Please put the date of the meeting in your diaries, and please let the clerk to the Parish Council know if you wish to request any item to be added to the agenda or wish to submit any questions.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO BECOME A PARISH COUNCILLOR?

The Parish Council currently has vacancies and would like to co-opt residents who have a little time to spare to help Marcham become a better place to live. There are various projects currently being undertaken, so if you want to find out about what a councillor does, and how you can help in the parish, then please contact the Clerk or an existing councillor for further information.

PARKING

The Parish Council has had some comments regarding inconsiderate parking close to road junctions, which obstructs the vision of others. Blocking someone's line of sight can lead to accidents and near-misses. Please think where you leave your vehicle and do not block routes for other road users, pedestrians and cyclists. The highway code specifies that parking should not be within 10m of a junction, so please be courteous and considerate, and be careful where you park.

ELECTIONS 1ST MAY 2025

County Council elections are planned for 1st May, 2025. You are reminded that you need to show photographic ID when receiving your ballot paper. If you do not have a passport, driving licence, older person's bus pass, or other form of acceptable photographic ID, then you can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate. Information is available on the Electoral Commission's website. www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voting-and-elections/voter-id

Don't miss your chance to vote by leaving things too late, if you need to apply for a Certificate.

BROWN BIN - GARDEN WASTE COLLECTION

From 1 April 2025,a new permit scheme will change the way that you pay for your garden waste collection. The permits must be paid for in advance, and direct debit will no longer be available. Once the District Council has received your payment, you will receive a garden waste permit through the post. This needs to be put on the lid of the brown bin. After 1st April, bins that do not display the relevant year's permit sticker will not be emptied. Should you continue to present your bin without displaying a sticker, you will receive warning notices, and run the

risk of your bin being removed. Information is available on the District Council's website www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk by searching for 'garden waste'.

'A fun, action-packed adventure film for the whole family, Yellow Peril was originally shot here in Marcham back in 1989 with a large cast of local heroes and villains'.

This is how the recently restored 1989 production of 'Yellow Peril' was heralded to our 2025 village in advance of the public screenings on the 31st January and 1st February in All Saints' Church. The four showings were very well attended, by both longstanding and more recently settled Marcham residents.

Pre-showing promotion included this taster: 'This hour-long, action-packed feature film was shot in and around the village of Marcham in 1989. The amateur sleuths of Marcham Investigation Unit (MI8) stumble upon a plot to deprive the village of Marcham of its long-awaited bypass in order to construct a new London airport. With the village policeman only interested in his stamp collection, the youngsters take it upon themselves to foil this plot. But how can they succeed?'

How wonderful it was for this group of children to have the freedom to patrol the village on bikes and to assemble as the village investigation unit, MI8. Here they shared 'evidence', from the mundane (number plates of newly acquired cars) to the shocking: the discovery of a plot to thwart the building of the new Marcham bypass (yes! a hot topic even back in 1989). They were ready to take matters into their own hands and the adventure began.

This devious plot was carried out by the Yellow Peril; the military marching and ever vigilant Traffic Wardens (a scourge of our lives back in the day as well). Traffic was diverted so that wonderfully empty Marcham roads meant that smartly dressed officials looking to verify the bypass need were perplexed.... until the MI8 team removed the signs and the juggernauts returned.

The arch-villain and proponent of the new London airport (Marcham) resided in the Traffic Wardens' Dreadall College (aka Denman College, now Marcham Park). Once the plot had been uncovered, the drama of his escape in a light aircraft and the expert mid-air recovery and landing by the impressive child star of the show, Chief, made for a nail-biting climax.

(Perhaps you might substitute the new London airport (Marcham) with Thames Water's Reservoir and think, well, nothing much has changed.)

The showing was preceded by an interesting film that introduced us to the cast and crew though recent interviews. Hearing from their older selves was very illuminating. The creators, film crew and cast should be congratulated for all their hard work at the time, as must Bartle Frere be for this restored version; likewise, Malcolm Pearce for the freshly enhanced digital soundtrack, using as much of Christine Whild's original compositions as possible.

Thank you to All Saints' Church for generously hosting the screenings and to everyone in the village who came to see this glimpse of our village of 35 years ago.

