MARCHAM PARISH COUNCIL

THAMES WATER - SESRO (SOUTH **EAST STRATEGIC RESERVOIR** OPTION).

Thames Water has launched its statutory public consultation into its proposals to build a new reservoir south of Marcham. A package of consultation documents is available on the Project website www. thames-sro.co.uk/sesro/statcon2025 Hard copies are available to view at Abingdon and Wantage libraries. The deadline for receipt of comments is 11.59 p.m. on 13th January 2026.At the time of writing, most of the public exhibitions have still to be held. Once all the latest information is available, the Parish Council will be very carefully considering it at a future Council meeting, debating the matter and submitting comments to Thames Water. If you have any particular points that you wish the Parish Council to take into account, then please contact your local parish councillor.

GRANT APPLICATIONS

The Parish Council considered grant applications at its November meeting, and has so far made the following awards:

- Marcham Community Group £2000 towards field/sports pitch maintenance for the 2026 season
- Citizens Advice Bureau Oxfordshire £1200 and The Abingdon Bridge £1600, towards their running costs in supporting Marcham residents.
- Marcham and Garford PCC £325 towards the running costs of Friday Club and their pantomime visit.

Applicants not yet receiving an award, were asked to provide additional information to support their applications, so that they could be better considered at a future date.

SCHOOL ADMISSIONS - ENTRY TO PRIMARY OR INFANT SCHOOL **SEPTEMBER 2026**

If you are a parent or carer of a child 3 or 4 years old then you need to apply for a primary school place now. This is for children born between 1st September 2021 and 31st August 2022 (inclusive). You still have to apply even if your child already attends a nursery attached to your preferred school. For further information and to apply online go to www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/schools/ apply-school-place The closing date for applications is 15th January, 2026

AUTUMN / WINTER WEATHER

Autumn and Winter are times when there are shorter days, less daylight, and reduced visibility. In addition, paths can have leaf fall, and be icy, have snow build up, or be very wet during periods of heavy rainfall. Residents are reminded to take care when out and about, particularly as the weather becomes colder, being careful not to slip, trip, and fall.

OXFORD CONGESTION CHARGES

A reminder that the Charging Zones in Oxford City commenced on Wednesday 29th October, 2025. Various types of Congestion Charge permits are available for travel through these zones. These are

available for residents, hospital visits, blue badge holders, carers etc. Others may be exempt. Marcham residents are entitled to apply for a free permit which permits travel through the zones on 25 days each year. PLANNING APPLICATIONS

P25/V1928/HH Two single storey extensions, one at the rear to the ground floor, the second at first floor over existing side extension at 8 Packhorse Lane. The Council commented that it had no objections, but asked for assurance that there was adequate rear access for construction, owing to the property's location on the busy A415.

CHRISTMAS - VILLAGE GREEN

To bring the joy and festive spirit of the season to our village, the Council is delighted that Andrew MacLean of ADM Trees at Frilford has again agreed to provide a Christmas tree for the village green. We extend our gratitude to Andrew for his generosity. Councillors will decorate the tree with lights Our thanks also go to the Councillors who have volunteered to arrange this.

CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

The Vale of White Horse District Council is again recycling real Christmas Trees in January. When you no longer need your tree, it can be put out next to the brown bin at the kerbside provided it is less than 1.8m or 6 ft tall. If larger than this it will need to be cut into sections. If you do not have a brown garden waste bin, then your real Christmas tree can be placed by the Salvation Army Textile bank in Howard Cornish Road (opposite Duffield Place). Please cut it into sections if taller than 1.8m (6ft). The last day for depositing your Christmas Tree at the textile bank will be by the end of the day on Tuesday 13th January, 2026. Trees left after this date will not be collected, as collection takes place early morning on Wednesday 14th January. Please do not obstruct the textile bank, or the bus stop, when leaving your trees. There will be a Christmas tree collection from Millets Farm, so this is another opportunity for local residents to recycle their tree. Trees need to be dropped off at Millets by the end of Saturday 10th January, 2026, if using this site.





and write your answer. There will be a prize for all children who have correctly completed the quiz form and returned it to the shop by 5 January 2026.





