MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL

LOCAL GOVERNMENT RE-**ORGANISATION**

Central Government in December last year published plans for examining and modifying the way local councils work. It invited the

Vale of White Horse District Council and other similar councils, to submit proposals for how new councils could operate. Currently Oxfordshire County Council manages education, social care, highways, fire service, libraries, and trading standards as well as some waste disposal and planning matters. The Vale of White Horse District Council manages planning applications, environmental matters, waste collections and recycling, housing and licensing as well as collecting the council tax. The current thinking is to merge these services so that one authority is responsible for all local government functions within a given area. Various boundaries for a new area have been considered and the suggestion now preferred by the Vale of White Horse District Council, are two new councils of Vale of White Horse/South Oxfordshire/ West Berkshire, and the other of Oxford City/ Cherwell/West Oxfordshire. Consultation on the Vale's proposal runs until 16th July. Information is on the website of Vale of White Horse District Council or at twocouncils. org. Other Councils such as Oxford City are also putting forward their preferred boundary areas, so look out for their consultation too.

MARCHAM CEMETERY

The Parish Council has formed a working group to plan for a new burial area. The current available space in the cemetery is reducing, and in order to prepare for budgeting for next year, a clear idea of exactly what is required needs to be prepared. The group will oversee the planning and implementation of a new area, to ensure that it meets the needs of the expanding community, and complies with burial legislation. The group comprises 3 parish councillors from Marcham, 1 representative from Frilford Parish Meeting, and 3 members of the public. If you are interested in helping plan for a new area for burials, and would like to be one of the 3 members of the public serving on this group, then please contact the Clerk to the Council whose details are below.

GRASS CUTTING, OVERHANGING TREES AND HEDGES

It is that time of year when we are all out cutting grass, trimming hedges, and managing our gardens. Please can residents who live adjacent to public roads and footpaths, kindly keep any growth which is overhanging, cut back. The rural paths can become quite dark and soaked, when low wet branches are overhanging. As Marcham village grows, more and more people are walking the paths, and it is therefore important that they be kept clear so that they remain light, and are able to dry out. The Parish Council has a contractor who strims any growth from the floor, but help from residents is needed to help keep the overhanging growth from their gardens trimmed.

The Vale of White Horse District Council provides a successful recycling and waste collection service for all its residents in the district. In addition the recycling centre at Drayton is open 8.00 a.m. - 5.00 p.m. 7 days a week. If visiting the Drayton site, please remember that a booking scheme is in operation for non household DIY waste so please visit Drayton household waste recycling centre | Oxfordshire County Council for more information, as you may need to book a slot for your visit.

Please do not fly tip grass and garden waste on highway verges, private land, paths, or any recreation area, as such action interferes with the enjoyment of these areas.

ACCOUNTS

Each year the Parish Council produces an Annual Governance and Accountability Return which is reviewed by an external auditor. The information for the period ending 31st March 2025 is on the website of the Parish Council, and is available to the public in person by prior arrangement with the Clerk.

HOWARD CORNISH ROAD -SALVATION ARMY TEXTILE BANK

The Parish Council has considered a complaint that there are numerous sacks of clothes left around the textile bank, leaving the area unsightly, and bags which become wet in periods of rainfall. It has contacted the Salvation Army for advice about what could be done. In the meantime, the Parish Council would ask residents to avoid leaving clothing sacks on the ground around the textile bank. If you find the clothing bank full, then please take them to the next nearest bank, either at Millets Farm, or to Tesco Extra, Marcham Road. 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MRS HUTCHINSON: CELEBRATING 18 YEARS OF LEADERSHIP AT MARCHAM CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

As the school year draws to a close, so too does an extraordinary found in the countless moments of kindness, encouragement, and chapter in the life of our school. After 18 years of devoted service, Mrs. Viv Hutchinson, our much-loved Headteacher, is stepping down - leaving behind a legacy of compassion, values, and quiet determination that has shaped our school community. In preparation for this article, Giraffe Class (Year 6) interviewed Mrs Hutchinson and their writing has been used to share some of her favourite memories and thoughts about Marcham.

Mrs Hutchinson knew she wanted to be a teacher from an early age and following advice from her own Headteacher, trained in Norwich as a Middle School teacher. Time passed and she moved to Oxfordshire (close enough, but not too close, to her childhood home of Birmingham). Once here, she regularly drove through Marcham, becoming very curious about what the village (and school) might hold. Seeing a job advertised in 2007, Mrs Hutchinson applied and in her words "amazingly got it". She brought with her a clear vision and since then has been working tirelessly to create 'The Best School in the World'.