SPORT REVIEW

After February's look at the possible future sporting stars growing up in Marcham we turn our attention to the grown-up football teams of Marcham and, in particular, the veterans' team together with the curiously named league in which they play. After a number of postponements and cancellations some games have managed to take place. Since the beginning of January, at time of writing, Marcham First Team, playing in Division 2 of the North Berks League, have won 2 (including a thumping 12-0 victory against Steventon Reserves) and lost 2 League games. Currently they lie 4th in the Table. They have also lost a North Berks War Memorial Cup game against Watlington Town Reserves (having beaten them just before Christmas).

Marcham Vets (also known as 'The Celery Men') have suffered 3 postponed matches since the beginning of January. They sadly lost the home match 0-1 against Witney Royals Vets on 5th February and the return away match on 12th February. Witney are currently top of the Table. The Vets play in the Hellenic League – a strange title for a football league in the middle of the UK. The full title is the uhlsport Hellenic League Division 1 West, where the league table shows they have room for improvement.

A Google search of 'Hellenic League' for football is not enlightening. The Hellenic League was formed in 1953 and in 2000 absorbed the Chiltonean League (an understandable title), which had been established in 1984. Abingdon Town Football Club was a founder member of the Hellenic League. The league logo has a distinctly Greek look about it with a crown of laurel leaves surrounding a female figure running (or possibly dancing) carrying a lighted torch:

The original Hellenic League comprised of a number of states in the eastern European area that we know today as the country of Greece. Athens and Sparta were two of the principle states and who were traditional enemies. However they joined forces, together with other smaller states to form the Hellenic League. This league had the aim of repelling Darius and his successor Xerxes, who were both Persian kings and warlords. Darius and later Xerxes had extended their lands from India in the east to include most of modern day Turkey as well as Syria, Palestine, Egypt, Libya, northern Greece, Macedonia and parts of Ukraine. Their ambition was to move further west into Europe along the Mediterranean seaboard, starting with Greece. These conflicts lasted about 50 years starting from around 500BC and concluded with victory for the Greeks.

This does not help us understand why footballers in the central part of southern England should found the 'Hellenic League', unless they wanted to repel the 'barbarians from the east' – Millwall supporters perhaps! There are 151 teams in the Hellenic League including Abingdon United and Abingdon Town. As noted above, the latter was a founder member of the Hellenic League in 1953-54. They won the Hellenic League in 1956–57, 1958–59, and 1959–60, and are currently third in Division1. If anyone has any information regarding the origin of the name 'Hellenic League' could they please contact the editor (editor@madnews.co.uk) and we will be happy to include this in the next issue.

And now for cricket. England have struggled against India recently, however there is some good news for our local teams. Marcham CC are looking forward to the start of the cricket season on the 10th May (hopefully accompanied by some sunshine). Following their promotion Marcham 1st will start the 2025 season in Division 7C, with the second team competing in the newly formed Division 9B, both teams competing in the Cherwell Cricket League. Indoor nets start on Friday the 7th March at 19.40pm at Radley College Sports Centre.





DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

The preparations to re-organise local government continue, with Oxfordshire expected to be part of the second 'wave' of regions. A Unitary Authority for Oxfordshire is looking most likely, but not yet guaranteed. At the Mayoral Strategic Authority level, we are very likely to join with Berkshire but other potential partnering areas are less clear: Swindon is keen to join us, but most Oxfordshire councils are opposed; we



would instead like to partner with Buckinghamshire, but the current council there is proving non-committal. If you have any opinions about any of this, please do get in touch with me - preferably via email, but phone or in-person are also welcome (I'm usually at Thirsty Café on a Saturday morning).

BUDGET SETTING

At the Vale's full council on 12th February, we agreed a balanced budget for the year and beyond. The final budget of the Vale's Conservative administration in 2019 projected that the council would have exhausted its reserves about now, and so had to effectively declare itself bankrupt, so the complete turnaround of this situation has been a major success story of the last 6 years of Lib Dem leadership. The Vale's part of council tax will be increasing from April onwards, by £5 per year for a Band D property (to £161.69), which is roughly a 3.2% increase. As a reminder, the total council tax paid by residents includes not only the Vale's part (about 7% of the total), but also Oxfordshire County Council's (~78%), the parish council's (~4%), and the Police and Crime Commissioner's (~11%).

GARDEN WASTE COLLECTION

As I mentioned in my MAD News report of April 2024, the way residents pay for the optional garden waste collection service is changing: you will now need to buy an annual permit instead of via Direct Debit. You'll receive a tamper-proof sticker with your address on it, which you'll need to put on the lid of your brown bin. 