Wildlife Wonders on the Allotment: A Tale of Tiny Friends

Nestled between rows of runner beans and raspberry canes, the allotment was more than just a patch of cultivated earthbustling it was a haven for wildlife. gardeners While came and went with wheelbarrows and watering cans, a secret



society of creatures thrived beneath the leaves and among the soil. At the heart of this miniature world were four unlikely companions: Sophie the Centipede, Lizzy the Labrador, Sophia the Snail, and Julia the June Bug.

Lizzy the Labrador: The Gentle Guardian Lizzy belonged to Mr. Jenkins, the kindly allotment Site Manager. With her golden fur and wagging tail, she patrolled the paths each morning, sniffing the air and greeting every gardener with a friendly bark. But Lizzy's true passion lay in watching over her tiny friends. She never chased or barked at them—instead, she'd lie quietly in the shade, her nose twitching as she observed the comings and goings of the allotment's insect residents.

Sophie the Centipede: The Soil Explorer Sophie was a curious centipede with a hundred legs and a thousand questions. She loved burrowing through compost heaps and weaving between carrot roots. Her favourite pastime was mapping the underground tunnels that crisscrossed the allotment like a secret subway system. Sophie was the unofficial walking tour guide of the soil, often leading other bugs on expeditions to discover new wormholes or hidden caches of decaying leaves.

Sophia the Snail: The Philosopher of the Patch Sophia moved slowly, but her thoughts ran deep. With her spiral shell glistening in the morning dew, she'd perch on cabbage leaves and ponder the mysteries of the universe. Why did the sun rise so early? What made strawberries so sweet? Her musings were legendary among the allotment's residents. Julia the June Bug often joined her for philosophical chats, especially when the moon was full and the air smelled of mint and marigolds.

Julia the June Bug: The Sparkling Storyteller Julia was the most dazzling bug on the plot, her iridescent wings catching the light as she flitted from flower to flower. She had a flair for drama and loved recounting tales of daring escapes from bird beaks and heroic rescues from puddles. Every evening, she'd gather the bugs for story time beneath the broad leaves of the rhubarb patch, her voice buzzing with excitement as she spun tales of adventure and friendship.

A Symphony of Life Together, these four formed a unique alliance. Lizzy kept watch from above, Sophie explored below, Sophia offered wisdom, and Julia brought joy. Their presence reminded the gardeners that an allotment wasn't just about growing food—it was about nurturing life in all its forms. From the tiniest beetle to the tallest sunflower, every creature had a role to play.

As autumn approached and the leaves began to turn, the allotment buzzed with preparations for winter. But beneath the surface, the friendships forged between fur, shell, and exoskeleton remained strong. And so, the allotment continued to thrive—not just as a garden, but as a sanctuary for stories, soil, and the secret lives of its wild and wonderful inhabitants. *Happy Gardening!*

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT RESERVOIR NEWS

Following on from my report in September's MADNews, the Vale's full council subsequently passed a motion urging Thames Water (TW) and the Government to consider alternatives to the proposed reservoir to the south of Marcham (SESRO) in light of the hugely increased estimate for construction (~£6.5 billion, up from ~£2.2 billion). This cost would be passed onto water customers, including Marcham



residents, despite the option of a much-cheaper Severn to Thames Transfer (STT) pipeline being available.

TW is pushing ahead with SESRO despite the cost rise and has now launched its statutory consultation for a Development Consent Order submission: essentially a planning application that will be decided by central government. I urge you all strongly to look at what TW is proposing and to respond to the consultation. Although I support the Vale's position in opposing the design of SESRO, there is a little good among what TW is proposing: I cautiously welcome the active travel and biodiversity enhancements, for example, although I sympathise entirely with the shock that local landowners may have at the thought of having their land compulsorily purchased. Without local voices calling for the good and against the bad, however, there's every risk that TW will try to wriggle out of the former and do only what works for them.

