MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL CHRISTMAS – VILLAGE GREEN

To bring the joy and festive spirit of the season to our village, the Council is delighted that Andrew MacLean of ADM Trees at Frilford has again agreed to provide a Christmas tree for the village green. We extend our gratitude to Andrew for his generosity. Councillors will decorate the tree with lights Our thanks go too to the Councillors who have volunteered to arrange this.

CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING


The Vale of White Horse District Council is again recycling real Christmas Trees in January. When you no longer need your tree, it can be put out next to the brown bin at the kerbside provided it is less than 1.8m or 6 ft tall. If larger than this it will need to be cut into sections. If you do not have a brown garden waste bin, then your real Christmas tree can be placed by the Salvation Army Textile bank in Howard Cornish Road (opposite Duffield Place). Again, please cut it into sections if it taller than 1.8m (6ft). The last day for depositing your Christmas tree at the textile bank will be by the end of the day on Tuesday 14th January, 2025. Trees left after this date will not be collected. Please do not obstruct the textile bank, or more particularly the bus stop, when leaving your trees. Also there is to be a Christmas tree collection from Millets Farm, so this is another opportunity for local residents to recycle their tree. Trees need to be dropped off at Millets by the end of Saturday 11th January. Again, trees left there after that date will not be collected.

PLAY AREA

The Council is pleased to be able to confirm that phase II of the play area is essentially complete. The Council is planning for a new bench seat inside the fencing, new signage, and is looking to repaint the older items to blend in. It will need to seek quotations for the painting, and is mindful that paint suitable for play areas will need to be used, as well as suitable preparation carried out. The Council would invite anyone who is knowledgeable and who could help write a specification of what is needed, to contact the clerk or your local Councillor. The intention is to clarify and document what needs to be done, and to write a structured specification to enable quotations to be sought. Any work would obviously be carried out in the better weather next year. So please speak to your Councillor or clerk if you can help.

GRANTS

The Parish Council annually awards grants to local organisations, in accordance with local government legislation, where there is benefit to some or all of the residents of the parish. Applications for grants were considered at the November meeting of the Parish Council. The Council was pleased to be able to support Marcham Community Group towards the expenses of the Anson field maintenance, the Marcham Parochial Church Council to support its running of the children's club and outing for village children, Marcham Society for the reprinting



DALTON BARRACKS GARDEN VILLAGE

In the District Council's Local Plan there are proposals for a residential led mixed use new development at Dalton Barracks. Public consultation about the development is being undertaken by WSP on behalf of the Defence Infrastructure Organisation. As things progress, more information will be added to the website at www. daltonbarracks.com. There have been some exhibitions in November, with more planned in early December. The exhibition will be in Marcham Centre on Thursday 28th November between 3.00 p.m. - 6.00 p.m. and again on Friday 6th December from 5.00 p.m. - 8.00 p.m.

Regular updates will be prepared as things progress. If you wish to receive the updates direct, then please register your details at the Dalton Barracks website mentioned above. WSP are keen to work with local people in the planning of this new community. So please visit the exhibition and the website, and make your views known.

PROPOSAL TO AMEND THE WAY PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS CAN BE ARRANGED

The law currently allows for Council meetings to be only held face-to-face, as the attendance of councillors at local authority meetings is part of the democratic process and is integral to members carrying out their role effectively. Meetings which are open to the public enable residents to attend and listen to debates, and bring things to the attention of the local Council too. However, it may not always possible for all councillors to attend all of the meetings, all of the time. and central government is undertaking national consultation on whether it would be helpful to be able to have remote meetings, as were permitted during Covid, and to allow voting by proxy. Marcham Parish Council has not formed a collective view on this, but has asked councillors to submit their own individual responses. The consultation is open to the public, so if there is anyone who wishes to take part then the details can be found at the gov.uk website:

We do this so that we can make our curriculum more relevant to the children and we encourage them to think about how what they learn affects our world today. More about this can be found on the school's website: **www.marcham.oxon.sch. uk/curriculum/**

One of the lenses in use a lot at school recently has been the lens of Experience. Children have been to Oxford and to The Earth Trust at Wittenham Clumps as part of their learning within the last few weeks. However, one visit has been particularly noteworthy: the Year 6s and some of the School Councillors were able to visit the Houses of Parliament recently.