On her first day at Marcham, Mrs Hutchinson remembers spending time in each classroom (only 4) getting to know the children. She recalls that one of her favourite memories was during that first week when "A new shed was delivered into the playground and I asked the children not to touch the fragile new delivery. Amazingly, no one touched it. I was so pleased and knew that this was going to be a great place to be."

Throughout the 18 years Mrs Hutchinson has never stopped creating a community where everyone is welcomed and encouraged to grow and learn and, most importantly, to believe in themselves. One of her greatest strengths is her ability to be ambitious for all within her school - both staff and children. Her memories and stories all link to individual children who have shaped her time here at Marcham.

She has seen countless milestones: from new curriculums to new buildings, from COVID restrictions to increased numbers of classes, from chalkboards (only 1) to interactive whiteboards. She introduced new initiatives with thoughtfulness and care, always balancing innovation with the needs of the school. But perhaps her most lasting impact cannot be measured by results alone - it is



quiet resilience that defines her leadership.

One legacy that will live on, even after Mrs Hutchinson leaves us, started in 2012 when during an Easter Egg hunt a small boy called Harry, took a bite out of a clay egg! Every year, without fail, before hunting around the school grounds, Mrs Hutchinson tells this very story reiterating many times "DO NOT eat the clay eggs"! She recalls "I can remember Harry with clay all around his mouth, it always makes me chuckle!".

As we say farewell to Mrs. Hutchinson, we do so with enormous gratitude. Her influence has been far-reaching and memories of many of the villagers of Marcham will include Mrs Hutchinson. While she may be stepping down from the role of Headteacher, we know that her love of learning, her passion for children, and her unwavering commitment to making a difference will continue to guide her next steps - wherever they may lead.

On behalf of the entire school community we say: Thank you, Mrs. Hutchinson. For your 18 years of leadership, your warmth, your wisdom, and your deep belief in every one of us. You will be missed by the whole school community. You have left a legacy of love and learning that will carry us forward for years to come.





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
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Here's a quick update on the PTFA's recent fundraising efforts and what the money has been spent on!

As most of you will know, the Centre includes the village hall, Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) and the playing fields. Throughout the year, particularly during the summer months, these areas are used extensively by many within the village. This contributes immensely to the running costs of the facilities, as do the regular hirers during weekdays, such as those providing sessions for Pilates, Zumba, Karate for children, Harmony Inspires Choir and Slimming World. Not forgetting of course the excellent service provided by Thirsty Café on Wednesday and Saturday mornings. Community groups comprising of the Bridge Club, Indoor Bowls, Church, Cubs, Guides, Brownies, Marcham Society and Marcham WI, together with sport clubs, Marcham Cricket, Football and Colts Football all contribute to the overall cost of running the facilities. The Trustees are therefore very appreciative of all these bodies, whether private or community based for their continuing support.

Similarly, hires by members of our community, particularly at weekends for parties etc, have proven to be an important aspect towards covering the overall cost and viability of the Centre. This has vindicated an early decision to constrain regular hirers (other than Thirsty Café) to weekdays only, leaving weekends for private hires for members of our community. So a big thank you to all of you that have supported us by hiring the facilities over these early years.

Whilst the halls are very well used, there are vacant sessions during the week, ideal for regular users. We have one or two more about to start, but there is scope to fit in more. The Trustees have regularly reviewed how to market our excellent facilities. This has been productive, but a wider knowledge of other potential users would be helpful, as many of you will belong to or be aware of other classes and/or groups that may benefit from using our facilities, albeit regularly or occasionally.

Please therefore have a 'quick think' and let us know if there's any opportunity for potential users. Indeed, at any time in the future, let us know, and we'll make contact to see if we can help to accommodate them.








This month we turn our attention to a game that was invented in Victorian Great Britain, and at which other nations now excel, Table Tennis – or *whiff-whaff* as it used to be known! It has moved from the dining tables of upper-class British households, played with books for a net, a modified champagne cork for a ball and cigar boxes for bats into a mainstream, fully regulated sport.

