it on sandwiches, or just eat it straight from the jar – no judgment here.

So there you have it, folks. Making chutney with green tomatoes is not just a recipe, it's an adventure. And who knows? You might just start a new trend. Move over, red tomatoes – green is the new black.