There was a tour of the building, including Westminster Hall (where Queen Elizabeth lay in state) and the Central Lobby, where politicians are often interviewed on the TV. They were able to listen to debates both in the House of Commons and in the House of Lords as well as meeting with our local MP, Layla Moran. It was all very exciting.

She asked the children if they had any questions. Here is what they asked:

- What are your main goals for making the world a better place?
- What is the hardest thing you do as an MP?
- How did you feel when you found out that you were an MP?
- Are you wanting to make Marcham, the UK or the world a better place?
- What was the first thing you did as an MP?
- What's the best thing about being an MP?

Some of these questions did give Layla food for thought. The last question asked was about the process for becoming an MP. Layla said that it took her 10 years. She said that she'd received some advice from her grandfather about it. When she told him that she wanted to be an MP, he said to her, "You'd better learn how to lose!" She said that it prepared her to be resilient and to not give up and to persevere.

How very "Marcham School!" that is! Photos from this trip can be seen on the school website.

This week in **Giraffes**, we visited the Houses of Parliament. We travelled there on a coach. When we arrived, we walked to see the outside of Westminster Abbey. When we were walking back, we stopped and listened as Big Ben chimed 1pm. After lunch, we had to pass through a security scanner before our tour. We were then shown round the Houses of Parliament. We saw inside the House of Lords where they were debating online child safety. Inside the House of Commons, we saw the speaker sat in his chair. We completed a lesson on how a law is made. Then Layla Moran (our MP) came to see us for a Q&A. Jamie

This week on Monday, we drove to the Houses of Parliament, and we had a great time. We learnt about how house laws are made, and we visited both the House of Commons and House of Lords. After that, we met our MP (Layla Moran), and we asked her some interesting questions. *Sanaya*

Many thanks to the prospective parents who came to visit the school on our Open Morning on 5th November. It isn't always easy on occasions like that to speak individually with parents about their children, but I hope you got a sense of our vision and values and saw passion in the children for making Marcham School the best it can be. Our next Open Morning will be taking place on Thursday 9th January between 9:30 and 10:30am. Hoping to see many of you then!

SPORT REVIEW MUGA

MUGA can be a MUltigGated Acquisition scan - an imaging test to see how your heart pumps blood (https://my.clevelandclinic.org/ health/diagnostics/17247-multigated-acquisition-scan-muga), a Deeper Indian Yellow paint colour (https://www.paintandpaperlibrary. com/muga), a particularly fine Spanish red wine (https://www. bodegasmuga.com/en/muga-reserva/) or a Multi Use Games Area.



Marcham has an example of the latter nestled neatly next to the Centre surrounded by a 5 metre high fence.

As the name implies it provides an opportunity for a variety of different sporting activities to take place within an enclosed area. The MUGA was part of the original plans for the Centre area, the intention being to provide a recreational area for children and adults. At the outset the Community Facilities Steering Group (CFSG) supported the concept which was championed by the late Chris



Ricketts who believed that the children of Marcham deserved such a play area. Section 106 funding for the project required that the plot be large enough to support tennis. Therefore, the layout and surface of the MUGA had to be suitable for tennis. One benefit of the artificial surface is that it does not need mowing! As it is an 'allweather' facility and, by implication, allow for 'all-season' activity, floodlights were necessary. In addition to Chris, Trevor Hill and Dan Barnes were involved with the planning. The MUGA was installed by Charles Lawrence Tennis Courts

The surface is marked for basketball, netball, tennis and for football, with a 'five-a-side' sized goal at each end. There are flood lights to illuminate for evening use. There are reserved times for the Colts football, there is tennis coaching for a variety of levels at specific times, and open use at weekends. It is not available for booking by any outside clubs to ensure it is a facility for local use. The goal lines have had to be re-drawn due to heavy wear, and the basketball backboards and hoops have been replaced as the original boards did not cope well with Marcham weather, and the hoops with slam dunking. It has added immeasurably to the quality of resource available at the Centre.