For those who would like a full history of the game I advise you look at a 2018 article by Mike Rowbottam on the 'inside the games' website (www.insidethegames.biz). Briefly, in 1901 James Gibb patented the game and called in 'Gossima'. A year on J Jaques & Son Ltd in London began selling a kit called Ping Pong after the noise made by the bat and ball. This proved to be a busy year as the Table Tennis Association and the Ping Pong Association were formed, later merging in 1922. In 1927 this became the English Table Tennis Association which lasted until 2014 when replaced by Table Tennis England, the current governing body for English table tennis.

The game moved from a leisure activity to become an Olympic sport in Seoul in 1988. Currently the sport is dominated by the Chinese. In April of this year in the International Table Tennis Federation (ITTF) rankings China holds 4 out of the top 10 places including the top two male players. The first English man is 54th. Whilst not enjoying the financial rewards associated with tennis or other high-profile sports, *Fine Magazine* reports that Wang Hao (Chinese) who won three Table Tennis World Cups is worth about \$15 million.

For women, the top 5 players are all Chinese, followed by 6-9 from Japan. Moving down to number 264 we find the first English woman – Tin Tin Ho, and then to 471 for Poon Yat.

Anna Hursey, born in Carmarthen in 2006 to a Chinese mother and British father, became the youngest player to represent Wales in a senior table tennis team in the European Championship, when aged just 10 years. She qualified for the 2018 Commonwealth Games in Australia becoming the youngest competitor in the Games history. She represented Great Britain in the Paris Olympics and is currently ranked 4th on the ITTF Junior table. What an achievement!

(Almost) locally Matthew Syed (born in Reading), now a sports columnist in *The Times* newspaper, became three-time men's singles Table Tennis champion at the Commonwealth Games, and also represented Great Britain in two Olympic Games. He was the top ranked English player for 10 years, and in 1988 was ranked 25th in the world.

Why the focus on Table Tennis? Well, did you know that you can play Table Tennis in the Small Meeting Room in Marcham Centre? There is a table and net provided, but you need to bring your own bats and balls. To book the room go to www.marchamcentre. org/booking.php

Why not give it a try? You can have a fun time and maybe put Marcham firmly on the sporting map by sparking an interest in someone who can go on to greatness in the Table Tennis world.

Cricket


It has not been a good start to the cricket season. Marcham 1st team won at the end of May, and again on 14th June but, otherwise the results have not been good for either team.

NEWS FROM WILD OXFORDSHIRE

Happy Swift Awareness Week!

To celebrate swift awareness week, here's some interesting facts about swifts.

These birds are the TopGun *Mavrics* of the bird world as they can do almost everything in the air! Swift's feet and legs aren't designed for sitting on the floor or a perch. They can perch vertically but they can't sit like a robin or pigeon for example, as their wings are far too long. They are perfectly designed for flight and this means they do everything whilst flying – drinking, eating and even mating! True acrobatic flyers.

Swifts have one of the longest migration journeys in the world! Our swifts migrate approximately 14,000 miles to return to our swift boxes in Oxfordshire every year! What a journey – really makes us think of 'Home sweet home'.



The swifts we see in our towns and villages have overwintered in Africa and come back each summer to nest and raise their chicks. Once the chick(s) leave the nest, they're off - they will never return to the family nest again.

Sadly swifts are endangered and need swift boxes on buildings to nest. Find out more about how you can help them on either the Cherwell swift project website http://www.cherwell-swifts.org/

Summer Gardening

Heading into the hottest months of the year, we need to be looking out for our local wildlife that could be harmed by the heat. Fortunately, there are lots of easy ways to lend a helping hand.

Even the most heat-loving species can suffer without enough to drink so consider providing a shallow bath of water in your garden. Add some stones around the dish so that bees and butterflies can climb out if they fall in

It's also important to provide some shade in your garden. A small pile of logs can be a great hiding place for insects from the sun.

Make sure you're also helping your grass and flowers survive the heat as grass can reduce surface temperatures by 10°C compared to concrete and flowers are a vital wildlife food source in the hot weather.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

FOOD AND GARDEN WASTE

In early June I attended a tour of the Anaerobic Digestion facility near Wallingford, owned and run by Severn Trent Green Power, which is where all the food waste collected from homes across the Vale and South Oxfordshire DC is taken. The site also processes all garden waste collected in South and Vale, at a composting facility located at the same site; this process is fairly



simple – it is essentially composted as you might at home, only at a far greater scale.

