MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL

COUNCIL TAX 2025/26

The Parish Council has now carefully considered the income and expenditure for the parish for 2025/26. The precept has been set at £81,500. This is part of the amount that is raised from the Council tax which you pay to the Vale of White Horse District Council. The parish element of the charge per band D property will be £82.52. The current charge is £80.05, so there is a very slight increase of less than £2.50 for the whole year. The Council is looking at various projects such as improvements to the path network, safety at the entrance to Barrow Close, and new bench and some repainting within the play area, as well as a noticeboard.

ALLOTMENTS - COW LANE AND PARKSIDE

If you have an allotment you are reminded that allotment rent collection for the 24/25 financial year is taking place. Thank you to those who have paid promptly, but for those who have not yet paid, please transfer the sum due to the Council's bank account (details in the letter sent out, or available from the clerk if needed), or let the Clerk have a cheque payable to Marcham Parish Council. If anyone has a query as to what is owed, then please contact the Clerk. Those in arrears with rent, or found not to be utilising their plot, could lose it by the service of a Notice to Quit.

PLAY AREA

The Council was disappointed to hear that yet more thoughtless action has taken place in the play area on the new playing equipment. Plaster has been mixed with water and poured down the slide and also thrown at the new play items. Graffiti too was written on the matting. The incident has been reported to the Police, who are carrying out regular patrols of the area. The Council would ask anyone with information to contact PCSO Rich Osborn or telephone 101.

Anyone using the play area should follow playground equipment rules:

- Look before using
- Be mindful of surroundings
- Take care when using, or even avoid wet equipment
- · Wear appropriate clothing
- Play games away from playground equipment

The Council would like to thank everyone who helped clear up the mess. The play area is open and is widely used, and the Council wants to ensure it remains a safe and important facility for Marcham.

SUPPORT FOR THE VILLAGE SHOP

The Parish Council has agreed to support Marcham Village Shop with its application to the Vale of White Horse District Council for funding for a new chiller unit in the shop. Funding was paid by the developer of Monks Walk to the District Council for the benefit of the community shop, and an application to draw down some of those funds is being made.

NEW NOTICEBOARD

The Vale of White Horse District Council has agreed to release some developer funds to provide a noticeboard for the Parish Council which is going to be fixed to the wall at the Marcham Centre. Now that the funds are available, the Council is working with the arts officer at the District Council, and the designer to finalise the project.



New E. H. Shepard exhibition to open at Soldiers of Oxfordshire By the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, Ernest H. Shepard had Museum, including original Winnie-the-Pooh illustrations

From 18 January to 31 August 2025, Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock will host a brand-new exhibition of artwork by E. H. Shepard, best known as the original illustrator for A. A. Milne's Winnie-the-Pooh and the 1931 edition of Kenneth Grahame's The Wind in the Willows.

The collection of Shepard's work, including some of his beloved children's illustrations alongside a wealth of his Great War sketches and comic art, come to the museum on loan from the University of Surrey Archives and The Shepard Trust - on show for the first time in Oxfordshire.

already become a regular contributor to the popular Punch magazine, often drawing cartoons about the war for them among other publications. By 1915 Shepard had enlisted, going on to serve as an officer in the Royal Garrison Artillery, first in France's Western Front, and later Italy. From the start of his officer training in 1915, he began to document the war as he saw it, in pencil sketches, pen and ink drawings, and even watercolours. These ranged from humorous caricatures to detailed studies, capturing life in the trenches with his own unique style.

Alongside examples of his art, the exhibition will include some of Shepard's kit from his war service, such as his Royal Garrison Artillery officer's forage cap and identification tags. sofo.org.uk

ARCHAEOLOGICAL TEST PITS

Oxford University Department of Continuing Education (OUDCE)



Following the recent Marcham Society talk by Jane Harrison on the Excavations in the village of Besselsleigh, we have been asked if a similar exploration would be possible in Marcham as it would complement Jane's research already done in Besselsleigh and Appleton.

Although the excavations at Manor Farm and on Anson Field have given us insight into Iron Age and Roman occupation there are few finds from other periods on record and we would hope to learn more about the medieval past of Marcham itself.

This would involve a one metre square test pits dug in selected gardens carried out by mature archaeology students as part of the OUDCE Certificate in Archaeology. The excavations would be supervised by professional archaeologists. Clearly we would prefer gardens that are situated in the older parts of the village rather than new developments where archaeological survey has already been carried out.