Football

Marcham Firsts continue to prove strong opponents; they have beaten OAFC Grove Firsts 5 - 0, Long Wittenham Athletic Firsts 5 - 0 in the Cup, and a resounding victory against the same opponents 9 - 1 in the League, and Stanford in the Vale Firsts 6 - 0. They have two up-coming Cup games against Didcot Town Youth and Watlington Town Reserves (both away). On 30th November they play Sutton Courtenay Reserves at home in the League.



Marcham Vets held Abingdon Town Vets Exiles to a nil-all draw at the end of October and a 2 -all draw against Bicester Town Vets First at the beginning of November. They lost 1 - 2 to Icarus Veterans Masters, but have an opportunity for revenge on 27th November. *Max, Simon and Dan with the Colts Under 11s football team* Colts teams continue to play regularly scattered across various playing fields in the area, and Saturday morning football continues behind the Centre with the children showing great enthusiasm for the game and obviously having fun.



MARCHAM COMMUNITY GROUP PUBLIC MEETING AND AGM

Marcham Community Group (MCG) held a well attended AGM on 31 October. The accounts for the year 2023/24 were approved unanimously by members. Geoff Dix was reelected as a Trustee for another three year term and Jenny Pam was elected, having been previously co-opted as a Trustee during the last year.

Jim Asher stepped down as a Trustee and MCG Chair, having completed the permitted years of service according to MCG rules. As most know, Jim has been the driving force within MCG since its inception, from the early days of developing ideas, with other main parties, for the development of a new village hall. Together with MCG members, Jim and wife Denise orchestrated much-needed fund raising for purchasing the hall's internal needs, such as tables, chairs, curtains, speakers etc. As a mark of appreciation from MCG's membership, Jim and Denise were presented with suitable vouchers.

The board of MCG now comprises of: Trevor Hill (Chair), Adam Grady (Vice Chair), Mike Hoath (Finance Director), Dan Barnes, Geoff Dix, Ruth Mander, Jenny Pam, Colin Trinder and Mark Harvie (Parish Council Representative). All of these would be very interested to receive any feedback and ideas from anyone on how the village hall is managed or could be improved for individuals or groups, especially potentially new initiatives. The board currently has a trustee vacancy and has the ability to co-opt a further two persons onto its board. So please contact any trustee if you're interested in helping in some way, we're a friendly bunch!

The AGM also provided the opportunity to reflect on the 2023/24 accounts for Marcham Community Trading Company (MCT), the village hall bar. Trevor and Geoff are the voluntary Directors, so ably supported by approximately 25 volunteer bar staff. The meeting heard that the bar made a profit of £23,300 on the year, which, along with balances from previous years, is available for grant giving to any organisation in the village and its immediate surrounds.

The general meeting received a review by Jim of matters dealt with by MCG during the past year, including community events.

MARCHAM CENTRE CLOSURE

This year the Centre will be closed on Christmas Day and New Year's Day. However, bookings will not be available for private hire between Sunday 22 December and Friday 3 January inclusive. Regular hirers (eg Pilates, Zumba and community groups) will be able to continue with the regular bookings throughout the period, if they decide to do so. DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

DALTON BARRACKS REDEVELOPMENT

Residents will likely have received a leaflet through their door informing them of an upcoming consultation for the Dalton Barracks site redevelopment. I encourage everyone to take a look at this: the building of 1,200 houses on the site is already included within the current Local Plan, rising to 2,750 once the emerging Joint Local Plan is approved. I have been in contact with the redevelopment team for some time, and my impression so far has been broadly positive - they appear genuinely receptive to local residents' views and keen to make this project a success for both new and existing residents alike. It is therefore important that they hear from you about the kind of infrastructure they should be planning for, and worth your time to engage with them: you can make a difference! More information can be found online at daltonbarracks.com and several in-person events are planned across the local area in late November and early December.

