CHRISTMAS - VILLAGE GREEN

The Council is very grateful to Andrew for his generosity, and to all those who have helped.

CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

Real Christmas trees for recycling can be taken to Millets Farm by Saturday 11th January, 2025, or left on the hardstanding by the Salvation Army textile bank in Howard Cornish Road – opposite Duffield Place, by Tuesday 14th January in order to meet the collection dates. If taking your tree to the Howard Cornish Road location, please do not obstruct the textile bank, or the bus stop area. Also please do not leave your tree after this date, as it will not be collected, and will be regarded as fly tipping.

ALLOTMENTS (COW LANE/PARKSIDE)

If you have an allotment you are reminded that allotment rent collection for the 24/25 financial year is taking place. Thank you to those who have paid promptly, but for those who have not yet paid, please transfer the sum due to the Council's bank account (details in the letter sent out, or available from the clerk if needed), or let the Clerk have a cheque payable to Marcham Parish Council. Those in arrears with rent, or found not to be utilising their plot, could lose it by the service of a Notice to Quit.

COUNCIL TAX 2025/26

The Parish Council held an additional meeting on Wednesday 18th December 2024 to carefully consider the budget for 2025/26. Once finalised, the Council will set the amount of council tax that comes to the parish from the total amount paid by residents to the Vale of White Horse District Council

CASUAL VACANCIES

Casual vacancies exist on the Parish Council. The Council is a tier of government closest to the community, and is the first contact point for anyone with concerns or ideas. It represents the community, delivers some local services, and strives to improve the area for all who live here. Help is needed to represent the area. DALTON BARRACKS DEVELOPMENT

The former airfield is no longer required for military purposes and the Defence Infrastructure Organisation, part of the MOD, is working on proposals to bring forward a new development at Dalton Barracks. Information is available at daltonbarracks.com. Plans are at the very early stage of what will be a long-term, phased project, resulting in a garden village. The intention is to provide a vibrant, diverse area, and not create a dormitory

commuter area. The public have been invited to put forward ideas, suggestions and comments, all which can influence the future design. Feedback is important for the preparation of the comprehensive site wide masterplan and the development of the outline planning application for phase I. The Parish Council would encourage you to complete the survey form under Have Your Say at **daltonbarracks.com** and take up the opportunity to respond to the consultation. Please make your thoughts known.

A Homeshare arrangement does not involve any personal care but can sometimes sit quite comfortably alongside care provision from elsewhere.

Monthly fees are payable to Age UK Oxfordshire by both Householder and Sharer and cover the costs of the safety checks, the setting up and facilitation of the match, and the provision of regular, ongoing in-person support.

Homeshare Oxfordshire is the local Homeshare provider for Oxfordshire, offering a personal, face to face service and providing ongoing contact and support for the duration of the Homeshare arrangement.

Fungi of Oxfordshire's Golden Triangle a review

Judy Webb began her fascinating talk on "Fungi of Oxfordshire's Golden Triangle" by explaining that the term had been coined because of the number of rare plants, not just fungi, found in the sandy heaths around Frilford and Cothill. She stressed the importance of fungi in recycling nutrients — without them leaves would just lie on the surface smothering new growth and the chemicals in them would be locked there and unavailable to other plants.

Judy explained that the bit of the fungus seen above ground is the fruiting body, usually produced in the autumn. The bulk of the fungus lives underground and consists of fine threads known as mycelia. One of the largest plants in the world is 9km of mycelia in a National Park in Oregon.

Plants with small seeds such as orchids also need fungi to feed them until they can develop leaves and photosynthesise, food then travels in the opposite direction as the plants feed the fungus. Gardeners can buy mycelium to add to the soil when planting shrubs to help their root systems establish.