SPORT REVIEW

The weather at the beginning of 2025 has been ranging from warm(ish) and very wet to cold enough to freeze not just puddles overnight but to render the ground solid and unsafe for the players who may risk injury when falling. All this has meant that there is little to report relating to football.

All is not lost however, sporting activity continues in Marcham where they definitely start young. **Marcham Primary School** is a thriving example of the range of sports for all ages of pupil. I went to see 'Miss' to find out more. She told me that the school is lucky to have a large play area, part grass and part hard standing within the grounds. They also use the MUGA for some activities, including PE and tennis, especially during the winter months. Their pupils can get involved in Football, Netball, Swimming, Cricket, Tennis, and Dance. PE occurs regularly in their Hall.

Last summer Year 6 beat four other schools at an Athletics event held at St Helen and St Katharine School in Abingdon. The pupils have taken part in a swimming gala at Radley College, where the girls team won. There are taught dance classes with a modern Dance Festival for Years 4-6 together with many other schools.

A recent innovation (November 2024) is tennis tuition in a workshop organised by the Vale of White Horse. In the summer Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 play tennis and Years 5 and 6 play cricket. For many of these sports there are competitive matches against other local schools. Thanks to **Imogen Knowles**, Year 5 Class Teacher, PE co-ordinator, Science co-ordinator for her help and co-operation in the compilation of this report.

Starting even younger are the children who attend Marcham **Little Angels** nursery. Lara Law (Manager) told me how they have weekly coaching sessions (https://serious4sport.co.uk/schoolsnurseries-cpd/) that involve the girls and boys from about the age of 2 years in football and hockey. They can be seen having a great time in the nursery car park (suitably barricaded) wielding hockey sticks which are often bigger than the child, and aiming mighty kicks at a football. At the beginning of this year Tom Finnie (https://toms-tennis-tots.live.baluu.co.uk/) has started tennis coaching in the hall in Marcham Centre once a week.

These two establishments show how sport is introduced at a young age and is fostered and promoted throughout their time there. They can form a springboard to sporting excellence in a variety of spheres and, who knows, may give Marcham their first Olympian or world champion.





ALL SAINTS' & ST LUKE'S CHURCHES

Work was completed in January to a new kitchen, new toilets and a new porch roof at All Saints Church. The latter was unplanned. It just so happened that last summer, as we were preparing to start work on the kitchen and toilets, tiles started slipping off the porch roof. It was a timely problem (if such a thing exists), because the builders whom we had already engaged to cover the internal works were able to repair the roof at the same time. It's really great to have a building that is now more welcoming and better suited to the range of church and community activities held there, but also with a key historic feature preserved for many years in our Grade 2* listed parish church. The kitchen has been designed to catering standards, and is more than twice the size of the previous one. Food and drink can be served directly into the main body of the church across a large servery. One of the toilets has been relocated upstairs to create more space for the kitchen, and there is a new universal access toilet on the ground floor. The project would not have been possible without charitable grants, and the prayers and generosity of many parishioners. We have also been able to reclaim VAT on the repairs to the porch roof, as we have done with all church repairs in Marcham and Garford in recent years. Let's hope the Labour Government doesn't do what they have suggested by scrapping the VAT reclaim scheme for works to historic buildings. Now that this project is complete, we are beginning to look at the east end of All Saints. We would like to improve the worship space and provide larger internal rooms for multiple users. The east end contains the majority of the historic features in All Saints Church, so the design will need to be "in keeping" whilst providing for the needs of contemporary worship in our growing parish. More details when we have them.

News from St Luke's

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

Shortly before Christmas the Government released its English Devolution White Paper, setting out the largest reorganisation of local government in a generation. I'm not convinced that there is indeed much devolution on the table; rather, it appears to be a centralisation of regional power into the hands of fewer people, without any powers or budget transferred out of Whitehall. Despite the intuitive appeal of 'simpler' local government, there is little evidence that it runs any more efficiently or effectively than the two-tier structure we currently have in place.

With the Government's large majority in Parliament, however, there is little that councils can do to stop it and so we are instead focussing on making the best of the situation. Oxfordshire councils, including the Vale, have called for as early a transition as possible so that we can seize the initiative; to dither risks us being left with whatever scraps are left by other neighbouring regions. We'll continue to push for a settlement that best serves local residents and businesses, not government ministers.