The food waste is macerated, separated from the caddy liners in which it arrives, and diluted using liquid wastes. It is then pumped into a series of large digestion tanks, where the food waste breaks down over a period of around 90 days and is finally pasteurised before being spread on farm fields as liquid fertiliser. The 4.5 million m3 of methane biogas produced during the digestion process is fed into on-site gas engines, which produce enough electricity to power around 4,800 homes. There's far more detail than I'm able to convey here, and there's something to be said for seeing the sheer scale of it all in person. These tours are free, open to all (subject to availability), and run about five times each year. LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

As I've written before, the government is pushing through reorganisation of local government across much of the country, including Oxfordshire. Three competing visions for how this could look have been proposed:

- The proposal from Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) is for a 'One Oxfordshire' unitary authority, which would essentially see a merger of OCC with the four district councils (including Vale) and Oxford City.
- The four district councils have proposed two new unitary councils: (1) Oxford City, West Oxfordshire and Cherwell; and (2) South, Vale, and West Berkshire as the 'Ridgeway Council'.
- Oxford City Council has proposed a 'Greater Oxford' model, with a borders approximately those of the green belt, and two other unitaries similar to those proposed by the district councils (but each significantly smaller). They propose using this approach to get 40,000 new homes built within that area by 2040.

There is currently a consultation open for the two councils model (see **twocouncils.org** online) and consultations are expected soon for the other proposals. Your opinions are most welcome! They will all feed into the final decision to be made by central government.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

One of the most fulfilling things about representing our division on Oxfordshire County Council is being able to support residents with the various queries and concerns they raise, but during my first month or so in the role, there is clearly one area that people want to talk about the most – highways. It may come as a surprise to some that only 8% of the County Council budget is allocated to highways and transport – whether that is enough or not is a separate discussion – but it's clear that the



maintenance of our roads and footpaths is something that residents care deeply about, whether its road safety, potholes or speed limits. I

was glad to see the recent completion of works around the new Bloor Homes site in Marcham and the re-installation of 20mph signs, but I wanted to use my column this month to update you on a few other highways related issues:

FRILFORD LIGHTS SCHEME

I asked officers for an update on the A338/A415 Frilford Lights scheme, which was due to report last year and which several residents have raised as an issue with me. The purpose of the project is to improve road safety and accessibility for all road users, particularly pedestrians and cyclists, in and around the Frilford lights. I've been told that a report is finally being developed with proposals for next steps, and this phase of work is expected to conclude by late summer. This will include details of the planned public consultation, so I will continue to monitor this and provide further updates.

A415 ROAD SAFETY

During the recent campaign and in the weeks since, a number of residents have raised concerns about the A415, ranging from issues with HGVs to the general speed of vehicles and the safety of pedestrians and cyclists. Most of you will know this is an area I am passionate about, so I'm glad to report that Oxfordshire County Council is currently in the process of reviewing all A & B roads across Oxfordshire as part of the 'Vision Zero' programme, which aims to improve safety and reduce the number of casualties on roads in the county. I was encouraged to find out that the A415 will form part of this work programme and have asked the team to keep me updated on how this progresses. My hope is that we will be able to tag on some much-needed safety improvements to the A415 as part of this work

It is always a pleasure to see Oxford at its vibrant and inclusive best, and this year's Pride was no exception. Despite the weather, many locals came out and showed their support for our community. LGBTQ+ rights are under threat, now more than ever, with too many politicians trying to stoke division in a manufactured culture war. That makes celebrations like Pride even more important. It was



also great fun to judge the Pride dog show. Our furry residents put on a fabulous performance - the competition was fierce! Plenty of beautiful and superbly outfitted pooches, including best dog in show, **Bella the cockapoo**.

GAZA

Residents from Marcham, as elsewhere, raise the situation in Gaza and the Middle East with me more than any other. I continue to have contact with families in Gaza, who have described conditions on the ground as like those of a slaughterhouse, and how many are

on the brink of starvation. HANNEY ROAD CLAY COMPACTION TRIALS: Experts from GARD visited the CCT site on 20th May, but in spite of requests, they were not allowed a close look at the test embankments. In their opinion the CCT tests were neither large enough nor long enough to establish key design issues. They also noted that Thames Water, after finding out about the different clays on the site, have made design changes to the embankments. These will highly likely lead to significant cost increases and possibly time extensions to complete any reservoir, if one is approved.