Before going hunting for fungi Judy stressed the need to be able to identify which species are poisonous, though she pointed out that touching the fungi wasn't dangerous but eating even half a death cap toadstool (*Amanita phalloides*) was enough to kill an adult. Identification is aided by smell, discolouration on being cut and also by creating a spore print, leaving a toadstool cap lying on paper overnight as different species produce different colour spores. She also told us about the importance of fungi to forensic science, citing a case of badger baiting where the earth from a suspect's boots contained spores of truffles, a woodland species and a great favourite with badgers, not likely to be found in fields apart from near badger setts, not conclusive proof but one more piece of evidence.

Judy illustrated her talks with lots of super photos and also brought along a wide range of specimens for us to see, touch and smell. I always think an interesting talk generates lots of questions and this one certainly did that. **SHEILA DUNFORD**



Winter is a magical time, not just because of snowflakes and hot chocolate, but also because of the amazing wildlife that visits our gardens. So, grab your warm coats, hats, and maybe a pair of binoculars as we explore the wonders of winter wildlife right in your backyard!

Birds on the Move

During winter, many birds come to our gardens looking for food. You might spot red-breasted robins, cheeky blackbirds, and even blue tits with their bright blue and yellow feathers. They're all searching for seeds, berries, and insects to keep them warm and full. Try hanging a bird feeder with some seeds or fat balls. You'll be surprised how quickly they find it!

Squirrels and Their Stashes

Have you ever seen a squirrel in your garden? These furry acrobats are busy in winter, digging up the nuts they buried earlier in the year. Squirrels have an excellent memory for where they've hidden their food. Watch them scurry around, climbing trees and making daring leaps. Sometimes, they even visit bird feeders, showing off their clever tricks to get a snack.

Hedgehogs Taking a Snooze

Winter is hibernation time for hedgehogs. If you have a pile of leaves or a cosy corner in your garden, you might be providing the perfect spot for a hedgehog to sleep through the cold months. Hedgehogs curl up into a ball and use their prickly spines to protect themselves. If you spot one, let it rest peacefully. It's catching up on some much-needed sleep!

Foxes on the Prowl

Foxes are some of the most adaptable creatures around. In winter, they grow a thick, fluffy coat to keep warm. You might hear a fox's call at night—it sounds like a yip or a bark. Foxes are curious and sometimes venture into gardens looking for food. They're usually shy, so if you're lucky enough to see one, watch quietly and enjoy the sight of these clever animals.



Magical Moths and Winter Bugs

Even in winter, not all bugs disappear. Some, like winter moths, are still active. Winter moths have a special antifreeze-like substance in their bodies that helps them survive the cold. You might also find spiders hiding in corners, waiting for milder days. Look closely and you might spot these tiny survivors braving the chilly weather.

Helping Our Garden Friends

You can be a wildlife hero this winter by making your garden a haven for these creatures. Here are some simple tips:

- Food and Water: Keep bird feeders filled and put out a shallow dish of water for animals to drink.
- Shelter: Leave piles of leaves or twigs in a corner for hedgehogs and insects.
- Safe Spaces: Avoid using chemicals that can harm wildlife. Let nature do its thing!


Final Thoughts

Welcome to 2025. A quick resumé of current matters being These are only some of the matters that will be discussed (MCG) and the Hall Committee, which will be continued during the next several months. This is followed by a few dates for the diary.

MCG

The Trustees tend to focus on the overall management of the Marcham Centre. This includes its financing; the short, medium and long term matters that need to be reviewed as an on-going basis; health and safety; provision of utilities (gas, electric, water and waste) and an oversight of the day to day running of the building, its car park, the Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) and the field with its surrounds, including maintenance.

To enable this, the Trustees will be focussing their attention on updating MCG's Business Plan to cover the next few years, which will link into its new Business Strategy. One aim is to widen MCG's remit, to encourage wider community engagement and involvement. Over the next twelve months, Trustees will be looking to involve as many groups and individuals as possible to 'kick start' its aim.

HALL COMMITTEE

Whilst some of the matters discussed at the committee will need ratification by the Trustees, much of the work undertaken is delegated to the committee for decisions and action. It is the 'doing' part of the 'day to day' running of the building and MUGA.