PLANNING

The Vale's Joint Local Plan (together with South Oxfordshire) was submitted to the Planning Inspectorate in early December, and two inspectors were appointed on New Year's Eve. At time of writing, we await dates for the examination. The Government's housing target for the Vale has increased from 633 houses per year to 949, but this shouldn't affect the Vale for many years due to the timing of the JLP submission and to the size of the Vale's existing Five-Year Land Supply.

The Environment Agency (EA) has announced an update to its flood risk assessment framework and so will update its flood risk maps soon. Local Planning Authorities, such as the Vale, must defer to the EA's flood risk maps when determining planning applications unless there is "strong" conflicting evidence: local knowledge is insufficient and would likely be overturned at appeal. Let's hope that the new maps better reflect the reality on the ground!

ELECTRICAL POWER SUPPLY

Lastly, a plea to all local residents and landowners: if any of your trees stand close to overhead power lines, please can you ensure that they are kept suitably trimmed back? As a resident of Marcham myself, I'm all too familiar with the frequent, short power cuts that occur during windy weather.

I knew that these were often caused by trees touching the power lines, but I've only recently learned how little power* electrical supply companies have to enforce this. Please be a good neighbour to the village and surrounding areas.

* Here I mean legal power, not electrical!

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

We are now in the midst of winter and freeze-thaw is giving our roads a beating again. I saw the County's special pothole filling machine past my home last week - if you see it, it is an excellent invention, as it allows highways to fill potholes on the go, literally taking minutes per pothole, avoiding the need for road closures, and enabling the team to do whole roads in a day. I watched as they did some terrible holes close to my home and talked to them. A mobile arm in front of the truck is positioned over the hole, then a machine blasts fire at the hole first to heat up and melt the surrounding tarmac, the truck moves forward and drops fresh hot tarmac mix in the hole, then the roller at the back of the truck, compounds the tarmac, binding it to the heated surrounding tarmac and levels it off. Two men control traffic around the truck for the 2-3 minutes this takes, then the truck moves on to the next hole up the road. I don't think the repairs are any more climate resilient than the old method, so holes may open up again as is often seen, but at least this repairs the roads much more quickly - a pleasure to see in action.

On other news, the HIF1 road and new bridge over the Thames between Sutton Courtenay and Appleford, enabling traffic to travel more easily and quickly from the A415 to the A34, has been given planning permission after several years of deliberation by the Secretary of State. The project now moves to detailed design, with more consultation locally to mitigate remaining concerns as much as possible, before starting work in 2026 with a planned completion date of early 2028. I know opinion is divided on the road, depending on where you live and travel, however, the road does provide an opportunity to improve routes for cycling and walking locally, as well as diverting HGVs and heavy traffic away from smaller roads, and it will accommodate extra traffic from new and planned developments around Didcot. It is well intended.

Closer to Marcham, Thames Water have been developing a trial site for the disputed SESRO reservoir. They have created a temporary access road from Hanney Road, removed the topsoil, and created a borrow pit to extract clay to test its suitability for the reservoir. In March, they plan to build a 3 metre high embankment to test the strength and sealing capabilities of the clay for holding water in the reservoir. I plan to visit the site in the spring to report on their work and plans. I still believe the strategic plan should be to manage our current water supplies and flood resilience better across the Thames basin before building new reservoirs which raise risks rather than reduce them, and I will work with Rob Clegg and others locally to further better alternatives.

Lastly, the government is engaging with local councils on plans to devolve power from Westminster locally. Both County and Vale of White Horse District councils have expressed support, as in theory locally devolved decisions means they are more likely to suit local communities. However, it is not yet clear what this means or how this

will work, so I will report back in due course as it becomes clearer.

In the meantime, wrap up warm, check your homes and pipes are insulated, and good luck weathering out the winter months. The council publishes a Snow Guide, which may be helpful.

Exagen Development Limited has submitted a planning application for the "Willowfields Energy Park," a renewable energy project located between Frilford, Fyfield & Tubney, and Garford.

The proposed energy park will feature a ground-mounted solar photovoltaic (PV) array paired with a battery energy storage system (BESS). This will enable efficient energy storage and connection to the existing overhead power line within the site boundary. The project aims to contribute to the shift towards sustainable energy while being thoughtfully designed with input from local residents and planning experts.

The consultation period for the application runs from 14th January to 21st February 2025, with the Vale of White Horse District Council aiming to make a decision by 9th April 2025.