NATURE RECOVERY

On a more positive note, it was fantastic to see the launch last month of the Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) for Oxfordshire. Although the development of the LNRS was led by the County Council, district councils contributed and I was involved through my role as Chair of the Climate Emergency Advisory Committee (which also includes nature recovery within its remit). The LNRS firstly captures a snapshot of the current state of biodiversity across the county, then describes the potential state that we could achieve in the mid-term future, and finally sets out routes to achieving this. Of course, support will likely be needed from central government in the forms of funding, and cooperation from landowners, but the LNRS provides a solid framework for our requests. With strategising completed we're onto the next step: delivery!

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Since being elected back in May, I've been really keen to push for improvements to our local roads, specifically on the A415 through Frilford and Marcham. Whilst I'm slowly discovering that local government doesn't always work as quickly as I'd like at times, there have been some positive updates in this space. Local residents have long raised concerns about traffic volume and HGVs travelling along the A415 and I recently invited the Cabinet Member for Transport Management at Oxfordshire County Council to Marcham



to discuss these, alongside representatives from the Parish Council. I'm pleased to say that the meeting was positive, and the Cabinet Member agreed to give these concerns further consideration. I am still awaiting a formal response on next steps, but it was good to be able to draw these issues to the attention of a key decision maker at the County Council and I'm hopeful we will be able to deliver improvements to the road. I was also pleased to see the installation of new junction protection markings on both the Mill Road and North Street sides of the A415 through the Marcham, after residents raised concerns about unsafe parking. I'm hoping these will deter parking near the junction and in turn reduce the associated safety risks, but I'll continue to monitor the impact of the markings and push for further measures if necessary.

A project that is progressing painfully slowly however is the long-awaited improvements to the A415/A338 Frilford Lights. The planned scheme aims to increase capacity at the junction, whilst also improving safety for pedestrians, cyclists and road users. Despite being promised updates on this several times now and having raised the issue at full council, at the time of writing I am still yet to receive further information on the proposals. However, I want residents, especially those in Frilford, to rest assured that I will continue pushing for information on the scheme, as I know how important these improvements are.

MP'S REPORT

STANDING UP FOR THE INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE

This month I raised the Government's decision to withdraw funding for the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme in Parliament. The move is deeply disappointing and will hit schools like Europa School particularly hard. Although Europa lies just outside our constituency, I'm



aware that this decision has a real local impact for many families in Marcham. Having taught the IB for over a decade, I know just how transformative it can be. It gives students a global perspective, encourages compassion and curiosity, and nurtures the kind of critical thinking our world desperately needs more of. Cutting funding for such a successful programme, particularly without consultation or assessment, is short-sighted and damaging. I've urged the Government to rethink this decision and to protect statefunded IB places so schools like Europa can continue offering this world-class education.

SESRO CONSULTATION

Many residents in and around Marcham have contacted me about Thames Water's proposal for the Abingdon Reservoir (also called SESRO). The consultation is open until 13th January 2026, and I know there are strong feelings locally about the potential impact such a large development could have on our villages, roads and environment. I share residents' concerns about the scale of this proposal and the serious questions it raises about water management, sustainability and transparency. It's vital that Thames Water properly listens to local communities, takes environmental evidence seriously, and provides clear answers about the alternatives. If you would like to have your say, you can find more information by searching online for SESRO consultation or visiting Thames Water's project website. I'll continue to follow developments closely and make sure the voices of Marcham residents are heard throughout this process.

IMPROVING LOCAL BUS CONNECTIONS

I know how important reliable public transport is for people living in and around Marcham. It's encouraging to see improvements being made to Oxford's bus network, with more frequent and faster services around the city.

There are also improvements planned for routes serving the Park & Rides, the city centre and the hospitals, routes that could be very useful to those local residents who use Redbridge Park & Ride. The funding for these, and the free bus travel from Park & Rides, comes from the trial congestion charge.

I'll continue to press for better, more affordable public transport so that our villages stay well connected to jobs, schools and essential services.