Therefore, we would be pleased to hear from any of you that feel you would like to help, either by being a committee member or just offering help in any particular expertise and/ or experience you may be able to offer. Alternatively, you may just want to 'roll up your sleeves' and help in whatever needs looking at. Specific matters currently being tackled and continuing through 2025 are:

- Provision of more acoustic panels, particularly in the two halls, to deal with the ongoing need for better acoustics
- Provision of more sound panels to mitigate noise disturbance between differing parts of the building
- Consideration of improving the patio area(s) to provide a better experience for those using the building (including the bar)
- Consideration of providing wider facilities for the community, as per the recent addition of a barbers' experience
- The replacement and repairing of hall furniture, particularly chairs, which are showing signs of over three years of continuous use
- · General minor maintenance
- Consideration of hire charges
- The marketing and ongoing use of the building, including a greater use by new regular hirers and the local community generally.



Who would have thought it? A church wanting to look squarely at Jesus. That is what we shall be doing at our main Sunday gatherings at All Saints Marcham throughout January and February. A more contemporary approach, perhaps, would be to come to the historical Jesus with our 21st century questions. For instance, "what does Jesus say about...?" Or "what keeps people from considering Jesus today?" Those are very valid approaches that we take often in our churches. But really, we should let Jesus speak for himself, shouldn't we? Surely the most influential figure in history should be permitted to speak on his own terms. He should be asking us the questions. So Sunday by Sunday this new year, we will be looking at the gospel accounts, asking Jesus what he is saying to us today about himself and the world about us. We are less interested than ever in religious institutions, and one can understand why, but the Man himself is fascinating people more and more. This gives hope to our fractured and fractious world.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

THAMES VALLEY FLOOD SCHEME

Given the heavy rains that we experienced last year, it was disappointing to hear that the Environment Agency has almost completely cancelled the proposed Thames Valley Flood Scheme on cost grounds. At time of writing – and I hope this stays true – there were three major storms in 2024; some houses in the Vale were flooded on every one of these. While Marcham ward was less badly affected than the worst-hit areas of Abingdon, for example, some residents were affected directly and more hindered in their ability to travel. A motion at full council on 18th December (which took place after I write this) calls on central government to reconsider where it is providing sufficient resources to prevent and mitigate future floods. As the climate changes, I'm afraid we can expect weather patterns to stray even further from normal.

HIF1 SCHEME APPROVED

The HIF1 road scheme proposal has now been approved by central government, having previously been rejected by OCC's Planning Committee. This scheme includes a new road bridge over the Thames between Didcot and Culham, which will be the first 'modern' road bridge to be built across the Thames between the Oxford ring road and the Wallingford bypass. The Vale's Local Plan 2031, prepared under the 2015-2019 Conservative administration, 'baked in' this extra infrastructure as part of the deal for the huge levels of housing development we have seen over recent years. While those of us worried about the climate crisis are hesitant about the implications of building more roads, this scheme will provide much-needed relief to traffic congestion in the area and removes the threat to the Vale's position as a Local Planning Authority in influencing where housing can and cannot be built over the coming years.

IN-HOUSING SERVICES

As we transition into a new year, it's a good time to reflect on 'the bigger picture' than the usual day-to-day (or month-to-month, as for these reports). There is a long-term shift in the Vale's way of doing things underway, which still has several years to go before completion. This shift is a trend towards 'in-housing' services that were previously 'out-sourced' to external organisations. Notable examples on the horizon include the Vale's customer call switchboard and much of the Parks maintenance work (pruning

trees, etc). While there are always likely to be examples of where others can perform services better and cheaper than the Vale, reversing outsourcing where this is not the case allows us to do more for less and improves accountability.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Happy New Year!