BUDGET

With the dust starting to settle on the new Labour government's budget, announced in late October, the Vale is working out the implications for the services we provide to residents. Residents may be aware that the budget contained extra funding for councils, and for the Vale this includes greater support for homelessness prevention. On the flipside, it is not yet clear whether the increase in National Insurance (NI) contributions by employers will apply to councils such as the Vale: there is a possibility that the Vale's funding could end up effectively decreasing in real terms. Answers are expected in the near future.

WASTE COLLECTION

The first electric food waste vehicle has begun food collections across the Vale and South Oxfordshire. This is part of a wider trial period to investigate the practicalities of converting all of the waste collection vehicles to electric over the coming years. Since each food truck travels around 26,000 miles per year, switching to electric is expected to save over 20 tons of Carbon Dioxide equivalent per year, per vehicle, and should also reduce operational costs.

JOINT LOCAL PLAN

The final consultation on the draft Joint Local Plan has now closed and so South & Vale's officers are preparing the final submission to the Planning Inspectorate. Thank you again to everyone who contributed their thoughts during consultations so far. Wish us luck!.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Merry Christmas!

I am writing this shortly after the Remembrance Sunday memorial service, which I attended in Sutton Courtenay and was honoured to lay a wreath on behalf of the council. It was very moving to listen as the name of every solider killed in World War 1 and 2 was read out and remembered individually. We were also asked to remember and pray for all those caught up in current conflicts across the globe, and my heart went and goes out to the two million displaced civilians struggling to stay alive in the Gaza Strip, and the number of innocent women and children killed as 'acceptable collateral damage' which of course is totally unacceptable, as is apartheid and genocide, if that is proven. Christmas is a time to remember Christian values and wish peace and goodwill to everyone. With the rhetoric of the incoming US government and increasingly militant views being witnessed in many places, I worry that further escalation seems almost inevitable, and I wish that to be avoided and that all sides seek lasting peaceful solutions particularly in the Middle East, Ukraine and Africa. Along that vein, I have asked the council to raise the United Nations flag on United Nations day at Abbey House, to remember the reasons for the creation of that global body after WW2, and its continued role for promoting peace amongst nations today. Christmas is a time to pray for peace for all.

Back to local life, first snow has fallen now, and I remind residents

to protect against the winter weather. I am highlighting issues to Highways with the route taken by many Europa children from Sutton Courtenay across Culham to make that very busy route safer for children and parents. I am also showing the new placemaking team in Highways the lack of a safe foot and cycle path from Peep-o-day Lane to Drayton, which many have pointed out previously. Although it may be a long term project, I think providing a safe route along Drayton Road beyond the cycle path to Abingdon is important to local residents and many who travel between the two villages. There are often accidents along that road, which deters cyclists and walkers and divides those who live along the road from both villages. Lastly, following the concerns raised by residents at Milton Heights about joining the A4130, new temporary lights will be fitted there during the roadworks to enable safe entry and exit to Milton Hill, and we intend to use this period to work out a more permanent solution.

Beyond highways, consultation on the new Joint Local Plan finished in November, and many have inputted to improve this new local planning document, including protection of green spaces between villages, along with better paths and transport links. Didcot Town are also now starting a neighbourhood plan and have asked our neighbouring villages to join them. Although most of our villages already have neighbourhood plans already, so do not need to join formally, close relationships are welcome. Similarly, public consultation is now starting for the major redevelopment of the Dalton Barracks brownfield site at Abingdon airfield, highlighted in the Joint Local Plan as a major contributor for meeting local housing needs. Your input is welcome.

Lastly, In the next few weeks, you may see Thames Water drilling and carrying out tests for the SESRO reservoir in the fields between Sutton Courtenay and Abingdon where they intend to build the new intake and offtake with the River Thames. We are still awaiting response on the added flood risk this creates for our district and our other considerable concerns with Thames Water and their strategic management of our water and waste. In the meantime, we must continue to hold them to account. For any sewer flooding, ring

them on 0300 310 1111. For river flooding, ring the Environment Agency on 0345 988 1188, and for other local issues, please raise them on FixMyStreet.

The county council have prepared a flood toolkit, and guides for utility failures (like power cuts), clearing snow and other emergencies, which you may find helpful.

Enjoy the festive season and happy new year to all!