I attended the councillor consultation event on proposed redevelopment of Dalton Barracks and the Abingdon airfield, which I found informative. I await to hear what people raise during the consultation. I did raise the added disruption if SESRO builds at the same time, and the DIO said they were liaising with SESRO to coordinate effort and minimise disruption. I see SESRO have added Dalton Garden Village to their plan maps and indicate a combined junction for both access roads. I still believe the SESRO scheme to be deeply flawed in many respects, but this is at least in some respects reassuring.

I also attended a briefing by the Environment Agency on the Thames Valley Flood Scheme, which was disappointing, as they were announcing they had not found a viable scheme for flood water storage - to alleviate local flooding - from the 17 high potential sites assessed. Given the floodwater is still around us as I write, it seems incredulous that the scheme could be disbanded when it

is clearly a major issue, which I have stressed to them. There is just one scheme they are recommending to take forward which is for the Ock near Abingdon where the identified flood storage site would be part of the SESRO scheme. They are communicating with Thames Water (who they also regulate) to request that this is put in their SESRO plans. I don't think this is sufficient and I think they under-estimate the economic damage to our area when flooding occurs. The district council are raising a motion which I am seconding next week to push back on the results of this report, and I intend to find out more about the county's plans as they are the local lead flood agency. I do get regular updates from the Climate Resilience Forum whenever a storm occurs and the measures being taken by the emergency services, so I know it works well, but what we need is more strategic resilience project investment to minimise future flood impacts. The council is now preparing its budgets for the next financial year for approval in February, and although the vast majority of its budget is tied up every year with statutory duties like social care, I want to see if there is anything we can find to further support local flood resilience. I will report back with more next month.

Otherwise, enjoy the rest of the festive season!.

What's happening in your area?

We're conducting site surveys and ground investigations in the local area, including near Steventon, East Hanney, Drayton, and Sutton Courtenay. You may see our surveyors conducting various investigations, such as winter bird surveys and traffic surveys.



We're also carrying out a clay compaction trial on land off Hanney Road, near East

Hanney, to support our reservoir design plans. We have begun excavating the clay to build temporary embankments up to three metres high to test the clay. We're aiming to finish by February 2025, weather permitting.

HEDGEROW HIGHWAYS

Hedges are a vital part of our local nature, providing shelter and resources for many species of mammals, insects, and birds (from hibernating hedgehogs to the smallest of beetles). They're crucial wildlife corridors that allow safe travel between isolated habitats.

The benefits that hedgerows provide for biodiversity are endless. In a heavily fragmented landscape, hedgerows link up valuable habitats for wildlife such as woodland, grassland and ponds. This connects populations that would otherwise be isolated and vulnerable and allows relocation to better habitat. Over 100 priority species utilise hedgerows for a variety of reasons such as for shelter, food, or navigation. Birds and small mammals nest in hedges, bats use hedgerows as foraging grounds and navigational markers, and reptiles hide in the long tussocky margins associated with hedgerows.

November through to March is the best time of year to plant new hedges. The first step is to acquire your roots. In Oxfordshire we recommend planting Blackthorn, Spindle, Buckthorn, Guelder Rose, Hawthorn, Wild Privet, Cherry Plum, or Hazel. Plant 4 or 5 plants per metre, about 25cm apart using the slit planting method, ensuring all fibrous roots are completely buried in the soil. To see a detailed tutorial of this planting method, head to our website where you can watch a demonstration from expert Nigel Adams. https://www.wildoxfordshire.org.uk/guidance/hedgerows-guidance

Aftercare for hedgerows is crucial. Keep weeds and grass away from the hedge plants for the first 2-3 years to give them plenty of space to absorb moisture and light. Thoroughly water the plants during dry spells. Compost can be very helpful to maintain vigour due to the competition for nutrients between such closely situated plants. Try to trim your hedge annually in the first three to five years to encourage bushy growth. Once your hedgerow is fully established (approximately 5 years) you can trim every year or every two or three years but make sure you don't trim your hedge to the same place every cut. More detailed aftercare information is also available on our website. Good luck with your new hedges!
